For the first time in his life he heard a referee count the fatal ten over his own prostrate form.

CHANGE IN CHARTER

(Continued from page one)

ing the highest number of votes for such office shall be certified by the canvassing board to the proper officials as the nominees for such office at the general election.

A general election for the election of city officers shall be held biennially in the several election precincts in the City of Salem at the same time that the general biennial election for state and county officers is held.

Section 5. The elective officers of the City of Salem shall be a Mayor, a Recorder, who shall be ex-officio clerk of the Common Council, a Marshal, a Treasurer, and two Aldermen from each ward. The elective officers shall be chosen for a term of four years beginning January 1st next after their election; provided that when there is a vacancy in the office of Alderman from any ward by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the Common Council shall appoint a successor pro tempore who shall serve until his successor is elected at the next regular election and qualifies for the unexpired term; provided further that at the general election in November, 1918, the Alderman receiving the higher number of votes shall be elected for a four year term, and the other one for a two year term; and thereafter, one Alderman shall be elected biennially in each ward, except as hereinbefore provided. The appointive officers shall be a Street Commissioner, City Attorney, City Engineer, Chief of the Fire Department Health Officer, and such number of policemen as the Common Council may deem necessary who shall be ex-officio Deputy City Marshals. Such officers shall be chosen by the

of Armentieres.) This bombardment was still under way at six o'clock. Thus, along almost the whole of the British front, cannonading began to rumble and speed up, but at the early hour of evening, a further details were available.

For the past two weeks the front has been growing more feverish. Over one hundred raids have been carried out by both sides, while the battle in the air has never ceased. The Germans have made particularly frenzied attempts to prevent the allies from flying over their lines, meanwhile making the most desperate efforts to reconquer the British disposition of forces.

This has resulted in amazing clashes in cloudland.

As I conclude this dispatch, the guns are still belching flame and steel. This, the first day of spring, is slight foggy but promises fine.

Bombard French Lines

Paris, Mar. 21.—Intense, unceasing German bombardment along the north-east and southeast sectors of the French front, and in the Champagne region, early today was reported by the French war office.

In the Champagne, German attempts, notably in the Marais sector (at Tahure, where American artillery is aiding the French) fell down. German artillery violently bombarded the French lines in the Souain (four miles east of Tahure) and St. Souplet (four miles east of Souain) regions, proceeding a strong attack.

The French conducted successful raids north of the Ailette and in the Armentieres region (about twelve miles east of the American Toul sector) and took some prisoners.

Four are Sunk
London, Mar. 21.—Two enemy destroyers and two torpedo boats are believed to have been sunk in action off Dunkirk, the British admiralty announced today.

The German warships were bombarding Dunkirk this morning when they were attacked by French and British naval forces.

No allied vessels were sunk, although a British destroyer was damaged. It was brought safely into harbor.

Two British and three French destroyers participated in the engagement.

Dunkirk is on the French coast about 20 miles west of the point where the front lines touch the North sea.

Rome, Mar. 21.—The pope has asked Emperor Karl of Austria whether he will initiate negotiations for an agreement among all belligerents to abstain from bombing open towns far from the zone of military operations, the newspaper Idea Nazionale declared today.

A Hint from Spain

Madrid, Mar. 21.—Former Premier Maura, recognized as the leader of pro-ally sympathizers in Spain, has been directed to form a new cabinet. It was announced here today.

Germans Take Town

Berlin, via London, Mar. 21.—The commercial town and harbor of Kherson has been captured, the German war office announced today.

Italians Get Busy

Rome, Mar. 21.—Italian troops penetrated the enemy positions along the Sile sector today, inflicting casualties and capturing prisoners and war materials the war office reported.

Kherson is an important grain and shipping center, 100 miles east of Odessa, on the Dnieper river, a few miles from its mouth. It has a population of about 70,000.

Austro-Hungarians Help
Berlin, via London, Mar. 21.—Artillerying has been renewed in full force in broad sectors of the west front, the German war office reported today. Austro-Hungarian forces are participating.
