Colonel House reflects, squares fully with a great many of Landsdowne's suggestions, except the ones tending toward pacifism. The former minister's plans are fully in line, in the main, with the American policy of assuring the German people that if they must follow the Hohenzollern there is no desire to crush them utterly or to grab territory.

Landsdowne favors a league of nations as does President Wilson. Both believe the German people should be impressed with the idea that the world has no intention of crushing her politically and commercially, except insofar as it may be necessary to make her abandon intriguing imperialism and barbarism.

But most important of all, Landsdowne agrees with President Wilson's position as outlined in United Press dispatches from Washington and London, that

there should be a re-statement of all allied war aims.

The American government's attitude is that all allied peoples, including Russia, would be fired with new inspiration if imperialistic ambitions were abandoned and the war aims of all placed on an altruistic basis.

President Wilson believes further than once the German people realize the altruism of these aims, they would make peace possible by overthrowing their present arrogant dynasty and joining the world in democracy.

EVIDENCE ENOUGH TO JUSTIFY DEPORTATION

Interpreters Busy Translating Writings Captured With Anarchists

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 30.—Additional government interpreters were assigned Friday to speed up the translation of the gist of pro-German propaganda held by Italian anarchists belonging to Circles Studi Sociali now in the hands of federal authorities.

Only one of the 70 men arrested has so far been able to prove that he was not a member of the secret band which is alleged to have plotted to break down the morale of the Italian army.

Leaders of the anarchists have revealed information to federal officials, in their attempts to gain immunity.

Inquiries have revealed that some of the members obtained American citizenship by fraud, as they made their applications while still affiliated with the anarchist organization.

This will give the federal authorities sufficient ground to deport them.

The government of Italy, then, will be permitted to punish the plotters who helped break down the morale of her army.

free her of pro-German intrigue. This government believes that at heart Russia is sound and imbued only with a most intense striving for true democracy. And while it believes the leaders are misguided, it feels that no good purpose is served through threat against her.

To save Russia from Germany's grip before it is too late is the problem. From the government officials' statements, it was manifest that American proposals not alone to let the allies know—but by intimidation that they ought to use the right hand of fellowship rather than the mailed fist to overcome Russia's rapid trend toward an armistice.

SERVE FORMAL WARNING.

By Joseph Shaplen (United Press Staff Correspondent). Stockholm, Nov. 30.—Allied military officials, except American, have served formal warning on Russia's Bolshevik authorities that in attempting a peace with Germany Russia is ruthlessly casting aside solemn treaty obligations.

According to reliable information here, the notice was in the form of a joint note and specifically announced that the protest was made "in conformity with precise instructions received from authorized representatives."

The note was delivered to the Bolshevik commander.

The wildest speculation was aroused here over news that no Americans signed the note.

The allied message announced "a protest in the most energetic manner against Russia's violation of the conditions of the treaty of August 23, 1914, in which all the allies, including Russia, solemnly agreed not to conclude a peace separately."

The message concluded with the ad-

monition that "the signatories consider it their duty to warn Russia that violations of this pledge may cause very serious consequences."

The omission of American signatures to the note reported above may be very significant of the policy of the United States toward Russia.

If President Wilson follows with that nation the policy he adopted toward Mexico, it will be that the United States will not interfere with the working out of the people's national aspirations, provided America is not affected in that process of evolution.

Such an attitude to Russia would mean that the United States would neither disapprove nor approve of the Bolsheviks and would permit the Russian people as a whole to work out their own democracy, this government having full faith in Russia's inherent ability to save herself.
