"However," quoting further, "it has been explained that a recent government order in France stated that owing to the semi-mourning of the nation and the gravity of the national crisis, dancing will no longer be considered appropriate for officers of either army or navy."

For the men, the same kind of rods were used and attached to each was a tiny silk flag."

Distinctive scenery serves as the background for "Headin' South," Douglas Fairbanks' latest Arteright picture, which will be shown at the Oregon Theater starting tomorrow. Some of the scenes were staged in the forest of giant cactus, twenty miles from Tucson, Ariz., where the cactus ranges from ten to fifty feet in height and have been described as "sentinels of the desert."

Despite the fact that the cactus is covered with piercing thorns, Fairbanks lassoed a projecting branch and climbed up the side of one of the trees, jumping to the ground as he neared the top. Practically all the natives of Tucson turned out to witness the taking of the Fairbanks scene.

It required twelve men to uproot one of these cactus trees, which was crated and shipped to Los Angeles to be transplanted on the large Fairbanks estate, where there is a collection of trees of all species. "Headin' South" is a sensational story of Mexican raiders.

A. huts, blankets and quilts, victrola records and pianos for camps, mess funds, hospitality funds, free yarn, etc.

A summary of gifts from October 1, 1917, to February 1, 1918, shows a total of \$519,654.19. The second liberty loan was contributed to in the amount of \$2,712,953. These sums bring the financial participation of the Daughters from June, 1917, to February, 1918, to the total of \$5,915,534.31, a wonderful showing for
