Hard wheat flour, which sold for \$9.20 last time, had a low bid of \$9.45.

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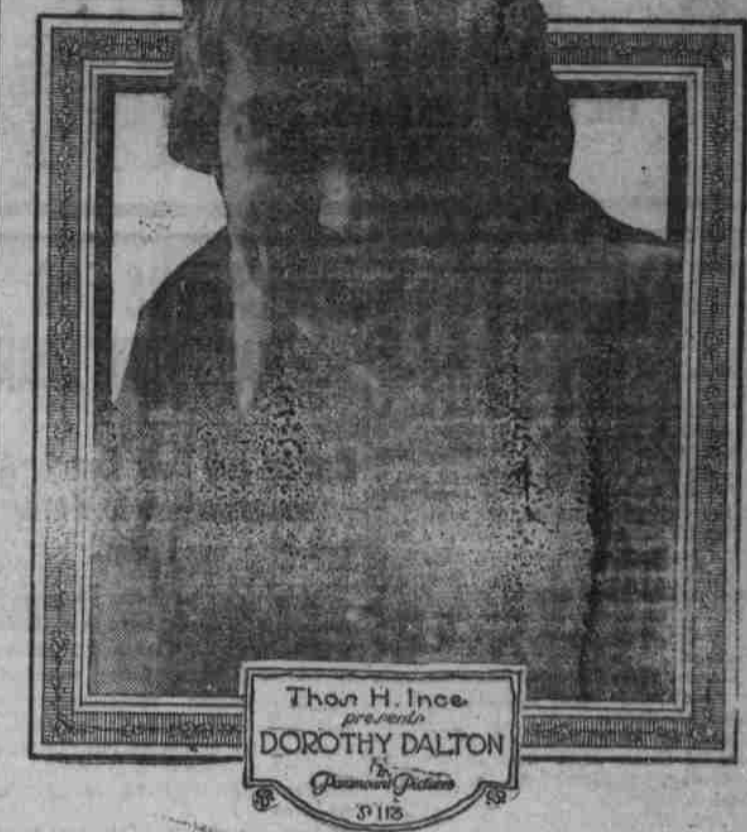
