Washington, Jan. 10.—The house today rejected 272 to 131 an amendment by Representative Moore providing that the suffrage amendment should be ratified by a convention called for the purpose by the legislature of the various states.

Wall Street Puzzled Over Peace Prospects New York, Jan. 10.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said:

Wall street experiencing considerable difficulty in making up its mind whether President Wilson, Mr. Lloyd-George and Count Hertling have brought peace nearer by their recent utterances as to war aims or whether their statements are, in substance, irreconcilable and tend to prolong the struggle. Yesterday traders still had the courage to some extent, at least, to base their transactions on their opinions, but today there were apparently new and graver doubts since those who subscribe to either view were reluctant to trade at all.

The industrial and railroads lists alike were thin. In the steel group there was pronounced weakness in the Bethlehem A and B issues.

German Newspaper Rejects Wilson's Plan Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—President Wilson's peace program is just as unacceptable to Germany as that of Premier Lloyd-George, the Cologne Volkszeitung declared today.

This is the first German newspaper comment on President Wilson's peace aims addressed to congress to be received here.

Collective List of Aims Paris, Jan. 10.—The Echo of Paris announced today that a "collective list of allied war aims would probably be issued shortly," the exact date to be decided at the meeting of the allied premiers next week.

Paper Says No Peace Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—President Wil-

son's fourteen points will not form a program for peace, and will lead to no peace. He presumes to interfere with the internal affairs of Austria-Hungary, the official North German Gazette declared today.

Yaqui Indians Are Continuing Depredations Nogales, Ariz., Jan. 10.—Yaqui Indians, continuing their depredations in Mexico, murdered eight persons and wounded ten Wednesday in an attack on the village of San Miguel, 35 miles east of Hermosillo, according to reports from there today.

The Yaquis, 100 in number, invaded the town after beating the San Miguel home guard in a sharp battle. Part of the casualties were among the home guard forces.

Thirty automobiles bearing soldiers left Hermosillo in pursuit of the Indians.

AN INSULTING GERMAN. New Haven, Conn., Jan. 10.—New Haven gazed indignantly today on a huge German flag, bearing an insulting legend from Maximilian Von Hoegen, mailed to the general postoffice in the early morning hours.

Von Hoegen was taken from his home here Sunday morning and severely thrashed by a party of masked men for his pro-German utterances.
