PASSENGER TRAFFIC WILL BE CURTAILED

Locomotives Are Needed To Facilitate Movement of Freight Trains

Washington, Jan. 5.—A general order curtailing unnecessary passenger traffic to liberate additional locomotives and trackage for freight movements was expected from the railroad administration today.

The order will be the first step of a broad campaign to discourage unnecessary travel. Fewer passenger trains, less commodious accommodations, elimination of "luxury services" and, possibly, higher fares, Director General McAdoo believes, will take much of the joy out of sight seeing jaunts.

Large passenger fare increases after the British plan are understood to be under consideration as a last resort.

Selection of the four men of the wage board which will probe for McAdoo the justice of railroad brotherhood wage demands also was under way. Interstate Commerce Commissioner Woolley was reported as a probable choice for one of the posts.

Increases granted, McAdoo stated, will be operative from January 1, 1918. Meantime, moderating weather thru-out the east added in slanting of the freight congestion. Jams in big cities and junction points were rapidly melting away, while coal for freezing New England moved in added volume of 500 cars a day.

Federal operation of express companies appeared ahead as the next possibility. Express company terminals admittedly are as badly congested as railroads and retard the desired free movement of freight. There was believed to be no immediate prospects, however, of government seizure.

CAN MARION COUNTY RAISE NEEDED SUM?

Assyrian Relief Committee Sets Mark at Fifteen Thousand Dollars

Can Marion county give \$15,000 for the relief of the outcast millions of Armenia Syria and western Asia? Is it "too much to ask?"

The amount of money needed has been apportioned on a purely mathematical per capita basis to more than 23,000 cities, towns and villages in the United States. It is natural that the apportionment to the individual cities should seem "altogether too large," "wide of the mark," "impossible."

The point is however that if absolutely every one of the 23,000 cities, towns and villages were to pay the apportionment in the call the committee would have considerably less than ten cents per capita with which to feed, clothe, shelter and protect the homeless helpless refugees and other defenseless non-combatants who are dependent upon the committee.

So the question, "Is the apportionment too large?" resolves itself into the question "Is ten cents a day per capita too large an appropriation for the support of dependent people, exiled from their homes in a land where the price of foodstuffs is much higher than in the United States?"

The national committee can only place upon the local committee in each city, town and village the responsibility for answering this question in the way that seems to them right.

A further consideration is this: Nearly \$50,000 was contributed to the Red Cross war fund during last year; in Salem alone over \$50,000 worth of Liberty bonds were sold, and \$10,000 contributed to the Y. M. C. A. war fund. In the county it is safe to assume that the total of all these amounts will run well over a million. In spite of that (or maybe because of it) the banks of Marion county report more money on deposit January 1, 1918, than one year ago.

The local committee conducting the campaign for Armenian relief desires it thoroughly understood that every dollar will be wholly to relief. All campaign expenses will be met by special contributions given expressly for that purpose.

This arrangement is the result of definite plans originating at New York headquarters as a result of much experience and expert advice.

Salem Gas Plant Product Above Standard

Fred A. Raach, utilities engineer with the Public service commission made an unexpected visit to the Salem Gas company's plant this morning for the purpose of testing the quality of gas furnished. He found the quality above the standard required, and that Salem was getting gas of superior quality. He also found the company had a liberal supply of coal and will be able to keep running for some time with it.

Further purchases. The company realizing there might be a shortage of coal bought wherever it could, and stocked up. On this account the quality of coal varies, and of course the quality of gas is bound to vary more or less with it. Mr. Raach says the company makes daily tests of its gas and is able in changing conditions to correct any variations to a certain degree, but that this is a thing that cannot be absolutely regulated. He thinks Salem is fortunate in this respect and gives much of the credit to Mr. Stanton who has charge of the plant.

Attorney General Brown replying to an inquiry from Be. G. Boylan, district attorney for Jefferson county, says that the provisions of the law of 1917, chapter 279, which provides that the county court may appoint a roadmaster when it has road work to do, is mandatory, and the appointment must be made.
