Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson, wedding state regent, presided with her habitual gracious manner. The address and report showed effective work accomplished the past year.

The social features included the reception Friday evening and the luncheon Saturday, both of which were distinctive functions. The program throughout was marked by especially beautiful music.

Mrs. F. M. Wilkins of Eugene was elected state regent. Mrs. Wilkins is fully qualified to hold this office, having demonstrated a marked executive ability in the various club offices she has filled from time to time. She served as late vice regent of the state "Daughters" and at present holds the position of president of the Eugene Woman's club. Mrs. Wilkins has a rare charm of personality that has won her many friends throughout the state.

Mrs. Walter P. Burrell of the Multnomah chapter, Portland, was made vice regent. Mrs. Burrell is the daughter of Mrs. J. B. Montgomery, the founder of the first Oregon chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The remaining state officers were elected as follows: Mrs. Paul Gregory, Carthage of the Savannah Lee Barlow chapter, Oregon City, recording secretary; Mrs. Bertha Cummings, of the Lewis and Clark chapter, Eugene, corresponding secretary; Mrs. V. E. Pearson, of Willamette chapter, Portland, treasurer; Mrs. J. Thoburn Ross of Multnomah chapter, Portland, historian; Mrs. Charles Worrell of Coos Bay chapter, auditor; Mrs. Levi Tracy, chaplain; Mrs. John Porter Gibson of Willamette chapter, consulting registrar.

During the year four new chapters have been organized. The list of different state chapters now numbers, Multnomah and Willamette chapters at Portland, Linn at Albany, Sarah Childress Polk at Dallas, Chemeketa at Salem, Quenett at the Dalles, Umatilla at Umatilla, Umpqua at Roseburg, Coos Bay at Coos Bay and Savannah Lee Barlow at Oregon City.

Further action was also taken on the matter of voting five hundred dollars to the woman's club house at Eugene, which was put through at the conference last year, and it was decided to complete the payments within the next two years.

made for fear of betrayal; and they dare not continue to treat Russia as an active enemy lest this provide the very avenue for a recovery of Russia offensive power.

There is every reason to believe that the delegates to the pan-soviet congress were men without experience in public affairs, who were not informed authoritatively concerning the terms of the peace treaty they were accomplishing. They put their trust in Lenin, who, practically alone is responsible for the delivery of the paper past to the German autocrats.

It is impossible to believe the Germans will even attempt to carry out all the provisions of the peace agreement at Russia's expense, while the war continues on the west front. The terms that press onerously upon the people will probably be ignored for the time being. To attempt to exact them might too easily rouse the Russians to a new fury.

The Kaiser, in fact, wants a Russian peace agreement primarily for bargaining purposes with the western democracies when he is defeated on the west front. It is now for the Russian revolutionists who no longer trust Lenin, to wrest from the Hohenzollerns even this small comfort. The probabilities favor such a development. Russia is historically the land of surprises. The revolutionary spirit is too dominant there for any kind of agreement with the Hohenzollerns to endure.

pected to increase about 50 per cent above those for February. Meat exports to England last month were 100,000 tons, practically a quarter of her demands. This month's total of meat exports will be upwards of 150,000 tons. Soft corn according to estimates of food administrators.

Soft corn is still two-thirds unmoved in the middle west, especially in Indiana. The situation is characterized by food administration officials as serious.
