Docks and Warehouses Guarded at Portland

Portland, Or., Jan. 19.—Guards, in charge of uniformed police officers, today began duty at all docks, warehouses shipping plants and other war work industries, with orders to keep all persons away who have no business to transact at these places. A warning to the public to keep away from these establishments under penalty of arrest was issued this morning by Mayor Baker.

A conference between city and federal officials yesterday resulted in the patrol arrangement. The reason was not made public, but Baker states the conference disclosed a good and sufficient reason, which he cannot give out.

Many Sheep Killed by Polk County Dogs

(Capital Journal Special Service)
Dallas, Or., Jan. 19.—Reports have been received in Dallas from various sections throughout the county complaining of the large loss of sheep by ranchers from being killed by dogs. Several farmers have lost considerable animals and as the present price of ewes is now something like \$30 per head they think that something should be done to rid the county of sheep-killing dogs. The heaviest losses so far are Charles Rice, King's Valley, 12 head of goats; John Chambers of the same locality, 10 head of sheep; Jap Powell and H. J. Mulkey, of Monmouth 15 and 14 of valuable sheep respectively. An effort is being made to locate the owners of the dogs and if found they will be made to pay for the damage done. Reports from the Rickreall neighborhood and from Smithfield also state that many sheep have been killed in those localities during the past several weeks.

School Directors To Direct Work of Raising Funds for Armenians

Those in charge of raising the funds in this section for the Armenian relief work have adopted a new plan for presenting their appeal to the citizens throughout the county. The directors of the school districts have been invited to take charge of the work, they being acquainted each in his district and in order to give them all a perfect understanding of the cause and its urgent need these directors were invited to attend a meeting at the commercial club at 2 o'clock this afternoon. In response to this invitation a large number were present, practically every district being represented.

Mr. Jackson, division secretary of the northwest for the movement, spoke at some length explaining the character of people we are endeavoring to save from starvation, and from annihilation as a race. His address was profoundly interesting and that its effect will be shown in the returns from the county is certain.

State House News

This leaves the old stock inspectors without their jobs.

Passing upon a question over the bonds of bar pilots the attorney general holds that sureties on official bonds are not responsible for defaults of principals occurring after the expiration of the term covered by the bond, but this does not apply to cases of officers holding over by law, and not succeeding to another term.
