ness of the situation home to the people. He asked that a representative attendance be secured from over the county so that those who attended could go back to their homes and tell what they had learned to their neighbors. The meeting this evening will be along the lines of the afternoon session, but will be open to the public. It is hoped by Mr. Churchill to have every family in the city represented, as there is more to the conservation movement than most people believe, and the many questions as to why it is necessary to save, and why we must eat cornbread and ship the wheat to Europe, will be answered.

Miss Milan has just returned from a conservation meeting at Washington, and brings a message which she would like to tell to every housewife in the county. She will talk after the address by Mr. Churchill this evening, and this afternoon gave lessons on the use of substitutes in cooking. Miss Milan is the head of this department of the agricultural college extension work.

Mr. Churchill reports enthusiastic meetings in southern Oregon. Good crowds turned out at Medford, Eugene, Marshfield and Coquille, and at Albany yesterday, five meetings were held. Oregon City will be the next stopping place of the conservation party, and eastern Oregon will be visited next.

In his talk this afternoon Mr. Churchill stated that the greatest need of the United States today was that every one within its boundaries should have a full conviction of why we are in the war, should stand back of the president, and assure him that we are in the war to the last dollar and the last man, and should realize that the hour is here when we must devote our resources without stint for paying the way of democracy over the world. One reason for the collapse of the Russians, Mr. Churchill stated, was that clever German agents had spread the propaganda that America was not behind this war, that it was a rich man's war, and that LaFollette's speech and similar expressions were the true belief

Booth Fisheries Plead Guilty Are Fined

Seattle, Wash., Mar. 13.—Rather than continue their legal fight, subsidiary agents under control of the Booth fisheries came into federal court here this morning, pleaded guilty to

long standing charges of violation of the Sherman anti-trust laws and paid fines aggregating \$13,000.

The stage had been set for more litigation as the cases have buffeted thru the courts from session to session. The sudden decision to end the litigation by pleading guilty came as a surprise in federal circles.

They found the German first lines evacuated as in the morning attack and took no prisoners.

The American artillery put down a perfect barrage simultaneously hammering the German batteries in the rear. Machine guns whipped the German trenches where the wire entanglements had been cut.

Under cover of the barrage and machine gun fire, the Yankee infantrymen enthusiastically went over the top. They found portions of the German trenches leveled and dugouts smashed. Some pieces of bodies, blown to bits by the American high explosive shells were discovered. A few shots were exchanged with the boches who were late in retreating. The raiders returned within 15 minutes after they and left their own trenches.

Balds and Counter Balds London, Mar. 13.—A strong enemy party raided a British post south of Arrambieres last night, following heavy bombardment. Field Marshal Haig reported today. A few British soldiers are missing.

In the neighborhood of Lavaquere, an approaching party of the enemy was driven off by the British fire. A British raid north of Luna was successful, several prisoners being brought back.

Southwest of Cambrai and opposite Loos, the enemy's artillery was active yesterday evening, and in the Messines sector and at Passchendaele, last night

American War Counts Paris, Mar. 13.—American troops in the Chemin des Dames sector captured the crew of a German airplane which had fallen near Chamecy, it was announced here today.

The American artillery fire has reached its greatest intensity at several points. Five groups of German gas projectors which were ready to be used were obliterated by shell fire. Towns back of the German lines were set afire and large quantities of ammunition in new dumps were blown up.

French Make Counter Air Raid Paris, Mar. 13.—During Monday night's air raid on Paris, French aviators made a counter raid on Gotha hangars in the rear of the German lines, it was officially announced today. Six tons of bombs were dropped and several fires were observed.

The German raiders, comprising sixty Gothas and nine squadrons, sustained serious losses. So far, four machines including three Gothas and one biplane have been reported shot down. The crew of one, which was brought down near the Chateau Thierry, was taken prisoner.

The boche planes followed two routes in approaching Paris. The first warning was sounded at 9:10 and "all clear" at 12:15 a. m.

Four Airplanes Downed Paris, Mar. 13.—Mutual artillery along the right bank of the Meuse and in the Raillon, Angerville and Lorraine regions, was reported by the French war office last night.

A German airplane was shot down north of Soissons. Its three occupants including two officers, were taken prisoner. Three other Gothas, each containing four men, and an enemy biplane, were shot down within the French lines.

Zepplins in Raid London, Mar. 13.—Three Zepplins participated in last night's air raid on England. Lord French, commander of home defense forces announced today. Of these, only one ventured to approach the defended district. Four bombs were dropped at Hull. A house was demolished and a woman died of shock.

The other airships wandered for hours in remote country districts, dropping bombs in the open country.

This is the first time Zepplins have participated in an English raid since last fall.

The German Claim Berlin, via London, Mar. 13.—Nineteen enemy airplanes and two captive balloons were downed on the west front yesterday, the German war office declared today.

"There were reconnoitering actions at various western points," the statement said. "In the Champagne region our storm troops took ninety French prisoners.

German and Austrian forces are before Odessa," the war office said.

of the people of the United States.

Mr. Churchill does not believe this is true, and thinks that if the needs of the government are understood, that they will be fulfilled by the people. He groups the things the government expects from the people under three heads, first, back the government, second provide money in two forms, through gifts to the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. and by investing in democracy through the liberty loan, and third, buy nothing and use nothing that is not necessary, eliminate useless extravagance, and stop waste of every sort.

Must Use Substitutes The use of substitutes was explained during the course of the talk, it explained that we need to save four things, sugar, fats, meat and flour, and so far the west has not done its part. In New England there is no sugar, and in Chicago but one lump is allowed, even in the larger hotels. Flour substitutes have been on a 50-50 basis for some time in the east, and in every way, the eastern people have been called on to do their part of the war work. The abolition of banquets was urged, and in addition, Mr. Churchill asked the farmers, who seem to be hardest to change from the habits of using flour, sugar and meat, to produce more and use less of these things. In conclusion Mr. Churchill stated:

"Democracy is in the balance. This great conflict will decide whether democracies can discipline themselves and defend themselves; whether the world is to be slave or free. Are we to work out our work in freedom, as we believe God intended us to do, or are we serious and unswerving of a tax grinding military autocracy, eggs in the machine of the Kaiser. Will you go home to make Oregon ring with the challenge?"

New York Will Refer National Prohibition

Albany, N. Y., Mar. 13.—Governor Whitman will veto the bill putting ratification of the federal prohibition amendment up to the people instead of the state legislature. This was learned on good authority today. The referendum bill was passed by the state assembly late yesterday. The governor was strongly in favor of ratification of the amendment by the legislature.
