Agricultural Appropriation Is Unusually Large

Washington, Feb. 1.—Congress is ready to spend millions to beat the alien enemies of America's food supply. In the great agricultural appropriation bill, which probably will be voted late today in the house, determination to rid the cattle, grain and truck producing belts of insects, ear-

mine animals and disease is found in hundreds of thousands of dollars assigned to ridding feed of its enemies.

To prevent ravages of the foot and mouth disease among cattle, the house placed at the disposal of the secretary of agriculture an emergency fund of \$1,000,000.

To fight hog cholera, tuberculosis among cattle and scabies among the southern cattle, \$1,300,000 was set aside and \$620,420 will be used against cattle ticks.

For the eradication of the pink boll worm and cotton boll weevil, so disastrous to southern cotton, \$1,150,140 was appropriated and the secretary given power to prevent movement of affected cotton from Mexico to the United States.

Eradication of weeds and the development of valuable seeds will cost \$42,180, while \$122,000, was set aside for the fight on the Hessian fly and the chinch bug, arch enemies of the wheat crop.

Emergency funds to prevent the spread of the gypsy and brown tail moths, enemies of nursery stock and to fight forest fires were also provided.

To prevent wild animals from cutting down the number of livestock so greatly, \$250,000 was appropriated. Nearly a million was appropriated for investigations to improve agricultural conditions along the following lines:

Farm management \$231,000; diseases of cotton, potato and truck crops, \$41,800; flax and brown corn production \$241,000; corn rot and silk disease, \$25,000; tobacco production \$32,000; sugar industry \$64,115; poultry and eggs, \$40,000; best methods of road making \$144,000.

Flying Division of Aviation Corps at O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., Feb. 1.—(Special)—At the request of President Kerr a conference of the football men was held Tuesday evening to determine how many especially well qualified players subject to the next draft can be provided for the flying division of the aviation, signal corps U. S. A.

W. A. Jensen explained the purpose of the meeting and read from a letter received by President Kerr from Major E. B. Elveer, of the signal corps, Washington, D. C. A decided demand for aviation service exists among football men, and the service has found that they make the best material. The rules, qualifications and application blanks provided by the signal corps were distributed and explained to each of the men.

Not all the men are yet of draft age and President Kerr authorized Mr. Jensen to say that it is his recommendation that the men under the draft age continue their training in school until they develop the qualities called for as highly as possible and fit themselves in many ways for a better service to the country when they are called. As to the men subject to draft they were advised to consider the matter very carefully and decide for themselves in the light of their several abilities to render highest service. The college administration does not wish to influence these men in their choice.

Those that decide to make application for survey now must secure thorough certificates of good physical condition. It was suggested that letters from the coach, from the president of the college and from some other qualified person, such as dean of the school, etc., would make a satisfactory set of recommendations.

Although the routine work of the college medical adviser, Dr. W. J. Phillips, does not include examination of students for special service, Dr. Phillips has advised President Kerr that he will perform this service free for those wishing to make application for enlistment. This volunteer offer was strongly commended by Mr. Jensen and will be a financial relief to the applicants.

Upon completion of the tests they will be commissioned as second lieutenants. The pay at the start is \$100 per month, quarters and 60 cents a day for rations. As soon as applications are accepted the men are automatically placed in class five, thereby becoming members of the U. S. Military Service. They will report at the National Hotel, Portland.

of miracles, the propaganda of protestant Germany has won over the Roman Catholic church of Spain. Of the hundreds of newspapers in Spain the allies can be sure of only a few—perhaps only four of any influence—two in Barcelona and two in Madrid. Some have been bought outright by the Germans, others are obviously subsidized—some are venomous in their attacks on the allies, others work with ridicule and sarcasm all with the most flagrant misrepresentation.

"Today the power of a prominent paper offered to support the allied cause if he could be guaranteed \$10,000 worth of paper from the United States per month. Yesterday the head waiter of one of the leading hotels called to say he was after the coin and that he would gladly serve the allies if they would pay more than the Germans are paying.

"Easy money" is the word today in Madrid. German efficiency may be great—but German diplomacy consists of buying everything and everybody in sight no matter at what price.

"As to the embargo: Of that the Spanish manufacturer and merchant is mortally afraid. Already it means no gasoline for the automobiles, no coal for heating, poor lighting service, poor train service and the shutting down of some industries. But if Spain gets no cotton, what then? If the great mills of Barcelona shut down, what public. Others say before this happens Spain will do the right thing by the allies and get her cotton, will take action when allied shipping is torpedoed within her territorial waters, will let in one camp the sailors on the various ships in her harbors and officials and sailors who are working in full accord with great skill with the German submarines.

"America must be up and doing in Spain. The officers of the army are organized into juntas. The juntas are taking a hand in national politics. The army is ambitious. Which will carry the day—militarists, who want to be on the winning side, or the commercial Spain, which wants its cotton and its oil and the profits arising from manufacture?"

Government Seeks to Eliminate Strikes

Washington, Feb. 1.—The government moved today to eliminate all strikes in the country during the war.

Secretary of Labor Wilson sent letters to the National Industrial Conference board and the American Federation of Labor requesting that these two bodies appoint representative committees to handle all disputes between employees and employers.

In each case the secretary asked that five of each organization be selected. These five will choose a sixth, who will represent the general public.

This party of twelve men will meet to settle grievances of employers and employees and both factions in the controversy will abide by their decision.

That Germany has resorted to the mailed fist in putting an end to disturbances is regarded by officials here with tremendous interest. The real test of strength of the labor uprising will soon be known, it is believed, if the gauntlet is thrown down between the labor and the military.

While it has been known for some time that desertions from the Austro-German armies—particularly Austro-Hungarian troops—were increasing, the concern of the Teuton officers was not manifest until the secret order, quoted above, found its way through diplomatic channels to this government.

Confinement at hard labor of the Alame-Lorraines on the west front follows on the heels of reported imprisonment of a complete regiment of Czechs in the Austrian army, who were regarded as "unreliable." It is the Czechs, largely, who are fomenting unrest in Austria-Hungary.

German Workmen Fear Imperial Government

New York, Feb. 1.—German workmen in this country were warned they would be punished by the Imperial German government if they did any work for firms making munitions for the allies, was the statement in federal court here today by Walter Uhde. Uhde is one of the thirteen Germans who are on trial on charges of having conspired to bomb ships.

Uhde declared he heard the warning at the Brooklyn Labor Lyceum during meetings there by a German society. He said he met Franz Von Bittor, chief of the Germans now being tried, and the other defendants at that time. Explaining his connection with the al-
