Enriched by the spoils of her drives against the weak nations of the Near East, Germany, it is believed, would be hardly inclined to risk much in morale, men and supplies on a west front drive, when there were still more solid nations, rich fields, etc., to be overrun.

And military men point to the fact that after Salonika—if Germany is successful, she may turn again on Italy before turning to the clash on the west front.

Meantime, however, as Bonar Law pointed out, "the man power of Germany is not inexhaustible" and "they can't do everything with haste as the allies are preparing, for a supreme effort in the west. It is confidently held here that if Germany continues her marauding ex-

Labor Situation Good

Washington, Mar. 8.—The industrial situation in the United States is now in a better state than at any time before the war, the labor department announced today. Today there are only 74 labor disputes and only 17 of these have reached the strike stage. Less than one hundred thousand men are involved in these disputes and negotiations are under way to settle all matters before they reach the strike stage.

During the first eleven months of this country's participation in the war—April 5 to March 5—The department dealt with 807 disputes. Of these, commissions and conciliation settled 509. The average number in which conciliators were unsuccessful were about six cases each month.

The majority of these controversies took place during the down to a minimum in the last three months.

Strike at St. Louis

St. Louis, Mo., Mar. 8.—Growing labor unrest in St. Louis gave way to another strike today. Six hundred and fifty men employed by the Mallinckrodt Chemical company making chemical for government munitions, struck this morning for increased wages.

Two thousand men and women employees of the Wagner Electric company, who struck when several union men were discharged, still are out today.

This, in substance, is the doctrine Chief of Staff March has laid down to other war chiefs. Seeking to inject some of his own "pep" into preparations, he has sought to visualize American needs and to impress upon the leaders as Chairman Hurley of the shipping board and Vannevor McCormick of the war trade board, the need for speed and the fullest energy.

Big guns are a paramount need. March is understood to believe that they are even more vital than gunpowder at the moment. And he has shown the war workers that more ships must be hurried up to meet pressing supply problems.

At present supply problems are pressing, for, with the allied superiority material diminishing, it is necessary that the available tonnage be quickly increased.

The allies are politely but constantly pressing this government for more ships and their views are reflected by March, Colonel House and others who have had a full inside view of the situation.

March is convinced that the allied-American line in the west cannot be broken, but he is impressing upon his co-workers the thought that the Germans will last correspondingly longer if big guns, airplanes and other supplies along with a sizeable army are delayed.

German Atrocities Against Americans Related by Patients

New York, Mar. 8.—Stories of German atrocities against American soldiers were reported today by patients in the army hospital here, according to the New York World.

The story of a night patrol in which 12 Americans were captured and captured but returned the next night by the Germans, was related by Albert B. Sykes, attached to the division sanitary corps.

He said: "Twelve infantrymen went out on a night patrol and when they failed to return that night it was taken for granted they had been captured. They came back to us the next night. When dawn came they were lying out in front of our trenches. Every man had his eyes gouged out and in several cases the hands and legs were gone."

The government has made no official report of atrocities upon American troops.

Washington, Mar. 8.—The war department had no confirmation today of atrocities upon American soldiers, as related by Albert Sykes at New York.

May Be Given Furloughs to Work On the Farms During Busy Seasons

Washington, Mar. 8.—Furloughs for men now in the army to work on the farms during the planting and other busy seasons were assured today when the house approved the action of the senate in passing the bill authorizing the secretary of state to grant the leaves whenever the situation so demands.

President Wilson urged the passing of the measure so his signature is certain. No furloughs will be granted unless the enlisted man makes application. The house voted down an amendment to allow parents or guardians to request the furlough, believing that this would cause too great an exodus from the army.

Chairman Dent stated that it was the plan of the war department to have the division commander pass on the merits of the furlough requested with right of appeal to Washington. For farm work the furloughs will be granted only where the soldier can show his services are badly needed to produce food.
