

SOCIETY and CLUBS

WITH society all over the country reflecting more or less the quiet, sane or living, and the somewhat serious, or at least more purposeful attitude toward living, it is interesting to note how social activity in the various cities of the United States is locally affected. Washington, D. C., for instance, where the real business of war centers, is experiencing a very gay season, accompanied by the usual merry winging of debauches, lither and thither, and an eager response to the constant call of opera and theater. A large share of this almost doubled social gaiety is due to the ever changing personnel of the hosts of visitors in the capital city. These strangers within the gates, who include many important personages, on numberless commissions, have only to be announced as the latest arrivals from over there and Washington society hastens to the telephone, date book in hand. Indeed, one of the distinct differences between this season and others of the past is marked by the shortness of the time between the issuing of an invitation and the affair itself. The war-rides even, are congratulating themselves if a hurried call to service allows them a generous leeway of twenty-four hours to throw together a tressau.

"However," according to society in San Francisco, as observed in the columns of the Chronicle, "it is not only in the matter of weddings that the year contains many different scenes. Throughout the country there seems to be a decidedly different viewpoint over the whole social scheme. It is noticeable even in sewing circles and card clubs. The former have in many cases really ceased to exist as sewing circles for the time being, but the same groups of women who have composed them during the last few years now assemble for knitting teas. And as far as the card clubs are concerned, in many of the cities throughout the union, while the game of bridge is still pursued manly, the groups are smaller than heretofore (one table bridge parties are the usual order of the day) and the prizes are almost always eliminated. The sums that would otherwise be spent in this way are used for the Red Cross or the war fund of the Y. M. C. A."

WAR WORK OF Y. W. C. A.

The January number of the association monthly shows how deeply the Y. W. C. A. is interested in the war and how wide a field is covered. A series of vivid letters under the heading "Passed by the Censor," tell of the hardships and conditions surrounding women workers in munition factories of England and France.

The association has penetrated to the capital of the great Russian nation. Three hundred people appeared at the first reception. Russian women were exceedingly impressed. The French associations have some fearful and tremendous problems to face. In one of their meetings the subject of training women for the ministry to fill the pulpits left vacant by the pastors, at the front. Women are filling a larger field each day and the association in its efforts to aid these women merits the financial and moral support of every one. Here are some of the "new openings for women," quoted: "We need the co-operation of all general and extension secretaries in
