BRITISH LOSSES LIGHT DURING PAST MONTH REPORT TODAY SHOWS

Smallest Number In Killed and Wounded in February Since Last Winter.

London, Feb. 28.—The British losses during February were the smallest since last winter, according to figures compiled today. In the month just passed they totalled only 19,492.

The casualties were divided as follows: Killed: Officers, 219; men, 4,323; total, 4,542. Wounded: Officers, 411; men, 10,982; total, 11,393. Missing: Officers, 94; men, 3,463; total, 3,557.

Total officers lost, 724; total men lost, 18,768. Grand total lost, 19,492. The total casualty figures for the past few months have been:

January, 74,038. December, 80,034. November, 120,679. October, 83,558. September, 105,430. August, 69,473.

British Troops Raid.

London, Feb. 28.—At Greenland Hill, north of the Scarpe, British troops in a successful raid during the night captured twelve Germans and a machine gun. Field Marshal Haig reported today.

British raiders in Houthulst forest brought back twelve prisoners and three machine guns. The enemy's artillery was active near Havencourt wood and south of the Scarpe. During the early part of the night, Haig reported, there was an artillery duel east of Ypres.

Artillery Was Active.

Paris, Feb. 28.—Artillerists were active along the right bank of the Meuse and north of Hill 344, the French official statement said today.

French patrols took prisoners around Beaumont, in the Lorraine region.

Austrians Bomb Venice.

Vienna, via London, Feb. 28.—In reprisal for the enemy air raid over the open city of Innsbruck yesterday evening, our airmen bombed military structures in the naval port of Venice, the Austrian war office declared today.

German Fleet Moving.

Copenhagen, Feb. 28.—The German fleet in the Baltic is steaming northward at full speed, presumably toward Finland, dispatches from Berlin declared today.

JAPANESE INTERVENTION

It is estimated that Japan has 600,000 reserves subject to first call to the colors. Rumors have been current of their mobilization but the reports have never been verified. These reserves have had military training under the universal service system of Japan and could be under arms, if they have not already been called, in a few weeks.

Japan's maximum military strength is not known, but it is believed that she could mobilize a combatant force for Asiatic service of 1,500,000. The supply problem would not be difficult, authorities assert. Korea would be used as the main base for the Japanese forces. Munitions and food could be shipped across the Korea in three or four days.

Additional bases could be established in northern Manchuria and China could be relied upon for food and supplies. The difficulties in the matter of transportation of men and supplies would be so great for the Germans it is believed by the allies that much could be accomplished by the Japanese in Siberia with a much smaller force than is necessary for activities of any kind in the west.

Opposition would be encountered in the form of mixed forces of Russian revolutionaries and released German and Austrian prisoners of war, who are known to be mobilized in various localities. On the other hand, the Japanese would be joined by Cosmaek forces in Siberia that have been trying to maintain order and that have sent urgent appeals to the allies to intervene.

Immediate action in the Far East is urged because it is believed that Germany will begin sending arms and supplies to Siberia as soon as she has occupied Petrograd and gained control of the Siberian railway.

"Japan stands ready to do her full duty as the ally of the United States, England and France," was the comment at the Japanese embassy here concerning the latest developments in the Far Eastern situation.

There was a change in sentiment toward the Japanese proposal at the Russian embassy today. It was pointed out that Japanese intervention, with allied cooperation and a complete statement of objectives, would probably meet with general Russian approval at this time.

Topeka Makes Attempt To Clean Up Vice Nests

Topeka, Kans., Feb. 27.—Fifteen women were held without bail in jail here today, the first victims of the cleanup charges following sensational charges of immorality made by Dr. S. J. Crumline, member of the state health board and representative in this territory of the United States surgeon general. Dr. Crumline declared many women, driven from Kansas City by the anti-vice crusaders, have come to this city, and established a Saturday night rendezvous with soldiers from nearby camps. He intimated present conditions in Topeka, unless improved, would result in the city being declared "out of bounds" to soldiers.

Enlistment In Naval Service Is Re-opened

Enlistment in the naval service has been reopened at the U. S. naval training camp, Seattle. Any citizen between 18 and 35 is eligible.

Recruits will receive a thorough course in naval instruction, said course averaging about four months. This camp is regarded by naval officers as having the best all-around combination of advantages of any naval training camp in the country. It is located on the grounds of the University of Washington and fronting on Lakes Washington and Union. All the facilities of the University are available for instruction.

In connection with the station is the U. S. Princeton used for ship training. It is found that men who are trained at this camp have a decided advantage when going to sea by reason of special knowledge gained while under instruction here, and many of them are rapidly promoted.

This camp is now being considerably enlarged. Additional recruits will be taken until the camp is filled up.

Government Seizes All Platinum Supplies

Washington, Feb. 28.—The Government today issued commandeering orders for all platinum supplies in the United States.

At the same time, all gold and silver property needed to increase the production of this vital explosive were ordered under government control.

Distribution of the supplies will be left in the hands of the war industries board, which will act on all requests for the war and navy departments. The government today also moved to take over a number of manufacturing plants in the east needed for rifle and arms manufacture. The commandeering orders were sent out owing to a difference of legal opinion in the war department as to whether the president's "commandeering powers" under the present law technically end at midnight tonight. Until this knot is untied, the government is taking no chances on supplies and plants needed immediately.

Dr. John Hall Defends Leaders of Bolsheviks

That Trotsky and Lenin have not sold Russia to Germany, but have been acting from patriotic, although misguided, motives, is the belief of Dr. John Hall, who addressed an attendance of about 300 last night at the library auditorium on "Great Epochs in the Evolution and Revolution of Russia."

Dr. Hall's talk was one of a series on Russia being given at the library. The principal events of Russian history were traced briefly by Dr. Hall, up to the present revolution, and the events leading to this and the revolution itself was explained more fully. What is in store for Russia in the future is beyond the power of man to guess, Dr. Hall stated, but he believes that opposition to Germany will always exist, even if the present peace plans are carried through.

The next lecture will be given on March 13th, by Mrs. W. D. Carlisle, who will speak on "Russian Experiences."

NON-PARTISAN LEAGUE PRESIDENT ARRESTED

Head of New Political Party Is Charged With Sedition and Disloyalty

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 28.—A. C. Townley, president of the National Non-Partisan League and Joseph Gilbert, manager of that farmers' organization, were arrested at League headquarters here today. A warrant was sworn out by Albert R. Allen, prosecuting attorney of Martin county, charging the two men with "combining to conspire to seditionally teach men not to enlist in the United States army to fight Germany."

Sheriff W. S. Carver, Martin county, who made the arrests, insisted upon taking the men back to Martin county with him. They protested, claiming to have the right to secure bail in the nearest district court. The sheriff, his prisoners and league representatives then went to the state capital to secure a hearing on the matter.

Townley declared there is nothing in the pamphlet, upon which his arrest is based, that is objectionable to the government. He said his arrest was a "deliberate plot," to discredit the league.

"There is hardly a declaration in this pamphlet which has not been publicly endorsed by President Wilson, with the overwhelming approval of the American people," Townley said. "My arrest is simply to supply hostile newspapers with sensational headlines, in their effort to discredit the league. It is a deliberate plot."

Baer's Opinion.

Washington, Feb. 28.—It is just a political plot to break up the league, John M. Baer, Non-Partisan congressman from North Dakota, declared today in referring to the arrest of Non-Partisan League leaders in St. Paul.

May Bring Hood River Berry Pickers to Valley to Care For Fruit Crop

R. C. Paulus, manager of the Salem Fruit Union, returned today from Portland, where he conferred with J. H. Brewer, head of the Federal Farm Labor bureau at Portland. An effort is being made to secure the necessary help for harvesting the berry and cherry crop in Marion county next season and from the present indications much trouble will be had in securing the 10,000 necessary to handle the crop.

Mr. Brewer will address a meeting of the cherry and berry growers of the district in Salem in the near future. The date has not been set, but in all probabilities the meeting will be held a week from next Saturday.

According to Mr. Paulus, the only solution of the matter is in bringing the strawberry pickers from the Hood River district to Salem, at the close of the Hood River season. This is possible, as Mr. Brewer is in charge of the farm labor in the Hood River section.
