A decided departure from the customary club program, and one to which the members of the Salem Women's club are looking forward with extraordinary enjoyment, is that to be given under the auspices of the combined Art and Drama classes of the club at their regular meeting Saturday, at the club rooms, when a series of tableaux from one of Euripides' plays, "Iphigenia," will be presented, under the direction of Mrs. Anna Rogers Fish.

A heightened interest is attached to this presentation of classical drama, in consideration of the fact that a recital of Greek plays is taking place in New York City this winter, and proving a refreshing stimulus to the members of the club, somewhat weary with productions of the purely modern. It is sincerely hoped that a like movement will be fostered on the coast, at a time when people are more for less seeking a complete shift from complicated problems and high tension of living, of today. For nowhere can a more satisfying perspective be turned on the pressing demands of the day, than through the pictured annals of the poised and beauty-loving people who inhabited the Greece that has come down to us in song and story.

There will be three sets of tableaux, each set consisting of three players. Preceding the tableaux themselves, Miss Lulla Walton will read extracts from "Iphigenia." Miss Dorothy Pearce will be the piano accompanist for the afternoon.

Norwegians Lose One

Queenstown, Mar. 6.—The Norwegian steamer Havn, separated from her convoy of American destroyers during a gale, was torpedoed and sunk, it was announced here today. Eleven persons perished.

Six of the crew swam to a lifeboat which had been blown from its davits. They were taken in this boat forty hours. One died and the other five were rescued in an exhausted state.

The Havn was a steel steamer of 1150 tons, built in 1908. She was owned by the Havn company of Christiania.

Germans are Superior

London, Mar. 6.—The Germans now have a superiority of sixteen divisions on the west front, General Maurice, director of military intelligence, declared in an interview with the United Press today.

The enemy, however, is still numerically inferior, although this inferiority is steadily decreasing.

Maurice's statement indicates his belief that the allied divisions contain more men than the German divisions. At the start of the war all divisions approximated about 20,000 men.

Net Loss of Ships

London, Mar. 6.—The whole output of ships since the beginning of the war has not been sufficient to replace the losses through submarines, Sir John Ellerman, stockholder in several steamship lines, declared at the annual meeting of the chamber of shipping today.

Lord Inchcape, one of the biggest merchants in the empire, said the people have no conception of the rate of tonnage losses.

Steamer Torpedoed

London, Mar. 6.—The British steamer Kenmare has been submarine, the admiralty announced today. Six persons were saved.

The Kenmare was a steel screw steamer of 1,350 tons, built in 1895 at New Castle. She was registered at Cork by the city of Cork Steam Packet company, limited.

Survivors of Calgarian

Belfast, Ireland, Mar. 6.—Survivors of the submarine steamer Calgarian declared today that 46 minutes elapsed between the firing of the first and second torpedoes that struck her. The first torpedo did little damage, they said, but the second penetrated the engine room, killing most of the crew in that part of the ship. Many lifeboats were blown to atoms.

Rescue ships "worked magnificently," the survivors said.

REPULSE GERMAN RAID

"We favor a shorter working day," said Meyer, "but it is impossible to put it into effect now. After the war, if necessary, put the plants on an eight hour basis. They'll probably do that themselves."

Carl Meyer and J. G. Condon, attorneys for the employers, replied today to the closing argument Frank P. Walsh delivered for the workers late yesterday. His bitter charges that the employees are "economic slaves denied even the living budget organized charity grants beggars" were answered by the packers' counsel with a defense of the wages paid as compared with other industries.

Walsh's argument was the most scathing arraignment of the packing industry ever heard here. The packers' organized charity and "welfare work among their workers he denounced as "a substitute for the just wage the packers owe their employees."

Employment of women in the killing beds where they also handle the offal of hogs and singe the skins of the still warm carcasses was made the basis of a plea by Walsh to Arbitrator Aischuler to "forbid such work by women for the profit of any other human being."

Walsh related new chapters in the story of what occurred in Washington prior to the packers' agreement to arbitrate, declaring they were threatened with government ownership. But what finally broke down their opposition, according to Walsh was the action of President John Fitzpatrick of the Chicago Federation of Labor walking up to J. Ogden Armour in the secretary of labor's office and saying:

"Let us be men, Mr. Armour. My name is Fitzpatrick. I know you. And they shook hands."

1 cup corn meal 1 teaspoon salt
1 cup rye flour 1 cup milk
2 tablespoons sugar 1 egg
