CHAIRMAN WILLARD QUITS WAR BOARD

It Is Believed He Will Devote
All Future Efforts to
Railroad Matters

Washington, Jan. 16.—Chairman Daniel Willard of the war industries board has resigned his post, President Wilson will accept the resignation, it was officially announced today.

While the reason officially given for Willard's resignation is his presidency of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad demands his entire attention during the present railroad transformation under government control, his friends declare Willard was discouraged with the manner in which war work was being conducted.

He requested his release as chairman of the war industries board shortly after testifying before the senate military committee that lack of preparation delayed the government's war work early after the war with the Germans began and lack of co-ordination in the war government has delayed the work since. He favored a directing head with full responsibility in supplying the army and navy.

Trotzky Is Leader
Amsterdam, Jan. 16.—Frank belief that Foreign Minister Trotsky "reveals intellectual superiority over the Central Powers' delegates" was expressed in the Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung today, according to dispatches received here today.

"Deliberations now in progress in Berlin" the newspaper declared, "will declare whether Brest-Litovsk will end in a victory for Germany or for the clever advocate, Trotsky."

Count Von Reventlow, in the Tages Zeitung remarked bitterly that the discussion "would decide whether the majority's desire for peace would succeed in ruining Germany's future."

Shoots at Lenine.
Petrograd, Jan. 16.—Four revolver shots were fired at Nicholas Lenine of the Bolshevik government Monday when he was returning home from witnessing the departure of Red Guards for the front. Lenine was unhurt. All four shots went wild of their mark.

A Swiss socialist who was accompanying Lenine to his home after the review of the departing Red Guards Monday was wounded slightly in the hand by one of the would-be assassin's bullets.

Instructions Unchanged.
Amsterdam, Jan. 16.—There has been no change in instructions sent Foreign Minister Kuchmann, declared Under Foreign Minister Von Dem Basseche to the main committee of the reichstag today, answering questions concerning the Russo-German peace negotiations. Berlin dispatches said Von Dem Basseche prefaces his announcement with the declaration that he spoke on behalf of the chancellor in his statement.

Minister Released.
Petrograd, Jan. 16.—Release of M. Diamandis, Rumanian minister, arrested by the Bolsheviks and ordered confined in St. Peter and Paul Fortress, was ordered by Nicholas Lenine today. His action followed receipt of formal protest by the entire Petrograd diplomatic corps, who held a meeting in the American embassy.

DR. CONWELL SPEAKS

American classic and has been delivered more times than any other single address ever given from a lecture platform. He is a prominent educator, a statesman, a lawyer, and the recognized peer of all American lecturers. He stated last evening that after giving this lecture 45 years, he had then dedicated all proceeds from it to helping poor boys through college, and that since then, which was 13 years ago, the lecture had put 320 deserving young men through various colleges of the country.

"Acres of Diamonds" is not a cut and dried, formal discourse. Dr. Conwell never gives it twice exactly alike but makes it fit each particular occasion. Last night he unfolded it and made it fit upon Salem, her citizens, her merchants, her young men and women, as a beautiful, inspiring, jeweled garment.

The address was delivered in a pleasing informal manner and was a curious mixture of quaint truisms and the most modern, psychological business precepts. It savored largely of the present business and commercial age, tempered by the theological and philosophical mind.

To the young man going into business Dr. Conwell says, "Supply a known demand. Find out what that demand is and then supply it."

"What Salem needs more than anything else under heaven," he said, "is manufacturers to send out finished products. You are sending out millions of dollars each year in raw materials which ought to be sent out in finished products and bring that money into Salem."

If all of you 18,000 people in Salem would get together and make an iron clad resolution that you would speak or write no word detrimental to your city but would talk it up and say only good things about it you would have a population of 250,000 before you know it."

"True greatness is recognized by its willingness to humble itself to do little things."

One of the interesting features of the lecture which the speaker recounted was an interview he had with President Lincoln while he was commander of his regiment in the Civil war. He said that when he entered the president's office the latter did not even look up at him for several minutes but kept his mind and whole attention on some papers which he was going over. Then when he had finished them the president looked up with a smile and greeting. "The one principle that made Lincoln great," said the speaker "was this: When Lincoln had a task to perform he put his whole mind and energy into it and held it all there till it was all done."

papers with their propaganda were freely granted entry into Russia. He outlined that some of these urged that the czar be returned to Petrograd, "while the Bolsheviks should take his place in exile."

"I don't represent any government," Hoffman was quoted as declaring in reply, "I represent the German army. I won't discuss policies of the press."

"I am sorry for my inability to understand General Hoffman's position," Trotsky was quoted as replying. "It is only to be explained in the difference of our viewpoints as to the conditions of the armistice. In our belief it cannot limit the expression of opinions of the Russian republic or its government."

Kuchmann's Position.
At this juncture German Foreign Minister Kuchmann interjected that "uninterference in the affairs of Russia was the basic principle of Germany's position, but this was continuable only

provided the arrangement was mutual."

"Inasmuch as our government is deeply internationalistic, we would consider it a great step forward," Trotsky asserted, "if the Germans would consider it possible openly to discuss their opinion regarding the situation in Russia."

Conference Halted.
The discussion of the Russian delegates was halted at this point by Count Czernin's announcement that the order of business was terminated and the conference stood adjourned.

This was on Saturday. Previous to this particular discussion the conference was halted for some length on the question of self-determination of peoples and of the necessity for German withdrawal from territories now occupied by her.

Foreign Minister Kuchmann attempted to hurry up discussion of economies and trade between Russia and Germany. Trotsky held out against such a course "on the ground that such discussion was premature," as long as the conference was sharply divided on the chief points at issue. He declared these barriers were Poland, Lithuania and Courland and German occupation of those territories.

Kuchmann replied that Germany "desired not to lose time."

"I am certain that peace will be concluded," he added.

Kuchmann acquiesced in the Russian demand that a special commission formulate a plan of referendum by which conquered territory might work out its own self determination. He permitted addition of Armenia to this list of territories, declaring "this will not be any serious obstacle."

Trouble With Rumania
Petrograd, Jan. 16.—War on Rumania unless that little nation, within 24 hours releases Russian officers held by her, was threatened in an ultimatum served by the Bolshevik government today.

The exact number of Russian army officers who were recently arrested by Rumanian authorities is not known.

"We are informed that Rumanians surrounded and disarmed the 194 and 49th Russian regiments and arrested a committee of the 195th regiment, also visiting Russian visiting officers.

"Failure to release these persons and failure to punish those responsible within 24 hours will result in our considering relations ruptured and in taking the most energetic military measures."

Relations between Russia and Rumania have been growing increasingly
