UNDER THE CAMOUFLAGE

INTIMATE WAR EXPERIENCES AND OBSERVATIONS OF LOWELL MELLETT (United Press Staff Correspondent)

London, Jan. 11.—(By Mail).—Since I've been in London I've learned a lot about Winston Churchill. I've learned:

That his sun has set never to rise again.

That he's bound to be the next Prime Minister.

That he has the most precocious mind ever bestowed on a youth of 43 years.

That he never has learned how to think.

That submarines would be a thing of the past if he had been returned as first Lord of the Admiralty.

That the British navy would have been a thing of the past if he hadn't been fired.

England's opinions are not exactly unanimous on the subject of the Rt. Hon. Winston, but they are certainly positive. Everybody agrees that whatever he is he is superlatively that.

Wherefore the introductory remark of Ambassador Page—introducing him as principal speaker at the weekly session of the American Luncheon club today—opened up staggering possibilities for the imagination.

"When we consider," said the Ambassador, "that he is only half American we can't help wondering what he would have accomplished had he been wholly American!"

A sandy-haired, eye-browed and complexioned man rose when the cheers and laughter had subsided. His round face looked youthful, but his hair was worn thin as if by hard thinking and his shoulders stooped as though they carried the weight of a century. This stoop is the Munitions Minister's most striking physical characteristic. A yardstick touching both the back of his head and

his shoulders would register an angle of 45 degrees. And yet he looks vigorous and strong.

The speech he delivered, as read in the evening papers, is a profoundly eloquent orator. As heard across the smoke-filled banquet room of the Savoy it was something less. Carefully written orations sometimes are like little folks; they should be seen, not heard. Perhaps this thought occurred to Lord Northcliffe sitting next to the speaker, for he left before Churchill ended, possibly preferring to read the finished article in the press.

If to others this sounds unkind, it won't to Churchill, for it has not been long since he was a journalist and every journalist who has become a statesman will tell you he can't help writing his speeches with a view to how they will sound in print rather than how they will sound when delivered.

At that, being still young, Churchill may yet become a great orator. He has one thing in common with Demosthenes—a lisp. It leads him to say: "English langwiah," and "little shattered statures," but in his case, as in Demosthenes, it can't keep him down.

He will yet be Prime Minister—if his sun hasn't set.

Eight States in Line

Austin, Texas, Mar. 5.—Following ratification by the Texas senate of the federal constitutional prohibition amendment, Texas today is the eighth state to line itself up in favor of a "dry" nation.

The other states are Mississippi, Virginia, Kentucky, South Carolina, North Dakota, Maryland and Montana.

Texas is the third wet state to ratify, the other two being Kentucky and Maryland.
