BRITISH ADVANCE IN PALESTINE AGAIN

General Allenby Within Four Miles of Jericho, Defeating Turks

London, Feb. 21.—General Allenby's forces advanced to within four miles of Jericho yesterday, it was officially announced today. "Despite heavy rainstorms, we have advanced three and a half miles through a difficult country, on a front seven and three quarters miles wide east of Jerusalem," the statement declared. "We advanced our front four miles northeast of Jerusalem."

Jericho, situated 14 miles northeast of Jerusalem, is famed in biblical history for having been taken by Joshua's hosts. The legend says the walls fell after Joshua's forces had marched thirteen times around the city blowing their trumpets.

New Zealanders Raid London, Feb. 21.—A successful raid by New Zealand troops early today in the neighborhood of Polygon wood, in which a few Germans were taken prisoner, was reported today by Field-marshal Haig.

German Spies in France Paris, Feb. 21.—A formidable German spy organization, the object of which was to create insurrections in France, while the German offensive was in full swing, has been discovered in St. Etienne, it was announced today.

Ortic Is Fined London, Feb. 21.—Colonel Repington, military critic of the Morning Post, today was fined \$500 and costs, under the defense of the realm act, for writing an article criticising the Versailles inter-allied conference.

Raids Repulsed Paris, Feb. 21.—Enemy raids were repulsed northwest of Rheims and in the Loivre region, the official communique announced today. The German prisoners taken in the recent Lorraine attack totaled 225.

Orders to Finland Stockholm, Feb. 21.—Copies of newspapers received here from Helsinki state the American consul general there has informed Socialist Minister Tokoi that order in Finland must be restored before America will send food shipments.

WAR BULLETINS With the American Armies in France, Feb. 19.—(Delayed)—The life of a well known officer now with the American forces here was saved by the quick action of his chauffeur, following a wound, it has been learned.

ALL HENS ARE SOLD DECREASE IN SUPPLY

Federal Food Commissioner For Oregon Issues Statement On New Ruling

Portland, Or., Feb. 21.—W. B. Ayer, federal food administrator for Oregon, has issued the following statement, to which he directs the attention of all farmers, poultrymen, wholesale and commission men, and retail dealers who sell supplies to hotels, restaurants or other public eating places, in this state: "The United States Food Administration states that 'every hen which is sold before the first of May represents a food loss to the nation of about 30 eggs. The total loss of eggs represented by the customary selling of hens between February 1 and May 1, is about 12,500,000 dozen. The value of these eggs is about 80 per cent of what a hen is worth, so that this prohibition against the sale of hens and pullets is not a loss to the farmer, but an actual gain. Therefore, no licenses shall, between February 1st and April 30, 1918, purchase, ship, sell or negotiate the sale of any live or freshly-killed hens or pullets. Farmers should not kill them, and people should not buy them."
