merchandise. The episode had various thrilling sidelights and formed, we thought, just the sort of story to stir American blood. Censorship killed it. The Ambassador was very sympathetic. Agreed that the publication of the news might be a real service at home; that too much mystery about the doings of our fleet might have a bad effect; that it was unfortunate that most of the truthful colorful picture of the war could not be reflected in the newspapers, remarking that future historians might find themselves limited to the dry unlightening official reports. The New York Times man was rather bitter. "The upshot of the censorship policy," he declared, "is that most of the correspondents are writing humorous stuff. People at home are apt to get the impression that either this isn't a serious war or that we are a lot of ghouls who can't see anything but fun in the whole terrible business." The Ambassador was sympathetic, genuinely, without question—but he didn't commit himself to the opinion that the censorship is entirely misguided.

Talked with Admiral Hall at the Admiralty. He was so enthusiastic over yesterday's big advance toward Cambrai that he couldn't get his mind on the navy. They talk about the jealousy between the Navy and the Army, but the Admiral was so proud of the work of the tanks that he insisted on referring to their commander as "The Admiral."

Secretary Baker Replies Saturday

Berlin, via London, Jan. 24.—Capture of six machine guns around the Boesinghshof railway was announced by the war office today.

Generals are Killed

Washington, Jan. 24.—The Austrian general, Von Aur, and the German general, Liebeskind, division commanders, have been killed on the Italian front, Rome cables here said today.

Quantities of war materials were taken by Italian units in raids in the Orle valley it was reported.

Italian prisoners have been transferred to Flanders, where they are forced to work under constant fire of allied artillery.

A number of Sammys were announced today as graduates of a French carrier pigeon school and fully qualified to begin their duties at the front. They will take care of the feathered messengers who are an important auxiliary to the battle planes. Each unit of American troops will hereafter carry pigeon squads. The birds will be used in emergency, for instance, where telephone wires have been put out of commission and rockets exhausted, cutting off communication.

The American carrier pigeon specialists wear a silver embroidered pigeon on the left arm. They will have no other duties than the care of their feathered messengers.

The "specialists" were all chosen from among men who qualified by knowledge of pigeons gained by keeping their birds when they were boys. One native of Sparta, Wis., was found to know more about pigeons than the French instructors, except their use under war time conditions.
