ican troops are in the line) the enemy attacked at dawn but was thrown back with heavy losses.

This is the first official allied announcement that French troops are aiding the British to repel the German drive.

The Berlin official statement of Sunday (day) declared that reserves composed of British, French and American troops were defeated. The Germans evidently meant to imply that the mobile reserve authorized by the Versailles conference had been in action.

Noyon is located on the Oise about 15 miles west of Lafore, where the British and French lines are welded

together. The French must have engaged the enemy some distance east of Noyon, as the greatest retirement so far reported at this point is to Channy five miles west of Lafore.

Noyon is noted as the place where Emperor Charlemagne was crowned in 768.

SMITH GIRLS SAFE.

Paris, Mar. 25.—Word has been sent to the friends and families of Smith College girls working behind the lines on the west front that they have been rescued to complete safety. Even the cows that supplied them with fresh milk were saved.

The girls are now aiding in Red Cross relief work. Pennsylvania Quakers also are rendering invaluable assistance.

LONG RANGE GUN IS

Wood, just returned from France, emphatically declared his belief that no mysterious new German gun is firing on Paris.

"I have read all the reports regarding the attack on Paris," said General Wood, in a statement to the New York Herald, "and I am convinced that no new gun of marvellous range is involved. In my opinion, a great aerial attack is taking place and it seems very possible that radical development of airplane guns by the Germans is involved. I hold this belief despite the assertion that the position of a great new gun has been accurately ascertained. I am sure that within a short time it will be established that an airplane bombardment has resulted in the misleading report."

"It is my belief and that of my associates that the missiles falling on Paris are aerial torpedoes—nothing more," said Henry Woodhouse, of the board of governors of the Aero club of America today, after reading all the reports in the morning papers. "It is quite practicable to build an ordinary Maxim silencer that would deaden the report of a gun throwing shells into Paris from the suburbs of the city," Hudson Maxim, famous inventor of explosives, declared today after reading accounts of mysterious shells falling in Paris. "If the Germans really have built a seventy mile long range gun, it would be so expensive and futile as to indicate their mental deterioration and should be the cause of great allied rejoicing."

Is Still a Mystery

London, Mar. 25.—The unexplained arrival of high powered German shells in Paris is today regarded here as the greatest mystery of the war. British experts suggest the possibility of shells being propelled from Zeppelins at a great height, possibly behind the German lines. A report of a monster gun being located more than 70 miles from Paris has not been confirmed. Experts here, who are frankly skeptical, considered various theories, including the possibility of a newly discovered propellant of power hitherto unknown, expelled a sectional shell. Such a shell, by exploding at intervals in the air, might surpass any previous possibilities. The Germans undoubtedly desire to spread the belief that they have developed such a gun, in hope of demoralizing public morale in Paris and London, the English coast including Dover being within its range.

More German Trickery

Washington, Mar. 25.—Skepticism over the ability of the Germans to bombard Paris from a range of seventy or more miles, continued here today. There was a tendency to believe that the Berlin claim of such bombardment was based upon the fact that Berlin desired to cast fear among the allies. "They've got to show me even now," said General Snow, American chief of artillery. The general shared the feeling that Berlin was exaggerating and said he felt certain that some device nearer Paris than 70 miles was responsible.

TO TAKE OVER PIER.

Washington, Mar. 25.—The senate today by a vote of 80 to 1, adopted the conference report on the urgent deficiency bill empowering the president to take over the German steamship pier in Hoboken and authorizing the alien enemy custodian to sell German owned property in the United States.

Germans May Occupy Petrograd Today

Washington, Mar. 25.—The Germans may occupy Petrograd, today, a state department message indicated. American Consul Tredwell, cabling from Volodga, March 20, just after leaving the Russian capital forecast enemy occupation "within 24 hours." Practically all Americans, he reported, have evacuated the city.

AMERICAN SHIP SUNK

London, Mar. 25.—The American steamer Chattahoochee, has been sunk off England by a submarine, an official admiralty announcement today said. The crew of seventy eight was saved. The captain of the vessel declared on landing that the submarine fired several torpedoes, four of which hit the ship. The Chattahoochee formerly was the German ship Sachsen of the Hamburg-American line, and was taken over by the United States when war was declared. The Chattahoochee was a steel screw steamer of 8007 tons, built in 1911.

NEITHER WILL STEP DOWN.

Milwaukee, Wis., Mar. 25.—The Wisconsin Loyal Legion committee failed today to secure the withdrawal of either Joseph E. Davies, democrat, or Irvine L. Lenroot, republican, from the senatorial race. The committee reported that it was appointed so late in the campaign "that it was found impractical to do anything looking toward a union of parties," against Victor L. Berger, socialist nominee.

English Labor Leader Is Highly Optimistic

Seattle, Wash., Mar. 25.—"Every man must stick to his job, do his best to carry on until militarism is banished, and until it is sure the world will never again be cursed with such causes for war." This was the declaration of Charles Duncan, labor member of parliament and special commissioner to the United States to American labor men here yesterday. "England can fight on and on, now," declared Duncan. "The problems of production have been solved, and now with British labor as a unit behind its government, victory seems sure."

RUMANIA TO SIGN

Amsterdam, Mar. 25.—The Rumanian-German peace treaty will be signed today or tomorrow, according to a Bucharest dispatch published by the German foreign office today. The dispatch said the Rumanian delegates had accepted all the terms proposed by Germany.

PREFER THE ALLIES

Seattle, Wash., Mar. 25.—Seattle Russians, at a meeting held here yesterday, expressed a desire for an allied invasion. That such a move would be more acceptable than a Japanese invasion of the territory, was the general belief.

ON ITALIAN FRONT

Rome, Mar. 25.—A lively artillery struggle was reported at various points on the Italian front by the Rome war office today. Four enemy airplanes were brought down Sunday and two others Saturday.

The subject of loganberry culture is arousing new interest in Coos county now, the Coquille Sentinel says, also claiming that "our climate is even better adapted to this crop than that of the Willamette valley."

GGreGat Dam Collapses, Damage Half a Million

San Jose, Cal., Mar. 25.—Engineers today placed the damage done by the collapse of the Calaveras dam near Milpitas, at a half million dollars and declared it would delay completion of the San Francisco water system at least a year.

The dam broke yesterday morning when, according to engineers, the weight of the clay used for reinforcing its center, became too great for the structure to resist. The first crash carried away the concrete tower controlling the flood gates but the clay blocked the water tunnel under the dam and prevented flooding of the San Jose region.

There was no loss of life but the property damage was heavy, much equipment being lost in addition to the damage to the dam.
