CARPENTIER IGNORES WILLARD CHALLENGE

Is Two Basy Doing Real Fighting to Fool Away Time With Bluffer

Paris, Jan. 3.—Georges Carpentier, French heavyweight champion, is too busy at his job of fighting the knaiser to heed any "challenges" by Jess Willard, world's champion, for as small a thing as a mere fight in the squared circle.

"Just as soon as the knaiser is knocked out," the famous French fighter told the United Press today, "I'm willing to take up Willard's challenge. Until that time I'm going to be too busy fighting him to entertain any other ideas about fighting."

Carpentier is now a pilot aviator in the French flying corps. He was in Paris today on a brief period of leave from the front.

Talk Spring Training
San Francisco, Jan. 3.—Formal admission of Sacramento to the league and adoption of a playing schedule were the only bits of important business before the Pacific Coast league magnates when they gathered here this afternoon. The report of Jack Cook of Salt Lake, who was directed to prepare a schedule, will be adopted before night.

The club owners also considered the spring training problem. Ben Berry declared the Seals would probably train right here in San Francisco and it is believed other clubs may pursue a similar home training policy.

No War Clause in Contracts
New York, Jan. 3.—Lack of any new war clause in contracts mailed out to giant players by Secretary Foster today was taken to mean that the National league will not back any movement to insert such a clause when the National commission meets in Cincinnati next week. The present ten day clause is regarded as giving the club owners sufficient protection.

The American Refining company, through Babst, Hoover said, had contracted for approximately 50 per cent of the Louisiana output and the company could not have afforded to handle it at a lower price.

Methods to curb extortionate sugar charges by retailers were outlined by Hoover.

Hoover said under the food law, retailers are forbidden to charge extortionate rates, but there is no penalty for violation.

"If there had been I'd have prosecuted several retailers," he stated. "There have been some very flagrant violations."

Wholesalers, who are under license, have been told not to sell sugar to retailers who attempted to profiteer, he said. In general they have obeyed.

But 1,500 of 350,000, he said, were under license.

The wholesaler, Hoover said, has been limited to the pre-war margin of profit, which, in some cases, was a loss.

"Wholesalers handled sugar at a loss because they made it up on other articles," said Hoover.

Senator Reed declared that Babst had optioned practically all of the Louisiana sugar and charged that Hoover made it possible for Babst, exclusively, to contract for this sugar without other refiners getting a chance at it.

"Any advantage to the refiner to get this sugar?" asked Reed.

"Well, it enabled him to supply his customers," said Hoover.

"That's a pretty big thing—means a whole lot to a going concern," rejoined Reed.

Hoover denied that other refiners had been shut out of this sugar market.

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GERMAN SOLDIERS BETTER CLOTHED

Manufacturer Asserts We Cannot Quickly Turn Out Higher Grade Uniforms

Washington, Jan. 3.—If the United States had undertaken to clothe its soldiers as well as Germany clothes here, the shortage in uniforms and overcoats would be much greater, M. E. Driscoll, superintendent of the Haritan (N. J.) woolen mills testified today before the senate military affairs committee.

Driscoll, a wool expert, was shown samples of cloth from American and German uniforms. He unhesitatingly said the German cloth was of much higher grade.

"Of course, it takes much longer to manufacture than our uniform cloth," said Driscoll.

Driscoll testified that changes made by the supply committee of the National Defense Council in the specifications for shirts and uniforms did not improve the wearing qualities or the warmth of the cloth. The wearing quality, on the other hand, was somewhat lowered.

"It is my individual opinion that the uniform now being issued to our soldiers is too light," said Driscoll.

The cloth used in the marine corps uniforms is much warmer than that used for the army, he said. Wearing qualities are about equal, he said.

Driscoll declared that shorts, or re-worked wool, had not been used in the American uniforms, there would not have been enough wool to produce the cloth. The use of scraps cut from which uniforms are made meant a great saving to the government, both in time and money, Driscoll said.

Scraps are made into re-worked wool, he explained.

"It was to salvage these scraps that the Base Sorting Company was formed," he said.

Senator Frelinghuysen read into the record a criticism of the army uniform by Julius Forstmann, a New Jersey woolen manufacturer, who previously made uniform cloths for Teuton armies.

E. J. Bliss, president of the Regal Shoe company, said the quartermaster's distribution system fell down so badly that at some camps there were five pairs of shoes to every man and at other camps not enough to go around.

No record was kept by the quartermaster's office in Washington, Bliss said, of the supply of shoes on hand at any camp. The result was that when camps called for shoes, the unused supplies at other camps were not made available.

The house passed a bill placing militia and other active forces of the Philippines in United States service and then adjourned out of respect to the late Representative Bathrick, Ohio, who died during recess.

The senate military investigators heard E. E. Driscoll, superintendent of the Haritan, N. J., woolen mills. Driscoll was questioned concerning the quality of cloth put into uniforms and overcoats for the American army. Senator Frelinghuysen, who questioned Driscoll, predicted today that within three months General Pershing will insist on a higher grade of cloth uniforms.

"Germany pays \$7.50 a yard for her men's uniforms," Frelinghuysen said. "We pay \$2.85 for an inferior grade of shoddy. I am convinced we would save lives by giving our men better clothing."

Senator Hoover was to return for questioning by Senator Reed concerning the food administrator's motives in sending a copy of his recent sugar statement to President Wilson. Reed wishes to learn why the country was given the impression that Hoover had to go to the president to get his statement before the public after Reed's committee had refused to accept it.

Myer Bloomfield, New York sociologist, will continue his testimony before the shipping investigators on housing conditions in shipbuilding communities, and plans being worked out to improve it.

The railroad investigation will be resumed Monday with railroad presidents on the stand at their own request.
