Articles of clothing and bedding which have been solicited for the Belgian relief commission will be gathered up today and tomorrow over the city. Those who have donated should have the bundles on their porches in order that they may be secured by the drivers of machines. In case any are overlooked, the ladies in charge would deem it a great favor if the donated articles were brought to headquarters, which are located the first door to the left of Stensloff's market on Court street.

Representatives of the jitney drivers and taxicab companies of the city met with Chief of Police Poland and City Recorder Race at the city hall today to lay before these officials a grievance arising from the operation of the city ordinance requiring chauffeur's licenses. The taxicab and jitney drivers claim they have to puntle up \$15 a year for a license and then are given no protection. They say that farmers and other owners of machines come into town and operate without licenses, thus cutting into their business. Their particular grievance seemed to be occasioned by the fact that the auto stages running between Salem and Silverton and Stayton are permitted to operate without licenses, the local drivers claiming that these cars run in and out of the city without license and secure much business that should go to the licensed Salem drivers. The local drivers say they will bring the matter up at the next meeting of the city council and see what can be done about it.

State House News

A report has been received from the circuit court of Lane county in regard to the case in which a decision of the public service commission has been appealed to the court. The matter involves the alleged appropriation, by the branch line to Marshfield of the Southern Pacific, of a portion of a county road between Mapleton and Cushman. This is permitted by the statutes when it is impossible to build the road in any other manner, but re- sultation must be made to the county, it is claimed by the state commission. A petition from Lane county lead to a decision by the state commission that the Southern Pacific would be required to build a road between the two cities, a distance of 10 miles, to replace the road taken over for a right of way by the railroad company. This will require about \$30,000 it is estimated, and the railroad company appealed the case to the court which has upheld the decision of the state commission.

The Hjoltaness motor Ship company of Portland, was incorporated this morning with a capital stock of \$600,000, to buy and operate the motorship Hjoltaness, now being built at Gray's Harbor. The Bay City Shipbuilding company of Bay City filed incorporation papers this morning, giving the capital stock as \$150,000. The Oregon Chrome company of Portland, also filed articles of incorporation, and will engage in mining chrome and other metals.

Loyal M. Graham of Forest Grove, a republican, filed today for representative in the legislative assembly for the 15th district. His slogan is "I propose to apply good business principles and economy to legislative affairs" in his platform he states he will work consistently for just legislation to promote the best interests of the state and Washington county.

The resignation of Charles H. Stewart as assistant superintendent of banks has been received, and Superintendent Bennett announces the appointment of Marshal Hooper, present examiner, to the position. H. A. Sonne of the Baker Loan and Trust company, is appointed to the position of bank examiner. Mr. Stewart resigned his position to accept one with the federal reserve bank at San Francisco. He has been with the state banking department for the past four years. W. E. Smith of the First National bank of Monmouth has been appointed to a clerkship in the banking department.

A petition from the Newport commercial club has been received by the Public Service commission asking an extension of the Southern Pacific branch from Yaquina to Newport. The extension is necessary, the petition states, because of the inability to properly care for the freight and passenger business by way of boat from Yaquina to Newport.

E. L. Seicke, deputy state forester, has resigned and will accept an appointment as state forester of Texas. Mr. Seicke has been a deputy forester since 1911, and had been recommended to the Texas office. His successor here has not been selected.

The appointment by the governor of a member of the state fair board is expected. Mrs. Edith Tozier Weathered's term having expired on March 14th. Apparently there is little doubt that the appointee will be a woman, but it is by no means certain that Mrs. Weathered will be re-appointed. Four
