ITALIANS RECOVER GROUND GERMANS WON IS OFFICIAL REPORT

Again On Offensive Around Asolone—Other Points Are Quiet

Rome, Dec. 21.—At Asolone and east of the Brenta we deprived the enemy of a considerable portion of his Tuesday's gains," declared today's official statement.

"Around Asolone the enemy concentrated violent fire against the positions re-taken from them, but without shaking our resistance," the statement added.

"Around Monte Pertica a strong attempt at a counter attack was dispersed immediately."

The German official statement today indicating definite assumption of an offensive by the Italian forces is borne out in the above report. The Asolone position is one of the gateways to the Venetian plains.

Say Italians Repulsed.

Berlin, via London, Dec. 21.—Violent Italian attacks around Monte Pertica and Monte Soloraro were all repulsed, today's official statement asserted.

That around Monte Pertica was a counter offensive in which seven separate attacks were made against the heights. All broke down under heavy losses.

Haig Reports Nothing.

London, Dec. 21.—Field Marshal Haig had nothing special to report from the British front today.

German Raid Repulsed.

Paris, Dec. 21.—A big German raid, partaking almost of the nature of a highly localized attack, was repulsed around St. Quentin at a point east of Fayet, today's official statement reported.

(Fayet is located about two and a half miles northeast of St. Quentin.)

The statement also detailed artillery firing on the right bank of the Meuse at Fleury, Hartmanns-Wierlkopf and Thann.

For several days now the Germans have been "testing out" the whole of the French front by raids of all kinds—some mere reconnaissance expeditions, others, like the above, in force. This has led to the deduction that the long advertised German drive may be preparing.
