Commission Requests Shippers To Do Their Part

The public service commission in order to impress on shippers the necessity of assisting in doing away with the car shortage and also to advise them of the penalties for holding cars has issued the statement to Oregon shippers, as follows:

That there may be no question as to the practical application of demurrage charges under Order No. 3 of W. G. McAdoo, director general of railroads of date January 5th, 1918, we would advise shippers that by this commission and will be effective as to all carriers by rail.

How Country's Workers Will Feel Fuel Order

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 17.—Two hundred thousand persons in Minnesota are estimated today to be affected by Fuel Administrator Garfield's closing order. Another 100,000 in other northwestern states, not under the order, will also be affected by shutting down industries east of the Mississippi. Several cities today reported business men meeting to work out reorganization. Generally, firms will obey the order, but many business men considered it false economy.

First Clash Occurs.
Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 17.—The first semblance of a clash with the fuel administration order developed here today when President Otto Falk of the big Allis-Chalmers plant declared he would take no closing action until he heard from the navy department. The plant is making important equipment.

The fuel administration's order affects about 2545 industries in Milwaukee, employing in the aggregate 135,000 wage workers, according to commercial statistics.

Effect At Packing Plant.
Chicago, Jan. 17.—Packing plants at the Chicago Union Stockyards issued an order today closing at once all departments not engaged in the production of perishable foodstuffs. This will include the soap works and fertilizer plants. Other departments will continue to operate unless specifically ordered to close by the fuel administration.

Detroit Will Feel It.
Detroit, Mich., Jan. 17.—Fuel Administrator Garfield's five day factory closing order will affect 230,000 workers in Detroit, costing them \$4,600,000 in wages, according to an estimate of William Stocking, statistician of the board of commerce. The loss in wages through the closing down of plants on Tuesday and Monday will amount to \$920,000.

Steel Plants of Ohio.
Youngstown, Ohio, Jan. 17.—Forty thousand men in the Youngstown steel plants, mostly working on war orders, are affected by Fuel Dictator Garfield's shutdown order. The daily payroll of the men is \$230,000.

In Oregon on or after January 21st, 1918.

The charges applied by this order (after 48-hour free time limit) are \$3 for each additional succeeding day \$1 in excess of that for the preceding day until a maximum charge of \$10 shall be reached on the 8th day of detention beyond free time limit, thereafter to be \$10 per car per day.

A more forceful example of demurrage charges under the director general's order is contained in the following illustration: Suppose a car to have been detained 10 days over free time. The charge will be \$72.00 whereas, under the rules of this commission not effective after January 21, 1918, the charge is \$37.50.

Shippers will recognize that the increase in demurrage charge is for no purpose other than to discourage holding cars longer than is absolutely essential and to encourage shippers to provide more extensive facilities for speedy release of equipment. This commission has pledged its co-operation to the director general and in turn asks the sincere cooperation of all shippers that the intent and purposes of the demurrage order and its consequent beneficial results upon shipping may be obtained and that Oregon may take the lead in this as it has in many other patriotic movements.

Another Alleged Spy Suspect Is Arrested
San Francisco, Jan. 17.—Franz Schlebrugg, said to be the son of the chief justice of Bavaria, was taken into custody here today by federal authorities and is being held for investigation. Letters were said to have been found on his person including one mentioning supplying him with several thousand dollars and offering as much more as he asked for it is declared to have been written by a woman.

Schlebrugg, who is said to be a German count, is held incommunicado. Federal agents expect to make other arrests in connection with the case. Six thousand dollars in cash were found in Schlebrugg's pockets. One letter found there was from a wealthy German widow advising Schlebrugg that he could have \$10,000 more "if needed for the work now being carried on." Another indicates that nine of Schlebrugg's brothers or close relatives have been killed during the war.

MANY OFFICERS SLAIN IN GERMAN MUTINY

Tells How to Stop a Bad Cough

Story In London Newspaper Is Said to Have Come From Basle, Switzerland

London, Jan. 17.—A dispatch printed today by the London Express asserts that thirty-eight officers were recently killed in a mutiny among German naval forces at Kiel.

The Express story was received from Basle, Switzerland. It said a submarine crew was the first group to mutiny being joined by crews of cruisers at the German naval base. Included in the malcontents were several who participated in the first Kiel mutiny last summer.

One cause of the mutiny, it was stated, was the steady decrease in the number of German U-boats which are now on duty in the submarine zone.

Power Ships Sunk.
London, Jan. 17.—Another marked decrease in the sinkings of British merchantmen by mines or submarines in the past week is noted in the report of the admiralty issued tonight.

In this period only six merchantmen of 1000 tons or over were sunk and in addition two merchantmen under 1600 tons and two fishing vessels.

British Raid Succeeds.
London, Jan. 17.—A successful raid by British troops last night in the region north of St. Quentin was reported today by Field Marshal Haig in the noon statement issued by the war department. The enemy's artillery is active in the Ypres sector, it was stated.

Plaintiff Arthur Buchner was given judgment against defendants Elias and Agnes A. Kilen for \$3000 with interest from October 13, 1913, at 5 per cent and \$350 attorney's fees. Plaintiff George Buchner was given judgment against same defendants for \$3,600 with interest from October 13, 1913, at 5 per cent and for \$350 attorney's fees. Plaintiff Minnie Grace was given judgment for \$3,900 with interest from October 7, 1913, with interest from May 23, 1916, at 5 per cent. All these were given judgment for costs which are not yet assessed. Judgment was also given defendant Elmer H. Hobb for \$3600.
