Articles of incorporation were filed today by the Farmers Elevator company of Gwendolyn, Oregon. The company will do a general business in grain, and will erect an elevator at Gwendolyn. Stockholders are to be limited to 10 shares each, according to the papers filed today. The Heights Park Holding company of Portland, has filed a notice of an increase of the capital stock from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

State Engineer Lewis left today for Medford, where he will look over an irrigation project there. He will probably be in southern Oregon for ten days.

In a reply to a question submitted by District Attorney Evans of Portland, Attorney General Brown holds that the terms of office for judges of departments No. 1 and No. 2 of Multnomah county expire the first Monday in January 1921 and not in 1919, thus making no vacancies to be filled at the election this year. The question was unsettled because of legislative changes made last year.

State Highway Engineer Nunn has issued an opinion from Attorney General Brown as to whether the state should pay the contracted price of \$1,000 each for 12 dump carts bought from J. H. Latamie of Portland, and which the Southern Pacific has refused to allow on its tracks as they were found to be in a dangerous condition. The cars were found to be practically unusable, Mr. Nunn stated, and an examination by competent engineers showed that the price agreed on was excessive. The state paid \$2,000 down on the cars originally.

The state highway commission office is displaying a service flag with 38 stars, this being the number of men who have enlisted from that branch of the state forces.

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LARGER ACREAGE OF WINTER WHEAT

Farm Survey Shows Conditions in Oregon Are Highly Favorable

Data taken from the returns of the farm survey blanks show that the state is well prepared for the summer. The shortage of labor has apparently failed to disturb the farmers, and a greatly increased acreage in winter wheat is reported, with a big increase probable in the spring wheat acreage. The decision to draft no more men until after harvest is expected to solve the labor question for a time at least. There are approximately 40,000 farms in the state, and of these from 30,000 to 35,000 are classed as producing farms. The data being received from the return of the blanks is being classified by high school students at the state house this week.

Much more improved and labor saving machinery will be used this year, it is believed. Implement dealers state that heavy orders have been placed for farm tractors and the small two-man harvester combinations. Labor is rather hard to get on the farms even now, and this is in spite of the largest wages ever offered by Oregon farmers. The survey is being made by the federal authorities, who are acting in cooperation with the state labor commission and the Oregon Agricultural college. J. W. Brewer of Portland is in charge of the classification work.

Under the Camouflage

Intimate War Experiences and Observations of Lowell Mellett (United Press staff correspondent)

London, Jan. 17.—(By Mail).—Not a single medical discovery of great importance has been made since the war began, nor has there been a single great innovation in surgical practice. Most people will find this hard to believe, but Dr. George de Swietochowski, of King's College Hospital, the largest and most modern hospital in the kingdom, says it is so.

"The war," he said today, "has proved the value of many recent medical discoveries and of advanced methods of surgery, but it hasn't taught us anything new. Not until the untrodden times of peace will we be able to draw from the war the lessons it has to teach our profession. Now everyone of us is too busy applying the knowledge acquired before the war to undertake any latest research."

This is true, he said, of the German medical men as well as the British. The British have a month-by-month record of the work being done in German hospitals and this record reveals that the German experts have only been able to improve hospital organization and ways of utilizing knowledge already possessed before the war, just as the British have.

"But medical science has proved its value over and over again," said the surgeon. "Nearly all wars of the past have ended not by mutual slaughter, but by disease. Very few wounded survived owing to insufficient knowledge of wound treatment and terrible epidemics sometimes exterminated half or more of the remaining combatants. This can never be said of this war, particularly of the Western Front."

"Inoculation, vaccination and isolation of contagious cases are saving the world's man power to a remarkable degree. And the longer the war lasts the greater reason there is for rearing that the great scourges of the past will reassert themselves. Smallpox, typhoid, cholera, and tetanus, for the most dreaded plagues, are well within our control."

"Wounds are now treated successfully whose dimensions, situation and condition would have baffled the greatest operators of a recent past. Moreover the means employed nowadays are of astonishing simplicity. Absolute cleanliness, complete rest and frequent irrigation of wounds are the principal things. Recovery after a bullet in the heart, a shell fragment in the brain, a machine gun bullet through the neck, is common."

Physicians have had new problems in plenty, most important of which, perhaps, has been the effects of modern warfare on the human nervous system. The indescribable force set free by the latest types of explosives has proved an injurious effect on the nerves of all the nations. It is remarkable that more civilized combatants have been better able to withstand it than the natives of semi-civilized countries.

"Various nerve complaints have been met thus far that are yet to be cleared up. Thus it is still an open question whether some of them are to be regarded as the outcome of an actual damage to the body or whether they are the effect of the horrors of war on the human mind. Cases of miraculous cures are numerous."

"In the days immediately following conclusion of peace there will be opportunities for studying the results achieved. The overwhelming material offered by the war will be of incalculable value to future medical and surgical science."

Seed Corn Shortage May Reduce Acreage

Chicago, Mar. 7.—Waste of thousands of acres in the corn belt was threatened today by a dire shortage of seed corn throughout Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin and Indiana.

The normal corn acreage will be cut one third in Illinois alone and the nation's corn crop greatly curtailed, experts declared, unless immediate relief comes.

State council of defense officials are sponsoring a revolving fund of \$2,000, 000 to buy seed corn for Illinois farmers. Prevalence of "soft" corn in the last crop is responsible for the seed shortage.

Bids for Building Coliseum Withdrawn

As the Siewert-Engstrom company, which had the contract for the first section of the coliseum at the state fair grounds, has withdrawn its bid, it is considered possible that the building will not be started this year. The withdrawal was made because subcontractors for the roofing and the electric lights were not able to handle their end of the work.

There are several courses open to the board. Either the building will not be started this year, new bids may be asked for, the next lowest of the first bids taken, or the board may decide to construct the building itself.

The bid next to that of Siewert and Engstrom, that of W. N. Lawrence of Portland, was approximately \$4000 higher.
