Runaway Piled Up Against Telephone Pole Small Damage Done

Considerable excitement was created on State street this afternoon by a runaway team as it collided with a telephone pole on the north side of the Oregon Electric tracks. The team began its flight from the Cherry City flouring mills, ran up the alley past Frank Ward's drug store, took a bee line across State street for the court house, but was brought to a temporary halt when it collided with a telephone pole on the north side of the street. One horse was striped clean of its harness and found itself walking around on the grass on the court house lawn, while the other was thrown in a heap on the curb. The latter animal apparently was stunned for a few seconds as it lay perfectly still as if dead. In fact, the crowd that quickly collected thought it was dead but it soon demonstrated that it was much alive. About this time the owner appeared and led his fractious horses away to get them fitted out with harness again. The owner's name could not be learned. The horses were uninjured, and about the only thing to suffer damage was the harness, and the neckyoke, which was broken.

New York Will Vote On Amendment Wednesday

Albany, N. Y., March 13.—The bill resolution to ratify the federal prohibition amendment, will come before the New York senate for a vote next Wednesday. This understanding was reported today through an agreement by Senator Elton B. Brown, majority leader, upon request by Senator Wellington that some definite time be set for consideration of prohibition bills. Senator Wellington will move to discharge the taxation committee, which has been considering the resolution.

Getting Ready For Thrift Stamp Campaign Beginning Tuesday

School Superintendent Wm. Smith is sending out the supplies for the coming War Saving Stamp campaign which starts the 19th of the month. Each school district, and the committee in each town is receiving a supply. Order cards are being included for the use of the workers. The prospective buyer of thrift stamps writes in the amount he wants to buy and the order card is sent in to the central committee. Later, the post office is given the cards, and the mail carrier delivers the stamps ordered and collects the money.
The county has bought \$68,215 worth of Thrift stamps. This is about 7 per cent of the county's quota of \$972,000, and as there are less than 10 months remaining, Mr. Smith says the work must speed up. Yesterday brought the largest sale, this being \$3,800. The sales for the past week have been increasing, however, which is taken to indicate that next week's drive is having effect already.
A meeting of the county workers is called for next Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at the commercial club. The plans for the week will be discussed there by those in charge, and the final arrangements completed for the drive.

Germany Shows No Mercy to Rumania

Washington, March 13.—After promising that the big allied military missions in Rumania would be allowed to depart for home, Count Czerain tried to balk them by decreeing they should enter quarantine for a month, according to state department advice today. The missions, however, decided not to observe the quarantine and so departed with Red Cross and other American aid on the promise of a safe conduct from the Rumanian king.
Nothing is said as to the movements of Captain Halsey E. Yates, American military attaché at Jassy.
The Rumanian government felt it was a matter involving its own honor to get the mission safely out of the country.
German liberal press comment is critical of the harsh terms imposed upon Rumania, according to extracts reaching here today.
Rumania has granted German claims for frontier alterations and now Germany is adding to these demands, having found no obstacle to her desires.

American Sailors Praised for Gallantry

London, Mar. 13.—Dr. McNamara, financial secretary of the admiralty, speaking in the house of commons today expressed that body's profound appreciation of the seamanship and great gallantry of the crew of the United States destroyer Parker, in rescuing ten members of the crew of the torpedoed hospital ship Glenart Castle.
McNamara referred particularly to the conduct of two sailors who jumped overboard and rescued several men.
General Phillips said the Union Castle company, owner of the steamship, has asked the American navy department for permission to reward the men, but that the request was not favored.
McNamara replied that if the British government could reward the men with the sanction of the United States, such a suggestion would be made to the American department.
The Glenart Castle was torpedoed in the Bristol channel February 27. The loss of life was comparatively heavy.

Emergency Board Called Together To Meet War Problems

A special meeting of the Emergency Board was called to day by Secretary of State Olcott at the request of Governor Withycombe to consider financial questions resulting from the war problems facing Oregon. The board will meet next Wednesday. Special attention will be given requests for state aid in protection of industries and safeguarding shipyard properties. The meeting was made necessary by the fact that there are no funds provided for any of this work, yet it is an absolute necessity. It must be taken care of by the emergency board or a special session of the legislature called.

Cost of Materials Checks All Buildings

Chicago, Mar. 13.—An increase of fifty per cent in all building materials has decreased home building and construction work 75 per cent, according to delegates here today attending the national convention of Retail Lumber Dealers. Only 24,000,000 building permits, one fourth the former monthly number, were issued in the United States during February.
Steel and cement prices have advanced even more than lumber prices, according to delegates. Standardization of lumber products to expedite the manufacture of materials and box containers wanted by the government is being planned.

LOAD SPANISH SHIPS
Washington, Mar. 13.—Beans, mules and blankets ordered for General Pershing in Spain, are expected to be shipped soon now that the Spanish American commercial agreement has been ratified.
The war trade bureau today authorized immediate loading of seven Spanish steamers under the agreement. The steamers are loaded with cotton and phosphate rock for fertilizer.

County Preparing To Do Its Part Toward Paving to Aurora

As the state highway commission has decided to start work on the paving of the Pacific highway to the north county line, Roadmaster Culver will begin next week on the south end of the road, and a stretch six miles long which is very rough will be graded and scarified in order to put it in condition for use until the paving can be done.
The county will start within a week or ten days on the grading of the highway, preparatory to paving. This will take almost a month, it is believed, and since the cuts will require more time. The state will probably start work within a month.
The new county rock crusher is almost ready for use, and will be ready for the spring work. Five men are working at present installing it in the county gravel pit near the mute farm.
