New York Greek Gets Three French Citations

By W. S. Forrest (United Press Staff Correspondent) With the French Armies in the Field, Jan. 4.—(By Mail).—Nick Korines, 33, today the most honored and most decorated living American volunteer in the famous French Foreign Legion; an unscathed veteran of all the Legion's terrific battles during the past three years and a half, has made up his mind he wants to continue the struggle with the American Army.

Of Greek parents, but born in New York and an American citizen, Korines was seen by New Yorkers selling bananas at the corner of East 23d Street and Avenue B when the great world war began.

There was blood of the ancient Greeks in the veins of the dark haired youth banished for all the wrath of his uncle and all the love of a black-eyed maiden in the Greek colony couldn't stop him from making his way to France where he joined the Foreign Legion in August 1914.

Personally modest and timid but an ardent fighter, the youthful Greek-American has covered himself with glory every time the Legion has passed to the attack. His latest citation, won at Verdun, is a document probably more eulogistic than any honoring an American volunteer in the big war. Here given for the first time, it reads: "Korines (Nick) Legionnaire, 15th company de Marche, Foreign Legion—elite grenadier; 20th August, 1917, won the admiration of all his comrades by his courage and contempt for danger. Led his comrades to the conquest of a trench which was defended with energy and which was captured along a distance of 1,500 yards after several hours of bloody combat; took single handed numerous prisoners; already twice cited in Army Orders."

Starting out in the above attack with his comrades of a bombing squad, Korines saw them all killed or wounded around him. Undaunted even by this, he crawled forward, from shell hole to shell hole, reached the trench, hurled his grenades among the German defenders and forced the remainder to take refuge in a deep dugout. He immediately blocked the entrance so that when

ly blocked the entrance so that when they captured about 100 Germans, survivors of the entire company which had held the position. As the result of this feat the conquest of further trenches was possible.

On the young banann seller's breast, today is the War Cross with several palms and, more important, the much coveted Medaille Militaire.

Now that there is an American army in France, Korines has made formal application for transfer under the American flag.

Prices Were Higher In Wall Street Today

New York, Feb. 13.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: Prices were higher but after the first hour trading turned dull. The opening was active and strong. The steel group made a particularly good showing, especially United States Steel, Carnegie, Bethlehem Steel and Sloss-Sherfield, gaining 1 1/2 points. As common with the general list, however, they receded gradually.

Prices eased further in desultory trading in the last hour. In numerous cases, such as Steel, Marine Preferred, Distillers' Securities and Mexican Petroleum, early gains were quite wiped out. General Motors turned weak. Rails were neglected and only fractionally changed.

Firm Conditions In Livestock Market

North Portland, Feb. 13.—Very firm conditions prevail generally throughout the market at the Portland Union Stock yards for the week's opening market, with especially active trading in the common to medium classes of the cattle department. The shipment was fair for the time of the year, the quality was good, but, generally speaking, showed a smaller percentage of top stuff than was offered one week ago. This perhaps was fortunate, as there does not seem to be the active demand for that type that has prevailed for the past two weeks. Raw, Cold Weather Advantageous to Recruits

By Russ Simonton Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., Feb. 13.—The wet, raw weather, the subject of thousands of soldier letters to home folks for several weeks, is a distinct advantage to the embryo warriors of Camp Lewis, according to Brig. Gen. Eli A. Helmick, representing the inspector general of the United States Army. The similarity between the climate here and in northern France makes Camp Lewis particularly desirable as a training camp, according to the general.

In some camps of the east, the work of training the men has been impeded considerably by extreme cold," said General Helmick. "Although at one camp I visited, men were at target practice despite fifteen below zero and two feet of snow."

Army regulations forbid Helmick discussing results of his investigations at various camps. However, he declares morale and discipline at Camp Lewis is unusually good—and good in all camps. Helmick and Major Walter Reed are particularly noting discipline of the troops and the manner in which they take to instruction. Other instructors will later consider training methods.

RUSH TO JOIN COLORS St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 13.—Opportunity to join the Twentieth engineers, forestry department, ended today. The rush following the recent attack on the Tuscumia to join the unit, of which a part is believed to have been lost in the torpedoing of the transport, filled the quota of 2,000 men and recruiting was stopped upon orders from Washington.
