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COMMITTEE OF 100 OF RED CROSS MEETS

Third Meeting To Be Held at Commercial Club Rooms Tonight

The third meeting of the committee of 100 of the Red Cross will be held this evening at the commercial club, Chairman Huestein stated today, and an effort is being made this afternoon to secure a greater attendance. Six turned out for the first meeting, 25 for the second, and to increase the attendance this evening, it is announced that any person interested is invited to attend. The meeting will be held in the club auditorium.

The session tonight is to consider ways and means of increasing the revenue of the Red Cross. So great have been the expenditures of the organization during the past months that the treasury is almost depleted, and within a month will be entirely empty. This condition must be remedied, leaders of the Red Cross state, and some means provided for securing a steady means of income.

At the last meeting, a committee consisting of Walter Denton, Theodore Roth and P. E. Fullerton was appointed to investigate the conditions and to devise a means of filling the Red Cross money chest. This committee will make a report this evening at the meeting.

The Red Cross is more in need of funds at present than at any other time. The work has been increased materially since the American soldiers have taken their places in the trenches in France, and with the revival of interest in the civilian relief section. This increased need is to some extent balanced by the fact that many of the auxiliaries are now self-supporting and more are becoming so every week.

Eight Ships in Fleet

London, Mar. 8.—London was raided by enemy airplanes last night, Lord French announced today. He added that it was feared six others are still buried in the wreckage.

Reports from the coast declare that a vivid aurora borealis over the North Sea illuminated the coast and made possible last night's moonless air raid.

The same phenomenon was visible through practically the entire northern part of the United States last night.

Some Commanding

London, Mar. 8.—There was considerable enemy artillery firing astride the Ypres sector between the Menin road and Houtholst forest, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

In the neighborhood of Ridbecourt, in the Scarpe valley, there was enemy cannonading.

Austrians on West Front

Rome, Mar. 8.—Austrian troops have been sent to France, the Prussian minister of war announced in the Reichstag, according to a dispatch received from Bern today. He refused to give the number.

The German Version

Berlin, via London, Mar. 8.—The German war office today reported "successful raids" east of Moresk, west of Festabert and east of Lanen-vast.

EX-PREACHER MAD

Hood River, Or., Mar. 8.—Announcement of his intention to press his damage suit, alleging slander against two members of his former congregation, was made today by Rev. J. L. Allen, who was acquitted in fifteen minutes of an arson charge.

Allen alleges his troubles are due to idle gossipers, who he alleges, began wagging their tongues when he was pastor of the local Baptist church. Since his resignation as pastor, Allen has been studying law.

WIRELESS MESSAGE PUZZLES OFFICIALS AS TO JAPS ACTION

Statement That 40,000 Japanese Troops Have Landed Is Not Confirmed

Washington, Mar. 8.—Japan's reply to American views against intervention in Siberia will probably be forthcoming quickly.

It is expected to be an informal communication sent through American Ambassador Morris at Tokio.

With the Germans continuing on in Russia, Japan may urge that the dangers to her own interests in the east are constantly increasing despite the American position that intervention is unnecessary for the present.

The absence of word showing movement into Siberia tends to confirm reports here yesterday that the American position had delayed action.

On the other hand, the government is puzzled at a wireless message picked up by the American wireless at Honolulu several days ago stating that 40,000 Japanese troops already had landed in Siberia.

Honolulu merely reported having caught the flash and the government has received no confirmation.

From all sides today come reports of the lethargy among the Russian peasants in the face of the crisis facing their country.

Charles L. Preston, a New England shoe and leather man, has just returned from Vladivostok, where he was sent on a special mission by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce of the department of commerce. He declared today that the Russian farmer is back at work on the land and living on his own produce.

Would Be Bad Move

Rome, Mar. 8.—A Japanese expedition in Siberia, with Anglo-American consent, would be a false move, the Observatore Romano declared today.

State House News

The Portland Hebrew Religious Protective association of Portland filed articles of incorporation this morning, giving as the object of the association, \$100. The business of the association is to "protect and encourage Hebrew rites and Hebrew customs, the assisting, enlightening and encouraging of all foreign Hebrews who desire to become citizens of the United States and to endeavor to arbitrate or assist in settling disputes between Hebrews."

J. R. Barrow of Coquille, has announced his candidacy for representative in the legislature from the 3d district. Mr. Barrow, who is a republican, gives as his slogan, "Support the Boys Win the War. Save Business Legislation. Clean Moral Legislation."

SAYS MARION COUNTY IT FACING SHORTAGE OF HELP ON FARMS

J. W. Brewer Says Patriotism Will Solve It—Speaks Here Tomorrow

That patriotism is going to have much to do with solving the threatened shortage of farm labor this summer, is the belief of J. W. Brewer, of the federal farm labor bureau of Portland. The Portland office is receiving hundreds of letters daily from Oregon people, women for the most part, asking what they can do to help in the war, and offering to go to the farms to work during the summer months. While most of this volunteer labor is inexperienced, it is believed that the assistance received from this source will balance the loss of men in the draft, and that which has been attracted to the shipyards and factories.

Mr. Brewer states that Oregon is short of experienced dairy and farm hands, but that improved methods, and a better handling of the situation will solve this question. In lines of work that do not require experience, such as fruit and berry picking, the probabilities are that many families who have been in the habit of spending the summer working in this way are now in the larger cities where they have found work in the factories and shipyards. They will be missed, but their places will be filled by the thousands who have written to the farm labor bureau asking what they can do to help win the war.

Marion county is facing a shortage of several thousand fruit and berry pickers this summer, it is stated by those familiar with the local situation, and Mr. Brewer will address a meeting tomorrow at 1:30 of the growers of Marion county. The situation will be explained to them, and the methods the government is planning to use to meet the emergency will be told. It is believed that a closer cooperation between the local association and the federal authorities in the state will lead to much good being done.

It is considered probable that a campaign will be started in the near future to educate the people of the larger cities to the necessity of increasing the production of the farms of the state and to secure more volunteers for farm work. While the voluntary offers which have been received will materially assist, it will be necessary to secure thousands of helpers if the situation is to be properly met.

Mr. Brewer has been in Salem this week directing the work of the high school students who are classifying the reports received from the farm survey blanks sent out over the state. This will probably require until next Tuesday or Wednesday to complete although a hundred students are helping with the work.

The bureau believes that when the classification is complete, the best report of farm conditions ever made in the state will be available. There are returns received from 19,000 Oregon farms to be classified, and when the work is finished, it is believed that over 75 per cent of the producing land in the state will have been included.

The government census gives the number of deer farms in the state as 45,000. This, however, includes abandoned homesteads, timber land, and undeveloped property. The state authorities believe that from 30,000 to 35,000 producing farms should have been listed. Returns have been received from 19,000 farms, and most of the farmers who failed to send in their reports were those living in the hills and in the backward portions of the state.

Federal approval of the Elgin-Minnam road in Union county was received yesterday by the public service commission. This project calls for 9.3 miles of grading at an estimated cost of \$36,094. The work will be conducted under the Bean-Barrett bond act in co-operation with the government.

An order was issued by the public service commission yesterday relieving Oregon railroads of the application of the law requiring that changes in the existing schedules, including those of joint rates, be posted conspicuously by the company in each depot where an agent is maintained. The statute gives the commission power to suspend or modify the act.

Governor Withycombe has received a letter stating that his son, Earl Withycombe, is still dangerously ill in a Washington hospital. He has been confined to his bed for several weeks as a result of an illness contracted in a southern cantonment.
