Market Remains Weak Awaiting Developments

New York, Dec. 26.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: In a narrow and weak market Wall Street today expressed disappointment over the failure of the pope to make peace proposals, coupled with the vitriolic utterances of the Kaiser and the increased pressure of the Central Powers on the Italian front, the continued uncertainty regarding the future of the railroads, and poor net earnings of two important railroad systems. The whole active list of stocks participated in the reaction from the advancing movement which had prevailed for nearly a week and liberty loan 4's made a new low at 96.76, while the low points of the day ranged generally from 1 to 3/8 points below Monday's close, the declines being orderly and the market may be said to have dribbled off easily. There was noticeable a moderate amount of liquidation, particularly in the rails, but the small attendance customary on a day after a holiday, many of the big active traders being absent, failed to provide the market with sharp rallying powers.
