Cannon's Anti-Strike Bill Is Amended

Washington, Mar. 6.—The house late today passed an amendment to the espionage act by Representative Joe Cannon, Illinois, making it a crime to conspire to foment strikes in war plants "with the intent to impeding war work."

The vote was 255 to 61. The amendment was bitterly fought by union labor proponents, although the measure was generally regarded as a blow at I. W. W. efforts to disorganize war plants. Violations would be punished by thirty years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000.

Lord Reading Makes Answer to Chancellor

New York, Mar. 6.—A possible rejoinder to the last speech of the German chancellor was seen today in the following statement of Lord Reading, in his address at the fifteenth annual dinner of the Pilgrims of the United States.

"The British empire is an aggregation of nations with power to rule them selves."

This was considered significant in view of the chancellor's statement that Germany was ready to consider self determination when Britain applied to her colonies.

Lord Reading spoke at length regarding General Smuts, the South African hero, pointing out that this representative of a conquered people now sits in the war council at London, exemplifying Britain's democratic policy.

Merion county fruit growers are liable to experience a little difficulty in securing a low rate on fertilizer from American Lake to Salem. R. C. Paulus, manager of the Salem Fruit Union, believes after a trip to Portland during which he interviewed railroad freight men in regard to lowering the rate.

The rate from Salem to Portland is as low as could be asked, but north of Portland, the rate is much higher. The combined rate brings the cost of shipping the fertilizer to Salem at the high figure. The rate at present is \$3.80 and local men are not disposed to pay this price. The matter is being investigated by the railroad men, and it is possible that an adjustment can be made.

Packers' Employees Will Get Better Wage

Chicago, Mar. 7.—A wage increase for 100,000 packing house employees here was assured when their cause was submitted finally today by Federal Arbitrator Samuel A. Ashbacher. Attorney J. G. Condon, in his closing argument for the packers, stated they are willing to give 25 cents a day increase on the present ten hour work day basis. Attorney Frank P. Walsh, in final rebuttal this morning, pleaded for the employees' full demands of \$1 a day advance and inauguration of the eight hour working day in the industry.

These were practically the only issues remaining for the arbitrator, the packers having agreed to the union's other demands, excepting union recognition.

ed in a raid on a house near the Winter Palace. Six students were shot. German troops, after raiding Rada government forces in the occupation of Kieff, moved toward Zhitomir (100 miles west of Kieff, in Volhynia).

General Petlur, leading a Ukrainian detachment, sought to cut off the Russians from the central provinces. At Konotop (150 miles northeast of Kieff) in the province of Chernigoff, heavy forces of revolutionary troops defeated Petlur, compelling him to retreat. The Germans did not participate in this action.

Ratified Peace Treaty

Petrograd, Mar. 6.—(Night)—The Moscow soviet voted overwhelmingly to ratify the peace treaty with Germany, following a visit from Zinovieff and others. This is accepted as indicating Premier Lenin's "steam roller" may succeed.

This is not the pan-soviet council of workmen, peasants, soldiers and Cossacks called to meet in Moscow, March 12, to pass on ratification of the treaty.

MUD DRYED UP.

By William Philip Sims (United Press Staff Correspondent)

With the British armies in the Field, Mar. 6.—Spring-like sunshine and breezes are aiding in drying the sea of mud along the British west front today.

Air fighting has been resumed and great raids continue, though they have lessened in the past 48 hours. The artillery is busy. The situation is generally unchanged.

German Raid Repulsed.

London, Mar. 7.—A heavy raid under protection of barrage, was directed against British troops near Epheby last night. Field Marshal Haig reported at the war office today. The raid, he said, was completely repulsed.

"South of Bois Grenier," he reported "and east of Poelcapelle, the enemy was equally unsuccessful."

"In the valley of the Scarpe, west of Lens and east of Ypres, the enemy's artillery was active."

"In the Neuve Chapelle sector shortly before dawn there was considerable artillery fire."

Deporting Belgian Boys.

Washington, Mar. 7.—Germany is now deporting boys from Belgium as well as old men, according to Belgian legation information today.

Some children under 13 years are included, while in the Mons district about 300 boys of 14 and 15 years have been sent into Germany. Destruction of industries and carrying away of all rail supplies continues.

All Forced to Fight.

New York, Mar. 7.—The Kaiser now has a regiment of hunchbacks, according to Crittenden Crittenden, aged 18, an American who has returned from studying in Germany. He said today that even one-eyed men were forced to fight.

Violent Bombardment

Paris, Mar. 7.—A violent bombardment occurred in the Rheims region, toward Crunay," the French official communiqué stated today.

"Enemy raids were repulsed in the Champagne and Vosges regions, following heavy artillery fire."

"The region north of Nancy was bombed by enemy aircraft last night."

A German Story.

Berlin, via London, Mar. 6.—"English aviators' bombing" Tureloing killed a great many French inhabitants," the German war office declared today.

"Northwest of Dixmude, our storm troops brought in three officers, 114 men and some machine guns, as the result of an attack on two Belgian farms."

Krylenko Resigns.

Petrograd, Mar. 7.—Ensign Krylenko commander in chief of the Bolshevik army, has resigned on account of the differences with the commissaries regarding political and military questions, the newspaper Nova Yajuzna declared today.

at which the submarine menace will begin to wane. That is the time when ship production will begin to be heavy and by that time destroyer efforts will be improved materially.

However, the months between now and August are destined to be trying. Tonnage is short, compared with the crying need for it to supply the allies to ship our own forces and to keep them supplied.

Once past this period better sailing is ahead. American ship production next year will be well ahead of destruction, according to all estimates.

The only question is "What do the next few months hold in store in the general war situation?" Some idea of the present difficulties is obtained from the fact that in February, the United States shipped 650,000 tons of grain to Europe whereas its goal was 800,000 tons. Conservation here is showing up well for the United States, has shipped 18,000,000 bushels above its normal exportable surplus in the past eight months.

WIN THE WAR BY PREPARING THE LAND SOWING THE SEED AND PRODUCING BIGGER CROPS

ever, General Pershing has jumped back to the eastern end of the line in Lorraine.

Von Hindenburg's uncertainty as to the point of the forthcoming American offensive, is, for the present, hopelessly entangled by this policy of dodging about. From Chavignon, the westernmost point known to have been occupied by American troops, the Lorraine is over 100 miles. There are at least ten possible areas along that line where the American offensive might be concentrated. It is Von Hindenburg's turn to guess.

Germany's enforcement of a conqueror's peace upon Rumania shows that the German military are trying to make not only Rumania, but also Bulgaria subservient to German control. There are strong indications that Bulgaria is not to receive from Rumania that part of Bulgarian territory seized by the Rumanians during the last Balkan war.

The district probably will be made over to Germany instead of Bulgaria. Thus, if the Bulgars eventually receive the Dobruja, they will have the gift from Germany. By this shrewd trick, the Germans hope to bind Bulgaria still closer to them for furtherance of their Mittel-Europa policy.

Orators Meet Friday at Willamette University

The annual state inter-collegiate oratorical contest will be held here Friday night. Every university and college in the state will be represented. The contest comes to Willamette only once in every eight years, so a great deal of interest is being manifested.

Gustav Anderson of Willamette, who is president of the state association, has charge of the contest and all arrangements are completed. A special musical program has been arranged, which will include selections by the Monmouth Normal School Ladies' quartet and the Willamette Ladies' elab. Professor Charles South of Portland, who is violin instructor in the university, will also appear on the program.
