QUARTER OF BILLION DOLLARS ANNUALLY FOR RAILROAD MEN

General Average Increase
Will Be About \$200 a Year
—Some Get None

Washington, Mar. 29.—Wage in-
creases totalling more than a quarter of
a billion dollars annually will soon be
recommended for railroad workers by
the railway wage commission.

The general average increases for
those awarded the boost will be about
\$200 a year, it is understood. Some em-
ployees are expected to receive no in-
crease at all, recent wage additions hav-
ing been sufficient to meet the cost of
living advances, it is claimed.

The wage commission expects to have
its recommendations in the hands of
Director General McAdoo by the last of
next week, but a final decision is not
expected before May 1.

While not officially confirmed it is
stated by those in a position to know
that all increases will be retroactive to
January 1.

It was reported today railway unions
would be given satisfactory working
agreements, so the union organization
could be depended upon to throw its
utmost effort behind all war work with
which it comes in contact.

General and division officers whose
salary range above \$3,000 annually are
not expected to be counted in on the
wage boost, an official said. But the
increase will affect practically every
branch of the national railroad's em-
ployees, as well as dock and ship hands
of ship lines which were taken over by
Director General McAdoo with the rail
lines connecting.

ALL SCHOOL CLOCKS MUST BE SET AHEAD

Superintendent Churchill Says
This Must Be Done Under
the Law

Inquiries have been received by Su-
perintendent Churchill as to the change
in the school time. On March 31st, the
government time is to be set ahead
an hour, and the school teachers of
the state desire to know if it includes
them. Superintendent Churchill issued
the following statement:

Congress has passed a law that be-
tween the last Sunday in March and
the last Sunday in October, the stand-
ard time in each zone shall be one hour
in advance of the mean astronomical
time of the degree of longitude gov-
erning each zone, respectively. Govern-
or Withycombe has issued a proclama-
tion placing this law in effect in Ore-
gon. All official clocks will be set for-
ward, and all official acts will be
governed by the new time.

As the state law requires all public
schools to open at 9 a. m. each day, and
as the federal law defines what is
standard time, the schools must be
governed by the new time in order to
comply with our state and federal laws.

The capture of Lemontel by French
announced officially by Paris, shows
the allies are striking back directly to-
ward Montdidier, which is only two
miles northeast of Lemontel.

The French communiqué also declared
the Anglo-French were holding along the
Aire and that Pétain's men are retain-
ing the villages they recaptured yester-
day, despite strong counter attacks.

French Hold Gains.

Paris, Mar. 29.—The French are hold-
ing firmly the territory recaptured
from the enemy yesterday in the Mont-
didier sector, according to the official
announcement issued this afternoon.

"In the Montdidier region, despite
counter attacks, we held the villages re-
captured yesterday," says the state-
ment.

"We stormed and captured Montchel
and repulsed counter attacks against
Plessis-de-Bois."

"North of Montdidier the Anglo-
French forces are holding the enemy on
the Avoire river."

"There was furious fighting in front
of Plessis-de-Bois. Enemy assaults
were hurled vainly against the indom-
itable resistance of our troops. Prisoners
confirm the heavy German losses in
this region."

"North of Montdidier, the Franco-
British are victoriously checking the en-
emy along the line of the Avoire, in
front of Lameauville, Sire-Bernard, Ma-
zières, Marecave and Hamel."

"On the road from Laon to Laifere,
German infantry columns and convoys
were dispersed by French artillery."

"Artilleries are active on the rest of
the front."

Lemontel is about two miles south-
west of Montdidier. The Avoire river
flows westward through Roye and pas-
ses about three miles north of Mont-
didier.

HIS CHANCES WANING.

London, Mar. 29.—There is no reason
yet to believe that Quartermaster Gen-
eral Ludendorff has increased his pros-
pects of winning the great political gam-
ble—which is the real character of the
German super-offensive.

Every effort thus far made to draw
in the allies' reserves has failed. Mean-
while the German line has been com-
pelled to take an increasingly precar-
ious shape. Simultaneously, the German
command has been forced to drain its
own reserves past the point of highest
effectiveness.

The time undoubtedly is approaching
when the allies' reserves, still intact,
will be able to strike where they please.

Took Prisoners and Gave

London, Mar. 29.—British forces took
a number of prisoners and captured
guns north of the Somme, inflicting
heavy losses on the enemy, Field Mar-
shal Haig reported today.

"His frequent attacks with great de-

termination throughout the day (Thurs-
day) only gained our outpost lines after
severe hand to hand fighting," Haig
said.

"His reserves, sent forward against
our battle positions, were thrown back
everywhere with losses."

"Our own machine guns, artillery
and rifles, did great execution."

British Gain Ground.

London, Mar. 29.—"Our positions
were maintained against strong attack
tooth of the Somme yesterday after-
noon and evening, and we gained ground
by successful counter attack," Field
Marshal Haig reported today.

"Heavy continuous fighting contin-
ued south of the Somme until late in
the evening. We maintained our line
throughout the day in the face of re-
peated assaults by superior enemy for-
ces."

"We have withdrawn a short distance
from advanced points."
