from the front to the rear. "Everybody stuck in the dugouts. Later, I came out of the dugout and I guess I took off my mask too quick. The gas hadn't cleared and here I am. "Our boys behaved fine, though. There wasn't a sign of flinching. The next time it will be our turn to get the boche."

"It was tough that our artillery didn't get our signal for a barrage," the private continued. "It might at least have headed off the second gas attack. Our wires, being cut, however, prevented this. There was no time to send up a rocket until the hell of the attack. When the barrage did come it was a pipkin, but it was too late. "There was neither noise nor confusion in the trenches, despite the fact that such stuff was new to everybody there. The only noise was a wild scream."

from the man who ran from the dugout. I will never forget the scream. "My tin hat saved me. It has a bad dent in it where a shell fragment struck."

There is a spirit of retaliation everywhere. The front line trench, from which the gas attack came, was definitely located yesterday, also a cleverly camouflaged trench, where there are other minefields being erected. The artillery has advised pounding them with heavy artillery Thursday.

Poor visibility, due to a mist and rain, prevented any great artillery fire Wednesday. American guns are still laboring under a handicap, owing to lack of sufficient observation. There are no American airplanes here and the number the French have supplied is inadequate. Four German planes flew leisurely over an important village Tuesday, made observations at their pleasure and then went away before French planes arose to give chase. German planes continually fly across the American lines.

The United Press later learned the finish of the private's story regarding the man running down the trench delirious with pain and suffocation. He ran backfired through the communicating trenches across fields and roads to a village more than a mile away. There he dropped unconscious. He is believed to be among the dead.

The official casualties announced are the same as the United Press figures Wednesday. One additional gas victim was brought in late Wednesday.

But two of those in the hospital will probably die. They have only a fighting chance. The others are expected to recover. An Idaho private was the only one able to talk. His case was slight, but his story was interrupted repeatedly by heavy coughing, which passed as he said "dopey land."

from this year crop, providing a contract for the coming four years is signed. The arrangements as to price for taking this year's crops have not been completed yet however.

The factory will be completed in time for the 1918 crop it was stated, unless a delay is experienced in securing the necessary machinery. This delayed the completion of the plant operated by the company at Beaver-ton, the government taking over part of the machinery ordered for government work. The cost of the factory equipment and grounds will be around \$60,000, and from 10 to 15 men will be employed.

Hobenzollern leaders of the effect upon the Germans and Austro-Hungarian peoples of further ruthlessness against the Russian revolutionaries. The Bolsheviks have counted upon the moral force behind their policy of unlimited democracy, as their most potent weapon. It would be an indication of recklessness, such as Von Hindenburg has not previously shown for him to ignore the possibility of the Bolsheviks being ultimately right in this respect.

The situation in Russia has now reached the stage where "moral strategy" by the Russians must be taken into consideration by the Germans. This is something new in warfare. But, so were the Great German siege guns that demolished the old fortifications early in the war and led to trench fighting. The moral element was left out of ac-

recent months and those who have felt peace negotiations were coming soon now believe the only chance lies with Austria, while many think this chance is slim. The general talk is for a fight which will drive reason into the Teuton.

The existing coldness between Berlin and Vienna diplomats may be dated from the Brest-Litovsk differences. The Germans cannot afford to run chances like this often. Von Hindenburg, therefore, must now prepare for the new international weapon of moral influence. An idea can penetrate further than a bullet.

The seventh hundred names were added to the list of the Junior Infantry regiment by State Superintendent Churchill, and the sixth hundred was added only yesterday. It is not thought that the rate of a hundred a day will be maintained, but good results are expected in the next few weeks. Reports from over the state show that great interest is being shown in the schools, and the sale of stamps is being pushed as fast as is possible.

The form for an initiative petition for a bill to protect salmon was approved today by Secretary of State Olcott. The movement is backed by E. Walters of Oregon City, and would prevent, after 1919, the use of wheels, traps, or seines in salmon fishing in Oregon.

Articles of incorporation were filed today by the Hood River Cigar company, who will manufacture cigars at Hood River, and by the Jordan Elevator company, which will build and operate grain elevators, and do a general business in farm produce.

According to a letter received by State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle from Fred Okey of Harney county, a plot to kill dairy cattle in central Oregon may have been discovered. According to the letter three cows died on the same night, and an investigation of the contents of their stomachs discov-
