Movies Four Times a Week.

Miss Clara Libby has received the following letter from her brother, A. L. Libby, who is with the aviation corps stationed at San Diego:

"Dear Sister—Thought I would write and let you know that I was still alive even if I am in the navy. They certainly treat us boys fine. There is all kinds of fun all the time and one continual round of pleasure. I was in quarantine eight days. They are supposed to keep every one under quarantine 21 days after they come here to make sure that there is nothing the matter with them, but they only kept me in eight days. I have shore leave three times a week. That is all any of us get. So you see that we have some time off. I am in the aviation corps. I was put on mess duty today. We have movie shows four times a week at the Y. M. C. A. It's all free to us boys. There is a boxing match on the plaza tonight.

We had a fine Christmas, all kinds of races going on all day. There is about 2000 men here at present and we expect a thousand or more in a few weeks. I will not get home for six or seven months yet. I have to go to school for a while. Don't you hear the hand? It is just outside the door. Will close this time. Write soon, Bro.

In France, But Don't Know About War Mrs. H. C. Tarpley, of 739 North Liberty street, has received the following letter from her son, D. W. Tarpley, who is with Company F, 10th U. S. Engineers in France:

"Dear Mother—I received your letter of October 11th today and am glad to know that you are well. As for myself, I am truthfully say I never enjoyed better health. Well, I have been in France over two months now. We do not know anything more about the war here than you do. In fact, we do not get as much news from the various fronts as you do.

"I would like to have been home Thanksgiving but we had a good turkey dinner here. The weather is cold here now but we have plenty of warm clothes and blankets so do not send anything in that line. I got the tobacco Louis sent me but not yours. We have plenty but the French supply is low. I got a letter from Baz saying Bob Ankney and Claude were home for a few days.

"It is hard to write when one can't say what they would like to. I will write soon again. With love to all,

Willamette Valley Farmers Are Active

Portland, Or., Jan. 5.—In a recent trip concluded by M. A. Blanchard, agriculturist, Live Stock Bank, North Portland, Oregon, through the Willamette valley and southern Oregon, he reported very interesting activity among the farmers at every place. Especially in this apparent in the livestock movement, which seems to be slightly on the increase. Two years ago when hogs were in such desperate straits that there was a wholesale going out of the hog business, but now Mr. Blanchard reports that farmers are gradually stocking up on swine, especially the small farmer, who is attempting to keep just enough to take care of the waste on the farm.

The efforts of the food administration and the department of agriculture seem to have taken firm hold in a great many instances. The bankers generally in this country are encouraging the raising of sheep. Oregon now stands seventh rating in sheep production and while it is impossible to increase the number of sheep in the eastern sections in the range country, western Oregon can easily support one-half again as many sheep, which would bring the

It seems that the southern Oregon farmers are now appreciating the value of diversified farming. "The bankers in Central Point, Medford and Ashland," said Mr. Blanchard, "told me that in the last two years approximately 20,000 acres of orchards have been pulled up and the ground planted to alfalfa and used for general farming purposes." While it is true that much of this land never was apple land, a tendency towards a balanced farming in which some live stock and feed are grown, together with cash crops, seems to be evident everywhere.

"The bankers are to be congratulated," remarked the agriculturist, "in their patriotic efforts in the nation's present need, and especially in their desire to assist the farmers of the country on a broader plane than has ever been done before."
