Dear folks: We have been looking for a letter from you for more than a week. Yesterday we got the package, with the woolen gloves and candy. They were just the fit and are warm. Yesterday we had mustered mounted, the whole regiment. I wished you could see some of the regimental reviews we have. It is a great sight. Did you get the pictures we sent? The ones George had taken alone were good, but the

fellow said I moved in the one I had taken so I'll have to have it taken again. I got a letter from Mr. Stewart this week. It was a cheerful letter. He said I seemed like one of the family or more like one of his own boys, and said if I knew how proud he was and the people in Oregon felt about the boys that had enlisted I would be glad that I had enlisted. He said if I went to France, to shoot the d—m kaiser. We are both well. If we don't hear from you by next week we are going to telegraph and see what the trouble is. We have written two letters since we got one from you. Are any of you sick? If so let us know right away. I am cooking now, started in yesterday noon, so that means I'll get \$38. They have been after me for a month to cook but I just got so I understood the bills and liked them, so I didn't want to cook, and I don't like the mess sergeant, but he has a transfer and will be gone in a week, so I thought it would be a good chance to get in, for the fellow that will be mess sergeant in the other one's place, is a fine fellow. Ma, it must keep you busy knitting for us. It isn't so cold here now, only in the morning. Dad, how is the trapping? It will soon be too late. Well, it is 9 o'clock and three o'clock for me in the morning, it seems like old times again. I am going to try and get George in the kitchen with me after while. Well, write as soon as you get this and let us know what was the reason we didn't hear from you. Will write Sunday afternoon, with love to all.

Little things like plans for paying the government war tax and the annual gabfest have been left out so far. They will have to be decided.

Governor Tener does not doubt that the delivery will come in for some discussion, but he is distinctly of the opinion that no action will be taken against it. SENATOR'S STRENGTH IN PITCHING STAFF

Outside of Slab Artists Team Has No Particular Star Players

New York, Feb. 13.—The Washington American league club, it seems, just can't get started on a road that leads to the top of the heap. Clarke Griffith, manager of the club, had everything all fixed, he thought, for a start toward strength when he negotiated a trade that brought him John Lavan from the Browns, but Lavan up and joined the army and the stuff was off.

The Washington club isn't guilty of harboring a lot of star ball players. The team can play ball, very creditably and Griffith is one of the game's smartest managers, but there are no Cobbs, Speakers, et al, connected with the club. Walter Johnson is the sole blooming star right now, unless one wishes to consider Clyde Milan as still a member of the elect club.

The reserve list for the Washington club shows most of its promising material gobbled up in the demand for men in the army and navy. Mike Mesak, promising a recruit as ever showed in the big leagues, is among those who entered service. Joe Leonard, a hard hitting and clever fielding third baseman, has gone to the colors, and several others not so highly regarded have joined.

The Senators' pitching staff has been about all the club could boast for several years, and Griffith probably is busy thinking fate that his best men for hurling duty have not jumped to the world league. Walter Johnson, Harry Harper, Crain, Craft, and other stars still are held on the Senators' list.

Strength with the Washington club depends almost wholly on the pitching staff. If it holds up the Senators may finish higher than last summer, but there is small hope.

The infield is only passing fair, and the outfield is only fair as an American league aggregation. Clyde Milan is the star of the outer trio and Milan is growing into the veteran class with such speed that it is doubtful if he ever will again have one of his old-time years. Joe Acosta has given promise of developing something, but the Washington club needs a complete renovation before it can again figure in pennant struggles.

OIL MEN WANT BOUT

Chicago, Feb. 13.—Wyoming oil men announced today that only consent of the war department is necessary for a battle at Fort Russell between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey. The syndicate headed by P. Chester Thompson of Cheyenne has offered \$100,000 cash for war charity if allowed to stage the contest.

"That's all I want to do—meet Mr. Willard," said Dempsey today. "I think he is serious about wanting to fight and defend his title. He said a couple of months ago he would give me a chance just as soon as I had shown something. Later Mr. Willard, through Walter Monahan, congratulated me on the showing in some of my fights."

Willard is at his Kansas farm today. Willard could not be reached for confirmation of Thompson's claim that the champion would meet Dempsey. A meeting between the promoters and fighters is being planned.

San Francisco, Feb. 13.—Frank Schuler, local promoter, is fostering a scheme for a 20 round bout between Jess Willard and Fred Fulton to be held at Reno July 4. It is understood that Jess himself is the financial backer of the battle, planning to offer Fulton a substantial amount for the battle. Schuler is now in Reno investigating the situation.

WARDEN CLANTON MUST RETURN MONEY

Count Orders Him to Repay \$1,000 Collected for Confiscated Fishing Trap

A judgment against R. E. Clanton, master fish warden, for \$1000 and in favor of Theodore Siverson, was affirmed by the supreme court today, in an opinion written by Justice Moore. The case was appealed from Clatsop county.

Siverson was caught using a fishing trap out of season. The trap was seized by the master fish warden, who refused to return it to Siverson unless the latter would pay \$1000. This amount was paid by Siverson, who then brought suit to recover the sum. Justice Moore points out that the defendant, while acting in the interest of the fishing industry, undertook to discharge the duties of judge and sheriff, instead of resorting to the mode provided by law for confiscating property.

Washington, Feb. 13.—Billy Sunday has placed Washington in the bush league class on the revival circuit. CHANGES IMMINENT IN ENGLISH CABINET

Military Officials Will Also Be Changed Unless Public Impression Is Wrong

London, Feb. 13.—Rumors were plentiful in London today that ministerial and military changes are imminent.

Following exciting debate in the house of commons yesterday evening, politicians today were contrasting Premier Lloyd George's guarded statements regarding Field Marshal Haig and General Robertson, with Premier Asquith's warm praise of them and Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law's cautious denial that Robertson had resigned as chief of staff, "so far as I know."

Political writers in the press were unanimous that the debates revealed a more hostile attitude toward the government than ever before. While the Chronicle defended Lloyd George editorially, its political writer said: "The temper of the house of commons is appreciably different from only a few days ago. There is a new, challenging note of criticism and a bold disposition to assert authority now preceptible." He suggested the possibility of a ministerial crisis.

The Times editorially defended the government and its political writer said:

"The debaters marked a definite change in the relation of the government and the opposition."

The Telegraph, hitherto a warm supporter of the premier, did not comment editorially. Its political writer, however declared that "the most astonishing and significant event was decidedly damaging to the government."

The Post and News openly attacked the premier disassociated himself from President Wilson's estimate of Foreign Secretary Czernin's speech. Regarding the scenes in commons, the News said:

"The premier went to the house with a harassed expression, leaving his colleagues anxious and dejected on the government bench."
