State Engineer Lewis Completes Topographic Map

State Engineer Lewis in connection with the U. S. Geological Survey department, has completed a topographic map of the Salem quadrangle. The map, of the Salem quadrangle, the by eighteen miles commencing at a point about four miles north of Salem and extends south to the north of the Little Santiam. Its east line is about the east city limits and its west a mile west of Rickreall and of Monmouth in Polk county. The whole United States is being so mapped the work commencing in 1894, and about 38 per cent of the work is completed. The map while showing towns and rural locations is for the purpose of showing the contour of the country, and it does so in such a way that the character of the country can be told at a glance. This special quadrangle shows the Willamette river for about eighteen miles and gives one a clear idea of the habit

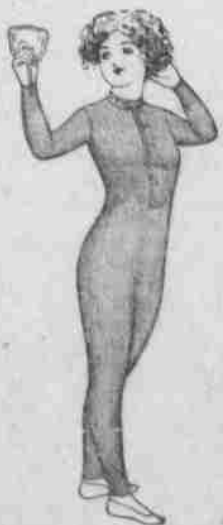

Question of Geography Not of Law, Passed On by the Attorney General

Attorney General Brown had to retire with the first class in geography Saturday when State Veterinarian Lytle passed the question up to him as to the location of Jackson county. The last legislature passed a bill for bidding bulls to run at large in counties east of the Cascade mountains, unless said bulls were pure bloods with recorded pedigrees and a proper standing in bovine society. The object of course was to prevent the deterioration of stock through scrub ancestry on the paternal side of the horse, or perhaps it should be stated in this case, the paternal side of the barn. There is a small section of Jackson county located on the east side of the Cascades, and it was to learn whether this part of the county was to come under the operation of the law restraining the freedom of unpedigreed bulls the question was submitted to the attorney general had a rest from the study of dry legal tomes, delving into statutes passed by an irresponsible gathering of forty day law makers and the weighing of precedents, and I went to studying the pleasing colors of the office map. For once he found something that was not ambiguous, something that did not require legal construction, something in fact that was self evident and convincing. Taking the evidence of the map as conclusive, the attorney general decided Jackson county was not in eastern Oregon and that consequently the act of the legislature did not apply to scrub bulls in that county.

AMERICAN MONEY KINGS MAKE APPEAL

Will Attempt to Induce German Capitalists to Abandon War Party

Washington, Jan. 14.—American money kings propose to make an appeal direct to Germany's business men to scrap militarism and thereby avoid an economic war after the war.

Without threatening the Chamber of Commerce of the United States today has made a referendum of the American money kings to the attention of German commercial interests the danger arising from excessive armament and seek to avoid a post-war trade conflict.

The proposal is part of a campaign begun by President Wilson to compel Germany's liberals to abandon the big war machine.

Many of Germany's big commercial men, particularly shipping interests like Herr Ballin of the Hamburg-American, are understood to be increasingly opposed to the war for fear of loss of war markets.

To reach such groups, the chamber proposes its appeal.

Endorsement of the appeal is expected from a referendum of the 500,000 business men in the chamber and it will have the tacit support of administration leaders.

President Wilson, in his speech to congress December 4, declared that should Germany fail to throw off the yoke of those who deceive her "it might be impossible to admit her to the free economic intercourse which would inevitably spring from a peace partnership of nations after the war."

The chamber resolution says: "Where as we believe the American people will not join in discrimination against German goods after the war if the danger of excessive armament has been removed."

"Resolved, that the chamber urges them (German businessmen) to study this situation and co-operate, to the end that a disastrous economic war may be averted and that lasting peace may be made more certain."

POLITICAL GOSSIP FROM AURORA OBSERVER

Chas. F. Elgin, member of the 1917 house of representatives will not be a candidate for further political honors. He is now traveling auditor for the state industrial accident commission.

Mark Poulson of Silverton is said to have aspiration for the state senate. This is a new name in connection with that office. George Wells is still a name to conjure with as a vote getter, but he is not a known quantity in the senatorial race.

There seems to be no doubt of the candidacy of Sam Brown for the state senate. It is intimated that both the Joneses, W. A. and Seymour—also have their eyes fixed on a seat in the upper chamber. A further rumor says that Alex. La Follette has almost decided to withdraw from the primary race for the senate in favor of Louis Lachmund. In such case the Jones' might find the way to the senate a rough road to travel.

Between that and eating and sleeping one has very little time off for anything. This getting up at four o'clock every morning sure does take the joy out of life. If you enlist and come over here be sure and bring a good supply of tobacco with you, also plenty to eat coming across, for if you come in the same outfit we did, you sure will need it. We are planning on a big time Christmas unless something happens to put a stop to it. Would like to be back there for a few days and know that there would be no bugle calls to answer. If I ever have a wife and any kids I am going to make them stand reveille, retreat and taps every day. I guess that will be the only comeback I will have. Am sure glad I am here though, but hope to be home this time next year."

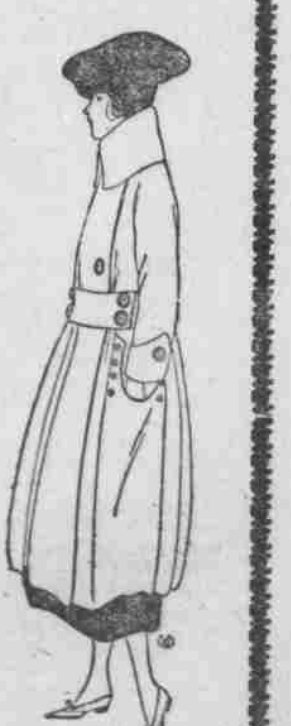
