New York Democrats Win Sweeping Victory, Giving Congress Control

New York, Mar. 6.—Democratic Representatives have won a sweeping victory in all four congressional districts of New York City where special elections were held to fill all vacancies caused by resignations.

While the election will not change the representation from New York, the four previous members who resigned having been Democrats, it will increase the line-up in the house on the Democratic side just four votes and overturn the present republican majority of one.

The roll call in the house now stands Republicans, 212; Democrats 211; Independents, 6; vacancies, 6. Three of the Independents have been voting with the republicans and three with the democrats.

The republicans made spirited contests in every district, but their showing fell far below their expectations. The biggest surprise was in the 21st congressional district, where the republicans were confident of winning, because of the recent gerrymandering of the district in the interest of the republicans.

The vote by districts was as follows: Seventh—Gayor, republican, 7087; De-laney, democrat, 10,253; Frazer, socialist, 1805; women vote, 7059.

Eighth—Morehouse, republican, 7794; Cleary, democrat, 12,338; Laddock, socialist, 1879; woman vote, 19,011.

Ninth—First District—Boller, republican, 9622; Donovan, democrat, 11,724; Cannon, socialist, 1736; Calvin, progressive, 382; Ransom, independent, 465; woman vote, 9372.

Twentieth—Furlong, republican, 2183; Griffin, democrat, 8331; Deek-man, socialist, 2394; woman vote 5480.

BOYS AND GIRLS OF MARION COUNTY WINS

One Hundred and Forty-Six
Members of Junior Rain-
bow Regiment to Date

The Marion county schools decidedly won "over the top" in the Rainbow Regiment campaign. Figures given out by County School Superintendent Smith today show that 146 Marion county boys and girls passed the \$50 mark in the sale of thrift stamps, and in addition it is probable that the record for the state in individual sales is held by Benjamin Moisan, of Gervais, who has a record of \$287.50.

The Salem schools lead the county in the amount of stamps sold. To date 84 Salem children have passed the mark, and as the second regiment is starting now, it is probable that a larger number will be enrolled in it. Of the county schools, Silverton with 8, and Woodburn with 7, rank first and second.

According to the War Savings committee, the government plans to raise two billion dollars in the United States by the sale of stamps. Of this amount Marion county must raise \$972,000. To date approximately \$50,000 has been sold. This is considered promising by those in charge of the county work, as but little publicity work and advertising has been done.

Starting the 19th of March and lasting until the 23rd, will be Thrift Stamp week, and an effort is to be made over the entire county to promote the sale of stamps. Each school is to see that every home which is represented in a public school buys stamps during the week.

It is announced today that members of the first Rainbow regiment can also become members of the second regiment now being organized by State Superintendent Churchill. The official closing date for the first regiment is March 1st and any member of the first regiment who sell \$50 worth of stamps after March 1st, can become a member of the second regiment.

Pershing Cables New List of Casualties

Washington, Mar. 6.—General Pershing yesterday issued the war department the names of another lieutenant and three more enlisted men killed and five additional men severely wounded on March 1, the day of the German assault on an American trench near Toul. This brought the total casualties of that date thus far reported to 387. In addition to three lieutenants and 17 men dead, one captain, one lieutenant and 16 men severely wounded and 10 men slightly wounded. The men reported as killed were:

First Lieutenant David K. Summer, Jonesboro, Ga., and privates Kente Olson, Stoughton, Wis.; Bruno Sliokow-ah, Joliet, Ill., and Lloyd W. Speitz, Bismark, N. D.

The five men reported severely wounded were: Corporal Oliver D. Dearford, Deatur, Ill., and Privates Roy J. Collins, Petersburg, Ill.; Frank J. Hooks, Ware, Mass.; Giuseppe Fan-elli, 383 Valley street, San Francisco and William Rhoades, Soguel, Cal.

General Pershing also reported that Second Lieutenant John Plennigen, Lynn, Mass., was killed in action February 27, and that three privates of a machine gun battalion were severely wounded February 28. They were: William W. Watertown, Mass.; Roy B. Metcalf, Loudonville, Vt., and Raymond Pence, Indianapolis, Ind.

REDMOND, IRISH LEADER

to antagonize every British government, hoping to force Irish home rule through methods approximating "insurgency." When the war government failed to pass the home rule bill Redmond was

popularly believed to have suffered a broken heart. Yet he refused to join the Sinn Fein movement and was intensely patriotic, almost imperialistic, in his loyalty to the war government.

As a result, his popularity in Ireland waned and recently there had been a movement in his home district to succeed him in parliament.

Redmond did not want absolute independence for Ireland. He desired a government for that country similar to that of the dominion of Canada.

Redmond was born in 1851, the son of W. A. Redmond, member of parliament from Ballypore. He was first elected to parliament from New Ross in 1881. In 1885 he was elected from New Wexford and in 1891 from Waterford. He had visited America several times, generally for the purpose of raising funds to push the home rule movement. His son, William Archer Redmond, was elected to parliament from East Tyrone in 1911.

Redmond's brother, Major William H. K. Redmond, member of parliament from Clare, was killed in action on the west front recently.
