

MARION COUNTY COW TESTING ASSN.

Three hundred thirteen cows were tested during the month of October. The total average was 555.2 pounds milk each, containing 26.7 pounds fat. Average cost of feed per cow was \$8.08.

Thirty two cows in the association produced over 40 pounds fat during the month.

Garbo Brothers had the honor cow of the association which produced 1045 pounds milk and 62.7 pounds fat.

F. A. Doerfler of Silverton had honor herd; 10 cows had an average production of 808.8 pounds milk containing 47.41 pounds fat.

At least 12 cows have been culled out going to the butcher mainly. Others may have been disposed of, there being a constant decrease in number of cows in the association as not a sufficient number are taking their places. One proven Jersey bull purchased in association. One car, 20 ton, bran, purchased at \$29.50 per ton. Prevailing price in small lots retail from \$34 to \$36. Lack of cars and stiffening of quotations prevent further purchase of five cars bran.

Local prices for feeds: Hay, \$20; silage, \$6; kale, \$3; average bran \$4.00.

The Salem Kings Product Co. One of City's Greatest Assets

Makes Unlimited Market for Vegetables and Fruits and Puts Prices On Firm Basis.

The Salem King's Products company is a fruit and vegetable evaporating company. Its factory is located on the east bank of the Willamette river on Front and Market streets, Salem. It began operation in October and is already shipping out finished products.

Affording a market as it does for a large variety of vegetables and fruits for which no market, or at best a very poor and uncertain market, existed, it is one of the greatest boons to this section. It offers a stimulus to intensive culture of small tracts, insuring a good market for all of the products grown, provided, however, that the product is contracted in advance and is up to the standard required. It is well to bear in mind that a fancy finished product cannot be made of inferior vegetables. On the contrary they must be fresh and firm—such as would be required for table use. The one exception to this rule is cull apples. This grade of apples after being pared and cored and all the spoiled parts cut out can be cubed and evaporated, making a first class product for the fancy ring apples. A C grade apple is used.

The products are purchased on contract so the grower is insured a market in advance of planting the crop. These contracts are usually for one year on vegetables and for a period of from one to ten years for fruits. Some vegetables such as onions and later, possibly others may be contracted for 5 years.

The following fruits and vegetables are to be used the coming year: Beans, Peas, Green Pod stringless, \$60.

Beets
Celery, Golden Self Blanching, \$30
Carrots, Chantenay, \$10.
Cabbage, Danish Ballhead, Danish roundhead, \$12.

The company maintains a field department to purchase produce for the factory. It is the purpose of this department to make a careful examination of all tracts of land before entering into contracts with growers. The purpose of this is to prevent, in so far as it is possible, anyone from planting a crop on land where success is uncertain. Methods of planting, cultivating and harvesting will also be given. In fact, this department will assist the growers in every way possible to succeed with the crop contracted. This service is free, the company realizing that its success depends, in a large measure, on the success of the individual growers.

The factory operates three 8 hour shifts per day, and will run about 11 months per year. This affords employment for a large number of men and women. This payroll, the large amount of money paid out in this vicinity, and the stimulus to fruit and vegetable growing, especially on the small tracts, a most valuable asset to Salem and the surrounding country.

Running the Farm and the Home In War Time

Corvallis, Or., Jan. 1.—The increased skill and economy required to overcome the withdrawal of labor and meet the call for speeding up farm business will be featured in the work of the Short Course for farmers and home makers at O. A. C., Jan. 7 to Feb. 2.

Many big plans for making effective response to the nation's call to Oregon for more food have been laid at Farmers Week, and now comes a month of personal training in the arts of putting them into effect. Use of farm tractors, grading grain for bulk handling, farm accounts and records, the conduct of the home with war time economy, are some of the things in which the farmers and home makers will get added skill.

How to make higher skill and the use of machinery supply the labor loss in dairy and creamery work will be exemplified. How to manage the farm to produce more of what the country needs at the least disturbance to the rotation system in vogue, will be indicated. How to substitute home grown for shippable foods without increasing the cost of the meals or reducing their attractiveness and nutrition, and how to use worn clothing in making new clothes, are household problems that will get attention.
