Few realize perhaps the value of a small quantity of old gold and silver in any form, when put on the credit side of the Red Cross ledger. Recently a saucer of old gold was turned in at the shop which brought in currency, a sum of five dollars.

In nearly every county in Oregon, these instructions are being confirmed with, but they are being re-issued at this time to avoid further misunderstanding.

POCKETS FULL MONEY GERMAN SPY FOUND HANGING TO TREE LIMB

Body That of Mysterious German Seen In Vicinity of Irrigation Dam

Yuma, Ariz., Jan. 15.—Hanging by the neck to a limb of a tree, his hands tied and in his pockets \$1,455 in currency, a deposit certificate showing that he had \$9,437.50 in a bank at Boise, Idaho, and with German literature in his possession, August Matt, a German, was found dead today by two ranchers. Yuma county authorities believe he was a spy.

In his possession were letters written in German, the authors residing at Leaf, Okla., it was said. Authorities in the Oklahoma city were asked to trace the authors.

Logan Smith, a deputy sheriff, identified the body as that of a mysterious German who asked him for information about the Laguna dam, which supplies the valley with water. The German also inquired about the amount of hay and grain in the valley, Smith said. The man came to this section about two weeks ago.

Interest was added to the case today by the arrival of J. P. Dillon, United States marshal for Arizona, who began an investigation. Facts in the case will be forwarded to the department of justice at Washington.

The body was found near Gadsden, four miles from the Mexican border.

Macon, Ga., Jan. 15.—The body of Major Augustus P. Gardner, recently sent from here to Washington, Internment will be in the Arlington national cemetery. He died of pneumonia last night.
