## Timber In Roseburg District On Market

Washington, Feb. 22.—Secretary of Interior Lane ordered the sale at public auction of 70,000,000 feet of timber on public lands. It will be sold at the land office at Roseburg, Or., to the highest bidder after public advertisement.

The timber is on a former land grant to the Southern Pacific railroad, forfeited because of failure of the road to live up to conditions of the grant.

The lands, after being stripped of timber, will be sold as homesteads, mineral lands, etc.

An attempted raid on Belgian positions near Mercken was repulsed by artillery and machine guns.

Artillery is Active  
Paris, Feb. 22.—Violent artillery firing over a wide front was reported by the French war office today. The cannonading was particularly violent in the regions of Pinon forest, Chevreux, California, Beller, Hestras, Wellerkopf and Butte Du Monail (where American artillery is stationed). There were no infantry actions.

Russians and Poles in West  
Paris, Feb. 22.—Russian volunteers and Polish legionnaires quartered in the same town entrained for the front today, headed by a military band. Their attitude toward each other was harmonious.

German Recruits Mutiny  
Amsterdam, Feb. 22.—German recruits in a camp at Beverloo, Belgium, (thirty miles east of Brussels), mutinied and shot several officers after one of the latter had sabred a soldier. It was reported from the frontier today. A number of the mutineers are said to have been court martialed and shot.

## Two Million and Half First Line Draft Reserve

Washington, Feb. 22.—Nearly 2,500,000 perfectly fit men will form America's first line of draft reserves, Provost Marshal General Crowder's office has estimated.

This represents the approximate number of draft registrants of class one that will be found fit for military duty as a result of the questionnaire system. It is about 500,000 more than the original estimates of General Crowder.

Although exact figures are not yet available, officials stated the total number of class one men will be approximately 3,115,000. The percentage of physical disqualification is estimated at not more than 20 per cent and probably less because of the recent lowering of physical requirements. The percentage of twenty per cent would mean that about 620,000 would be rejected, thus bringing the number of available men down to 2,495,000.

In classes four and two about four millions have been placed, practically equal numbers being in each division. These classes are largely made up of married men and those with dependents. Class five will have about a million because those physically rejected from class one will be classed there. About 750,000 will be found in class three.

simply been to leave more of these meats for the other six days, saving beef and pork.

"The next sixty days will be the most critical period in our food history."

"On February 1, less than 50 per cent of corn, less than 80 per cent of oats and less than 60 per cent of potatoes have been moved from farms."

"The least amount of grain that must be loaded for the next 60 days is 8,000,000 bushels per day and we have not yet attained that. Less than this will solve neither the allied nor our domestic situation."

Hoover said potatoes are spoiling on growers' hands. Only 28,000 carloads, he said, were moved by February 1, about half the normal movement.

Price conditions are seriously disturbed by the stricture in the flow of distribution, Hoover explained.

Serious food shortages are faced by many sections of the country. In fact, should further severe weather stop transportation, some districts might be faced with danger of actual starvation, it is feared.

Movement of food from farms to terminal markets is poor and this has made it impossible to transport necessary foodstuffs for the allied to the seaboard.

"No solution exists but a continued expansion of the efforts of the railway administration in the movement of foodstuffs in every direction to the exclusion of much commerce of the country," Hoover declared in seeking a remedy for the situation.

"The situation calls for quick loading of cars, loading them to capacity and emptying them quickly and in every way reducing the tax on the railways. Co-operation can be given by reduction in consumption of foodstuffs by the consumption of home and local stores to the exclusion so far as may be of transported articles."

bill the clause authorizing the president to set aside laws conflicting with any order he deemed necessary to make.

This marked the administration's third victory for the day on the bill. In an earlier skirmish administration forces succeeded in retaining the provision that the president may initiate rates, subject to review by the interstate commerce commission. Sterling, South Dakota, sought to substitute for this a paragraph retaining complete control of rate fixing for the interstate commerce commission.

The debate on the Smith and Hitchcock amendments were spirited. Hitchcock insisted that the clause in the bill which provides that railroads while under federal control shall be subject to all laws not inconsistent with any order issued by the president should be amended so that it would read "any order issued by the president and authorized by law."

Senator Robinson, Arkansas, insisted that this and Smith's amendment would absolutely nullify federal control.

"It is necessary that the president have power to set aside laws which hamper railroads," said Robinson. "This is the whole purpose of federal control."

Senator Reed, Missouri, declared the bill amply provided all authority the president needs without conferring on him the right to set aside laws made by congress.

"If we do this, then it is nonsense for us to sit here and enact laws that are to be set aside so easily," said Reed.

The twenty-five senators who voted to curtail the president's power were: Cummins, Dillingham, Gore, Gronna, Hardwick, Hitchcock, Hollis, Johnson of California; Jones, Washington; Kenyon, Kirby, Lodge, McChumber, Norris, Pittman, Reed, Smith, of Georgia; Sutherland, Thomas, Vanderman and Warren.

Hopes for passing the railroad bill in the house this week vanished today when the democratic and republican leaders admitted that a host of amendments are waiting until a general debate on the measure ends today.

It will take 72 hours to dispose of all the amendments. Representative Leavort declared, after Chairman Sims gave notice that tomorrow he would ask unanimous consent that the house remain in session until all amendments have been considered.

It is assured that Sims' unanimous consent request will not be granted. The senate, however, upset the administration policy toward the country's competitive short line railroads. On the ground that the small lines must be protected and saved from insolvency, the senate adopted the Cummins amendment putting all the short lines under federal control and guaranteeing them compensation on the same basis as big systems.

The vote was 53 to 14.

Against Permanent Control  
Washington, Feb. 22.—For the second time in two days, the senate this afternoon refused to change the period of government control provided in the railroad control bill. By a vote of 47 to 28, it rejected Senator Lodge's

## Another "Decisive" Battle Reported In Mexico

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 22.—Federal troops commanded by General Mugua and 5000 bandits led by Francisco Villa are today engaged in what is expected to be a decisive battle for control of the state of Chihuahua, according to reports reaching here.

General Mugua is reported to have summoned all troops from the capital garrison and to have pressed civilians into the fight in a determined effort to rout the Villistas.

The bandits are said to be well equipped. Late dispatches declared the government troops are short of ammunition.
