Only one incorporation filed its articles today, and that was the Gold Hill Manganese company with headquarters at Grants Pass. Its capital stock is \$1,000,000 and its object to mine for manganese and other ores and minerals and to mill or reduce the same.

Superintendent Churchill's Thrift Stamp Plan

Owing to the appeal of Secretary McAdoo to have the children save their pennies and buy thrift stamps, Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill a couple of weeks ago sent a letter to the teachers of the state outlining a plan for organizing a "Junior Rainbow Regiment." To be eligible, a boy or girl must be one of the first 1,000 to sell \$50.00 worth of thrift stamps. To each of this thousand an achievement pin is to be sent to be worn during the period of the war. The first reply to this plan was received by Superintendent Churchill this morning, when Adelbert Reed, of Shaniko, Wasco county, sent proof of his having sold the necessary amount to entitle him to a pin. It will be sent him at once.

ROW IN PROSPECT OVER BANK EXAMINER

Governor Withycombe Said to be Determined to Reject Sargent's Suggestion

There is some likelihood of a nice little political row over the appointment of a successor to Superintendent of Banks Sargent. His successor will be named by the board of control, Governor Withycombe, State Treasurer Kay and Secretary of State Olcott. Olcott has already announced his choice, to the extent of expressing a willingness to abide by the judgement of Superintendent Sargent and to vote for the person he selects. Acting on this suggestion Sargent has endorsed his assistant, Mr. Stewart, for the place. Here is where the row may start. Governor Withycombe has not expressed himself, but rumor has it that he is making eyes at E. D. Cusick, banker of Albany, and announced candidate for the nomination for state treasurer. Besides it is understood Stewart is a democrat, and this is an unpopular sin in the eyes of the governor.

Dame Rumor also has it that the Oregonian is backing Cusick for the place and has sent word to such officials as it thought it could influence to get behind Cusick and boost hard. State Treasurer Kay is in the east, and until his return nothing in the way of making the appointment will be done. How he stands on the matter even rumor does not harbor a guess.

In this connection it is pointed out that some time ago when one of the bank examiners resigned, that Superintendent Sargent suggested Mr. Martin of Eugene for the place.

At that time the governor was firm in standing for the principle of promotion, and insisted on the appointment of Mr. Slade, at that time employed in his office. The governor won out on his stand, and it remains to be seen if he has had a change of heart in the present case. As to the selection of Mr. Cusick the point is raised that it would appear to be fair to other persons engaged in banking, for the reason it would give such person an opportunity to discover things which it is not the business of other bankers to know. It would give the Albany bank for instance, should Mr. Cusick be appointed, information as to other banks that they would not have as to each other, and it would place some of the big banks, or rather might so place them, in a position to crush the smaller banks. It is suggested too, that it would tempt the formation of a bank-political machine that would not be beneficial to the state or to business. These are some of the arguments heard in and around the state house, and they are repeated for what they are worth.

Captain Michelson and the ship's steward were held for trial. Both are at liberty pending trial.

Waldport, Or., Jan. 30.—A thriving business possibility was killed by the misadventure of the law today when a crate labelled "hardware" and consigned to the Waldport Hardware company was seized by the sheriff because there is no such firm hereabouts. The "hardware" proved to be five 5-gallon kegs full of hundred proof whiskey.

Liquor on Oregon Express

Portland, Or., Jan. 30.—More than 150 bottles of liquor were taken from a diner on the Oregon Express, a Portland-San Francisco train upon its arrival here recently, it was learned today. The raid was with the sanction of the district attorney, who held that the Southern Pacific was supposed to remove all liquor before entering Oregon. Heretofore the dining crew, after serving liquor in California territory, has kept the liquor under lock and key while in Oregon.

Pitcher in Army

Portland, Or., Jan. 30.—Walter Mails, erratic pitcher is now signed up with an aggregation he can't jump at will. He's in the army at American Lake. Mails, who came to Portland from the Dodgers, was pitching fine ball last year when without warning he left the Dodgers and went to semi-pro baseball in Seattle, declaring Ken Williams and other Beavers kidded him too much.

Grounds for Divorce

Portland, Or., Jan. 30.—While he didn't like having hot water poured on him, nor keenly relished attempts to explore him with a butcher knife, Jim Simons just riled up when his wife pinned a bunch of poison oak inside his nightgown and he relates this incident in a complaint today as grounds for a divorce.

Willamette U. Notes

This afternoon the Willamette university auxiliary of the Red Cross met at the home of Mrs. Ebsen for sewing.

Prof. J. C. Nelson of the Salem high school, spoke to the students this morning at the chapel exercises. He said, "If we can discipline ourselves to avoid moments of depression by turning to something entirely impersonal, we are doing more for ourselves and our country than we can accomplish in any other way."

STRIKE NEWS CONFIRMED

Washington, Jan. 30.—The state department this afternoon announced that it had received "official confirmation" that at least ninety thousand laborers are on strike in Berlin.

Asked if reported conditions in Germany were believed to be "commonplace" state department officials said: "We do not know."

Rome, Jan. 30.—The Russian terroristic committee at Zurich has passed the sentence of death on Nikolai Lenin, Foreign Minister Trotsky, Minister Balabanoff and twenty other Bolsheviks, according to dispatches received here today. The committee is composed of workmen.

Copenhagen, Jan. 30.—A "workers' socialist government for Finland," has been proclaimed, according to dispatches received today from Helsinki.
