### Portland Man Almost Ends Great War Alone

(By Canadian Press)  
Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 12.—A London cable to Reuter's Ottawa agency says a list of 18 new holders of Victoria crosses were published in today's London Gazette. Seven were Canadians. One of the seven was Infantry Sergeant Harry Mullis of Portland, Or. "Single handed he captured a commanding pill box which was causing heavy casualties to our forces and

holding up the attack," the cable said. "Mullis rushed the snipers' post in front and destroyed a part of the garrison with bombs. Crawling on top of the pill box he shot two machine gunners with his revolver. He then rushed to another entrance and forced the garrison's 10 survivors to surrender. Nothing finer has been done in this war, although rapid fire was directed on him and his clothes were riddled with bullets, he never faltered and not only saved the situation but also many lives. He had already earned the military medal."

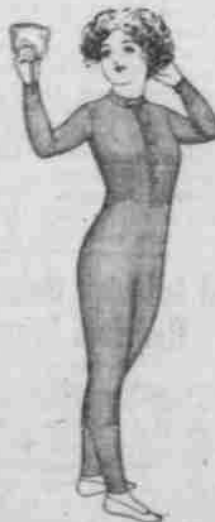

Luxburg Telegrams Aid In Caillaux Case

Washington, Jan. 15.—That the state department, through the secret Luxburg telegrams, furnished France with evidence for the arrest of Former Premier Caillaux was indicated in official papers today. The state department, however, refused comment at this time. It is believed revelations the department may have will later be made public if permission can be secured from the French government. This has been the policy always by Secretary Lansing in similar cases. If Caillaux's misfortune was determined by the fateful messages of Count

### FORMER FRENCH PREMIER

had watched him even here. He warned against the excessive praise bestowed upon him by our papers, especially the New York Times, and desired on the other hand, that the Mediterranean and Morocco agreement should be adversely criticized.

"Our praise injures his position in France. Caillaux's reception here was cool. His report about Brazil had nothing to do with his position in his constituency. He fears Paris and the fate of Jaures. (Signed) Bernstorff."

"Number 202. Naval attaché to admiralty staff. Habana, telegraph.

"Tol, Rio De Janeiro telegraphed steamer Ara Guaya left Buenos Aires January 30th. The captain is carrying important papers. Capture very desirable. Caillaux on board. In case of capture Caillaux should, in an unobtrusive way, be treated with courtesy and consideration. Can you inform our cruiser? (Signed) Bernstorff."

The German censorship order gives the German press on June 6, 1917, said: "For political reasons, it is urgently requested that nothing be written about the former French prime minister, Caillaux, and that his name not be mentioned under any circumstances."

Caillaux, long a storm center in French politics, was arrested this week in Paris as a result of the Bernstorff messages furnished by the state department. At the time it was said incriminating evidence had been found against him in the private vanities of an Italian bank.

Caillaux had been under fire for alleged assistance in propaganda work in Italy and was regarded as an intimate of Bolo Pasha, who dealt in big men and millions for Germany.

The Bernstorff cables constitute the second revelation by the state department of the envoy's direct communication with Berlin in intrigue matters. That these messages constitute a part of the famous Luxburg correspondence is apparent. That America's state department and not England's supplied them to France indicates clearly that the United States alone was responsible for making this haul of damaging evidence against Germany.

Some had thought that the British censor intercepted the Luxburg documents, but it is now considered certain that had they passed them previously they would have notified their ally friends.

This latest chapter in German intrigue shows Bernstorff and other Teuton diplomats to have played for big stakes—the former premier of France, while other documents show Bernstorff in the role of an attempted corrupter of the American congress.

### Lieutenant Sporemann Only Technical Violator

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 15.—Following a thorough examination of the papers and effects of Walter Sporemann, today, United States District Attorney Samuel K. Dennis declared that he had no evidence that the man under arrest as a suspected spy was guilty of anything more serious than violating the provisions of the president's proclamation concerning the movements of enemy aliens. If the naval intelligence bureau agents have no more evidence, the man will be released.

The authorities have had Bremer under observation since he was detected making military notes on a book-mark in a bible. He enlisted in New York and was transferred to Sparta, Wis. He is said to have admitted that he was a German woman and escaped from Buenos Aires.

### Is Only Insane

San Francisco, Jan. 16.—Despite admissions by Mrs. Elizabeth Gaisport, recently arrested at Hartford, that she is a German agent, federal officials who have examined her today declared their belief that she is not. They are convinced that she is not entirely sound mentally. She will probably be released.

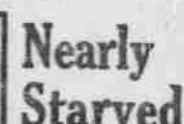
