traffic started with Governor Withycombe, and has the backing of the railroad heads, as well as of state officials. Many thousands men habitually make it a practice to save car fare by "hobnobbing" their way, this is not only causing a loss to the companies, but is responsible for much loss of life.

Two more Oregon republicans have notified the secretary of state of their intention to be candidates at the coming election. W. G. Trill, of Fossil, would like to be district attorney of Wheeler county and has a slogan, "A Strict enforcement of all Statutes Without Prejudice or Favor." Z. J. Riggs of Salem will be a candidate for representative in the legislative assembly in the First district. His slogan is "A Dollar's Worth for Every Dollar Spent."

Topographical sheets are now available for the area between Portland, Hillsboro and Seaside, and between Salem and Monmouth, according to John H. Lewis, state engineer. Each covers an area of about 200 square miles, and has been prepared by the state and the United States geological survey in co-operation. The sheets are of value to those interested in drainage, timber real estate, or other development projects.

Attorney General George M. Brown is in Portland today in connection with the case of the City of Portland versus the public service commission, being heard in the courts there. The action is to vacate the ruling made by the commission granting the street railway company of Portland permission to increase the fare to six cents, it being held by the city officials that the commission had

no jurisdiction in the matter.

The state fair board is meeting in Portland today to complete the contract for the construction of the coliseum at the fair grounds.

Articles of incorporation were filed today by The Henry Gerlick Tie and Elevator company, of Portland, who expects to do a general business in lumbering, and in retailing and wholesaling ties and lumber. The capital stock for the company is \$30,000.

A certificate of the increase of the capital stock of the Eastern Hide and Junk company of Portland from \$2,000 to \$7,500 was filed today at the state house.

Under the firm name of C. O. and C. M. Dawson, Tillamook city people are associated in a firm to engage in a general merchandise business, according to the articles of incorporation filed today. The principal place of business is Tillamook City, and the capital of the new company is \$9,000.

That a sufficient amount of chrome to supply the needs of the United States can be secured near Grants Pass is the belief of O. S. Blanchard, who stated in a letter received by the Public Utilities commission that if adequate transportation facilities could be secured, 175,000 tons could be produced from Grants Pass. The chrome used by the government is now brought from New Caledonia, and the Grants Pass people see no reason why the ships now used in transporting this to America could not be diverted to the transport service.

State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill is preparing the program for the Inland Empire Teachers association, of which he is president, and which meets in Spokane on April 3d, 4th and 5th. There are over 3000 expected to attend the meeting this year, many Oregon teachers being members.

The Bridal Veil Lumbering company of Portland, has filed notice of an increase of the capital stock from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000.

Portland men have filed articles of incorporation for the Woodburn Mill and Lumber company. The principal place of business is to be in Woodburn, with branches in other Oregon cities, and the capital is given as \$10,000.

The Pacific Fire and Water Proof Paint company has filed articles of incorporation, giving the principal place of business as Portland and the capital as \$25,000. Manufacturing, buying and selling paints and supplies is given as the business of the new company.

Government Completes Case In Hindu Trial

San Francisco, Feb. 27.—Motions to strike from the record of the Hindu plot trial the testimony dealing with the movements of the "mystery ships" Annie Larson and Maverick and for instructed verdicts of acquittal for more than a dozen defendants were expected to mark the opening of the case of the defense in federal court here today.

The government completed its case yesterday with the testimony of P. H. Schuler of the schooner Annie Larson, Captain Schuler, telling of the vessel's cruise from the time it left San Diego until it was seized at Gray's Harbor by the government.

Witness fees amounting to nearly \$15,000 have been paid by the government since the prosecution began. It is estimated that other expenses will run the cost to the government so far to \$25,000. What the defense's presentation of the case will cost is problematical.

The trial has now been in progress 46 days. Although the defense seeks to subpoena William J. Bryan, Secretary of State Lansing, Postmaster General Barlow, Rabindranath Tagore and other prominent men, it is believed but few will be brought here.

Search for Attorney

Portland, Or., Feb. 27.—A nation-wide search started today for John B. Hughes former Portland attorney, following his indictment on charges of forging the name of Mrs. Caroline L. Axtell, of Seattle to notes and mortgages, and realizing approximately \$500,000, therefore, Hughes disappeared several weeks ago, leaving his wife and children unprotected for.

Legislature Will Try District Judge Crum

Helena, Mont. Feb. 27.—March 20, the Montana senate will sit as a court of impeachment in the case of District Judge Charles L. Crum of Forsythe, it was decided today, following impeachment of Crum by the house of representatives. Crum is charged with unpatriotic utterances and action including justification of the Lusitania sinking. A number of witnesses will be subpoenaed by both sides to appear at the senate hearing.

Both the house and senate adjourned today after a special session enacting war relief measures. The house adjourned sine die and the senate adjourned until March.

Degenerate Son of Distinguished Father

Chicago, Feb. 27.—Paul Asbury Porter, of Mount Pleasant, Iowa, is in a hospital here, expected to die from gunshot wounds inflicted by a police officer. Porter shot and killed Detective James Shea, when he and Detective Arthur W. Johnson, attempted to arrest Porter for passing a worthless check. The injured man was identified by his father, E. B. Porter, an insurance broker of Mount Pleasant. He is a nephew of Claude Porter, candidate for governor of Iowa in 1908.
