Corn Will Rot and Sour If Not Moved Soon
Chicago, Jan. 16.—Corn will rot and sour; serious diminution of food will result and the record crop will be of no avail unless the government is able to move the supply to commercial centers immediately.

B. W. Snow, widely known grain expert branded the situation as the most serious that has faced the country in years. Quick action in moving to commercial centers and artificial drying may save the situation, he said.

"There has been no adequate movement for corn and oats since summer," said Snow. "There is a tremendous supply. Elevators are filled and farmers are holding a heavy stock. For which there is a strong demand."

"The quality of the oats is so high that no damage will result through failure to move the supply but the quality of the corn is the poorest ever known. It is wet and soft. Much still remains unharvested in the field because it is so poor farmers have not dared to put it in the crib. The country would suffer enormous economic losses and a serious diminution of the food supply."

"This corn will rot, and sour and a large per cent will be lost unless gotten to the commercial centers and artificially dried."

Strahorn Makes Dental.
Portland, Or., Jan. 16.—Firm denial of the report that he is contemplating asking the government for financial assistance in building his railroad was made today by Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Oregon, California and Eastern railway. He declares the government is too busy with matters of greater importance and predicts the people of Oregon will do all the financing necessary.

Young Man Cannot Keep From Stealing
Seattle, Wash., Jan. 16.—After having served a year in the Monroe reformatory on an information filed by himself, Paul S. Pattison, former prosecuting attorney of Whitman county, Washington, is being held in the city jail today on charges of having taken two checks from his employer and cashing them.

Pattison, 31 years of age, while prosecuting attorney of Whitman county in 1910, embezzled money entrusted to him. In December, before his term expired, he prepared and filed information charging himself with grand larceny. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to one year in the Monroe reformatory.

Coming to Seattle after serving his term, he obtained employment with a local firm. He is alleged to have opened letters addressed to his employers and abstracted two checks for \$150 each. Pattison has a wife and three children in Spokane.

Alleged Murderer Waives Examination
Chehalis, Wash., Jan. 16.—Waiving the preliminary process of going into the justice court, County Attorney Allen today filed an information with the superior court, charging Oscar R. Main, prominent Napavine citizen, with first degree murder as a result of the death of Fred Swayne, Napavine merchant, found murdered in his grocery last week.

Main's attorney will ask for his client's release on bail not to exceed \$10,000. Main was a close friend of Swayne, and was a pall bearer at the Swayne funeral. He is a brother of Justice Main of the Washington supreme court.
