ITALIAN ARMY IS BEYOND COMPARISON

It Will Be In Action Two Evenings Next Week In "The Man From Home"

The notable company of local players which the Elks have gathered together to portray the various roles in Booth Tarkington's powerful comedy of American life, "The Man From Home," are so well known to Salem theatre-goers, that very little that is really new can be said about them. There are three or four brilliant exceptions in the shape of newly discovered dramatic material, but for the most part the actors who will appear next Wednesday and Thursday evenings in the 1917 Elks Play have already thoroughly established themselves as thespians of the very highest rank.

Particularly is this true of Mrs. Robert McKinnin Hofer, who plays Lady Creech, one of the most amusing character creations that any playwright has yet given us. Lady Creech is an English Grand-dame, who thanks God that she is not as others are. She sincerely believes that the world was created for her special benefit, and that the creator made a terrible mistake when he permitted anybody else to live in it. Unfortunately, like her painfully proper brother-in-law, the Earl of Hawcastle (Charles V. Galloway) she is desperately in need of money. So she conspires with Earl and a certain "vampire lady," the Countess de Champany (Mrs. A. J. Rahn) to marry off her worthless nephew, Almeric (Murray L. Hart) to a young American heiress, Ethel Simpson (Miss Olga Gray) who has temporarily gone nutty over the aristocracy bunk that Lady Creech starts to hand out the moment the play opens.

How the poor child is saved from the clutches of Lady Creech and the rest of the remnants of nobility is a tale which will not be unfolded until next Wednesday evening. To tell it now might spoil the whole show for you. It is sufficient to say, however, that saving the child and squelching the Lady is some job. It requires the united efforts of an Indiana lawyer (James Mott) a Russian Grand Duke (August Hucklestein, Jr.) and the entire Italian army, which consists of Tom Kay, Ben Olcott and Walter E. Keyes. This may sound like tragedy—especially the Italian army part of it—but it is not. It is comedy. It is melodramatic comedy, to be sure, but comedy nevertheless. There are no tears in "The Man From Home." It is all sunshine and laughter.

To say that Mrs. Hofer gives a splendid performance of Lady Creech is simply using up newspaper space. The hundreds of people who jammed the theatre a year ago to see the last Elks play, "Get-Rich-Quick Wallingford" will recall her remarkable performance of the Landlady in that sparkling comedy. In this year's play, under the same direction and in a much better part, Mrs. Hofer's host of friends are expecting to witness the finest bit of stage work this talented actress has yet done.

"The Man From Home" will be played for two evenings, and will positively not be repeated. The annual "Elks Show" always plays to capacity, so those who wish to secure their choice of seats should reserve them the day the seat sale opens, which is Tuesday Dec. 11 at 9 o'clock in the morning. The price for reserved seats is \$1.00. The proceeds go to the Red Cross fund.

German Socialist Member of Congress Begins Peace Propaganda

Washington, Dec. 6.—Representative Meyer London, socialist, of New York, today introduced a peace resolution in the house. London's resolution favors immediate establishment by congress of an international league to secure a durable peace.

The resolution follows:

Resolved, by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, that the congress of the United States shall initiate the organization of an international league to secure a durable peace and for that purpose, shall, through the president of the United States, invite the representatives of the parliaments of all countries now at war with the Central Powers to convene in joint conference to be held at the city of Washington, District of Columbia.

Two Men Killed In California Express Wreck

Rolling, Cal., Dec. 6.—Two unidentified men were killed and one engineer and seven passengers were injured at 7 a. m. today when train number 15, the California Express, was wrecked at Upton, two miles north of Sisson. Both locomotives attached to the train were derailed and the mail, express and baggage coaches and one tourist car followed them off the rails. All the cars remained upright, however.

The two men killed were hoboes riding the "blind baggage."

One passenger, name not yet learned, was seriously hurt. A fireman named Clark was also slightly injured.

The cause of the derailment is not known. When the train stopped suddenly, all passengers were severely shaken up and most of the injuries
