that Secretary of War Baker allowed it to be known that American troops are actually pitted against the Teuton war machine.

Action on a large scale between these forces and the Germans may be expected, it is believed. For psychological reasons it is held likely the Germans would pick out the American sector for operations in an effort to dismay the less experienced troops. No concern is felt here as to the ability of the Pershing men to hold their own when the test comes. A matter of fact it is pointed out, casualty lists of American killed "in action" have been coming in since January 20 and hence it is likely Pershing has been responsible for a front trench line for some time.

Enemy Falls in attack.

Rome, Feb. 1.—Repeated unsuccessful enemy attempts to regain ground lost around Salsorosso culminated yesterday morning in a sudden thrust at dawn, the official statement said today. The attack broke down under fire before it reached the Italian lines.

The Austrian attacks in this vicinity have for their objectives the ejection of our forces from Valbella, the statement declared.

German Attack Broken.

Paris, Feb. 1.—A German attack northeast of Elreux was broken up by French fire, the official communique stated today. Several German prisoners were taken in French raids in the region of Neuport and northwest of Rheims.

Say Italians Repulsed.

Berlin, Feb. 1.—Four strong Italian attacks in the vicinity of Valbella and Coldeosso were broken down, the German official statement declared today.

Raid Beaten Back.

London, Feb. 1.—An attempted enemy raid west of Arleux En Gohelle was repulsed last night and a few German prisoners taken, Field Marshal Haig reported today. There was hostile activity in the neighborhood of Goucaucourt.

publicity may seriously interfere with the plan.

"Ernest J. Chambers, 'Chief press censor for Canada.' 'Office of the chief press censor for Canada, department of the secretary of state, Ottawa, January 19, 1918.'"

"On receipt of this document the Evening Post at once telegraphed to Sir Robert L. Borden, premier of Canada, for an explanation, but Sir Robert declined to make any statement for publication. The Evening Post then approached the United States government. Inquiry at the department of agriculture in Washington elicited the

information that the United States government was not aware of the move. A few months before the United States entered the war, however, Canada sent a general agent to the central and middle west to get farm laborers for western Canada, but as soon as Secretary Houston discovered it, he made a protest to the Canadian government and the campaign was stopped. There is no question but that the department of agriculture will not make inquiry again of the Canadian government and in the end will act vigorously to prevent the loss of American labor so vitally needed just now for the cultivation of our fields.

Throughout the interview, he maintained his usual tone of revolutionary pride and his fond hope that the democracies and peoples of the world ultimately will come to the aid of Russia in her desperate struggle to achieve a democratic peace and reach the road of powerful development.

Read Without Comment

Washington, Feb. 1.—Both President Wilson and Secretary Lansing today read the United Press interview with Leon Trotsky, replying to the Wilson-Lloyd-George war aims speeches.

While no reply was forthcoming from either white house or state department, it is held possible the president, may in the near future, take occasion to answer certain points brought out by Trotsky.

It is obvious, officials declared that Trotsky has not yet appreciated the fact that this country is trying in fullest measure to help in Russia. His reply was received with bitterness in some high official quarters. It was pointed out that Trotsky's vision had been blurred by unfavorable press comment in this country and England despite the fact that the American government has never countenanced such an attitude. The interview emphasizes, it was added, that Lloyd-George committed a blunder in his speech, virtually stating that Russia's future was her own concern now that she has undertaken separate peace with Germany.

It was largely to counteract the influence of this statement that President Wilson shortly afterward addressed congress, declaring this country is determined to help Russia whatever she does.

Man's Land under the very nose of the German. Right under the German barbed wire the soldiers lay and waited three hours.

A German accordion, manipulated by German fingers, wheezed "Fennelbaum". A soldier from one of the Danekas, possessed too much "pep", leaped to his feet and, with fingers snapping, hopped about, keeping time to the music in cabaret fashion. A punch in the ribs from the butt of a rifle, in the hands of a sergeant, silenced him and he was sent back to the trench as punishment.

Tonight a concert was scheduled for the units relieved from trench duty. Mouth organs, violins and concertinas were to make jazz tunes for the benefit of the soldiers, as happily as if they were three thousand miles from the front line trenches instead of three kilometers.
