VALUE OF CARGOES

Investigation of imports statistics shows that two million tons of cargo space was devoted to luxuries imported into the United States in 1917. The war trade board is now preparing a list of what may be regarded as non-essential imports and exports, subject to curtailment in the government's tonnage conservation program.

Fruits and nuts constitute a big item in the luxury trade. Coffee brought into the United States from Brazil in 1917 occupied 905,481 tons of shipping space—and most certainly

will be reduced under the proposed plan.

Raw silk occupied 16,296 tons. Millions of dollars worth of fruits, nuts, perfumes, cosmetics, lace and embroideries, furniture, ostrich feathers, ornaments, hats and clothing to say nothing of ivory and other non-essentials will soon feel the drastic slashing of the American government. Everything now depends on tonnage—and the people will soon get a different idea of "necessities" officials say.

of the statement said. After sharp fighting, the French threw out German troops from advanced trenches in the Courty and Aime sectors, punishing them severely.

West of Courty, an attempted German raid fell down.

Strong artillerying is under way in the Monts region, along the right bank of the Meuse and in the Wotvre region.

British Confident.

London, Mar. 22.—British military officials are confident the big German drive will be stopped, but they sounded a note of warning today that the world's destiny may depend on the human will against which the enemy is hurling its shock troops.

Correspondents at the front agree that the enemy is trying its "nut cracker" strategy on the Cambrai salient from the flanks, seeking to straighten its line and pinch off an enormous number of British men and guns.

"We Hold" Says Haig.

London, Mar. 22.—"We hold the enemy in our battle positions," Field Marshal Haig announced today.

"Battle positions" are the defenses directly behind the first line trenches. Haig's statement would indicate that the German penetration had been limited.

News Received Quietly.

Berlin, via Copenhagen, Mar. 22.—News that the big battle had begun on the west was received quietly here.

Herr Von Steiner, the Austrian war minister, who is in Berlin, is reported to have agreed that the Austrians will hold the east front and, at the same time, furnish a few Austrian troops and many guns for the west front.

A few Bulgars also are on the west front.

The German Version.

Berlin, via London, Mar. 22.—German troops stormed broad sectors from a point southeast of Arras, southward to Laferre and "everywhere captured first enemy lines," the war office announced today.

An intense "firing duel" is proceeding between Laferre and Soissons and astride Rheims, in the Champagne region.

In Flanders there is strong artillerying.

On the Italian Front.

Rome, Mar. 22.—Fighting has increased on the whole Italian front, the war office reported today.

Americans to Help.

Rome, Mar. 22.—American aviation students in Italy will cooperate with Italians in aerial defenses, it was announced today.

A number of American aviators are training in Italy for duty at the front.

Bulgars Are Fighting.

Washington, Mar. 22.—Berlin reports today that Bulgars are now fighting on the west front aroused immediate speculation here as to the probability of the United States declaring war against Bulgaria.

Government authorities said a decision would await further facts as to the extent of Bulgaria's participation and whether they are facing only British or also American.

Tortured Baby to Death Sentence Far Too Light

Urbana, Ill., Mar. 22.—Walter Robbins was found guilty today of the murder of fourteen months old Wilfrid Chesley and sentenced to 30 years in Chester penitentiary.

Chesley, mother of the child, whose testimony convicted Robbins, now goes on trial for the same murder. Evidence presented to the jury showed Robbins caused the baby's death by slow torture covering a period of several months. He was accused of throwing pepper in the child's eyes, burning it with a hot pipe and finally beating it to death. The woman, because of her failure to interfere, is charged with complicity.

Refused to Revoke Teacher's Certificate Roasted Directors

State School Superintendent Churchill

in a decision made today, refused to revoke the certificate of Miss Tuelah Russell, of Multnomah county, but strongly censured the directors for permitting an unnecessary condition to exist, and in addition Mr. Churchill instructed the county superintendent to withhold funds from the Fir Grove district until the conditions are remedied.

The affair is the result of the discovery by Superintendent W. E. Alderman of Multnomah county, that obscene words and pictures had been printed on the walls and doors of the school building. Several weeks later, he found the pictures were still there, and apparently no effort had been made to remove them. He at once asked for the revocation of the certificate of the teacher, Miss Russell.

The matter was appealed to Mr. Churchill, and a hearing was held Mar. 16th. At this session, Miss Russell stated that the removal of the pictures was the duty of the school board for the district, that she called the matter to their attention, and it had not been remedied by them. This was supported by

a letter from the school board which stated that Miss Russell had asked to have the building repaired, and stated that the pictures were drawn by outsiders and not by the Fir Grove children.

Mr. Churchill stated that the school building was in such a condition that no children should be sent there, and severely censured the directors for allowing such a condition to remain. Miss Russell was made equally responsible for the condition as she had been in such position that she could not have failed to see the pictures, and her action is characterized as a neglect of duty.

PRISONERS IN SIBERIA

San Francisco, Mar. 22.—Of the 752,000 Austro-German prisoners in Siberia at least 400,000, or more than half the total number are now in the Far Eastern part, according to the Japanese newspaper Ho Chi, copies of which reached here today.
