confident expectation of government heads.

President Wilson will formally open the loan campaign with a striking speech in Baltimore tomorrow night, while throughout the land thousands of volunteer workers will urge the American nation to do its financial duty.

Movie stars—Charles Chaplin, Douglas Fairbanks, Mary Pickford and Marie Dressler—will sell bonds here tomorrow, opening a tour that will take them far afield in the United States.

The bill authorizing the loan was signed by the president last night and the first \$50 bond was struck off, and

stowed in the treasury.

Glen Ridge, New Jersey, today laid claim to the national record for percentage of individual subscription in the second liberty loan campaign. Forty three per cent of the total population of the town, or 1,788 out of 4,100 persons bought bonds.

Glen Ridge was assigned a quota of \$152,000 in the second campaign, but the sale of bonds ran above \$2,000,000.

Liberty loan officials are using Glen Ridge as a model after which all of the country should pattern. It was explained that if the Glen Ridge average was maintained throughout the country in the third campaign, there would be more than forty million individual subscribers to the third loan.

with a total it is safe to say of money given and loaned to the government and war enterprises of at least a million and a quarter, and possibly a million and a half.

In spite of this drain on the cash of the county the total resources of the banks as reported Jan. 1, 1918, was \$11,903,151.28, an increase of \$2,350,121.65. The total deposits were \$10,280,472.99, an increase of \$2,303,808.82, or very nearly 20 per cent.

Now after that where does the notion go to that the county has been drawn on so heavily in the last year that it is "bled white" and is in danger of complete monetary prostration? The point to master is this: that a fellow's wealth is not to be judged by what he has to spend, but by what he has left after his expenditures are made; and so with a community. Marion county is wealthier in every way, if one can judge by banking figures, that it was a year ago. If a year of giving and loaning brings this to pass, for heaven's sake let's have more of them.

Also don't get lachrymose about the valley going broke. There are no present indications.

lust of the Hohenzollerns. The small gains made by the Germans in the last 24 hours are not worth the casualties. German losses in these operations are two to three times the losses of the British and French, who are remaining on the defensive.

Poeh's policy of caution is being fully rewarded by Von Hindenburg's ferocious recklessness. It is advantageous for the allies to invite the Hohenzollerns in these increasing sacrifices of German troops. Each destruction of a German division at this time is a victory for the allies, whether or not the German gain a small additional area of territory. The territory certainly will be restored to the rightful owners at the peace conference, but the peace conference will not come until the bloodletting of Germany has worked its cure.

Von Hindenburg's renewed drive toward Amiens makes him once more the leech who is unconsciously curing Germany of her military ill.

General Poeh's great purpose now is to remain steadfastly on the defensive, holding his lines for further German bloodletting. If this is done successfully, Poeh will have won his right to be regarded as a great allied commander.

Mackensen Comes to Western Front

Washington, April 4.—The departure of Field Marshal Von Mackensen for the western front, reported in Paris newspapers, is a tacit admission by Germany of the failure of her Plevna drive, allied diplomats said today.

Von Mackensen is considered as the ablest of the Kaiser's generals, but for some time has been in bad favor at court. His presence on the western front would indicate, diplomats say, that Germany is about to play her last card in France.

Sickness Prevalent in Army Camps

Washington, April 5.—Bronchitis, influenza, and complicated pneumonia continued prevalent in army camps throughout the country this week, according to today's official report. Both sickness and death rates are higher than in the preceding week; but "health conditions" were reported as "good."

Total deaths for the week were 237 against 228 of the week before. Camp Pike still led the death list with 20.

Perry Elected Trustee of Bankrupt Condensery

Scores of creditors of the defunct Seio Condensed Milk Co., this morning crowded the circuit court room for the final adjustment of their claims against the company which has declared itself bankrupt in the face of debts approximating \$60,000.

Creditors elected E. E. Perry of Seio, trustee in bankruptcy and filed their many claims against the company, a subsidiary of the Logan Commercial Co., of Seattle. Mr. Perry's bond was fixed at \$5000. The meeting adjourned until April 29 at 10 o'clock, when creditors will meet for an examination of the affairs of the defunct and the parent companies and to elect the books of the company.

Future affairs of the Seio company will be conducted through the new trustees in an effort to win some return to those who lost heavily through the operation of the condensary. A plan to conduct the business under a committee of creditors failed when it was opposed by Marion county creditors—Albany Herald.

BOOKS ARE ASKED FOR SOLDIER BOYS

People of Salem Are Asked to Give Such Good Books As Can Be Spared

The Salem public library is asking that each citizen of Salem look over their library, select as many good books as can be spared, and leave them on the front porch tomorrow morning. The library will see that each book finds its way to a library for soldiers or sailors. The work will all be done in one day, and will be done without disturbance to those who leave the books on the porch on front step.

The book campaign, in Salem, will last but one day, and if enough automobiles can be secured, at one morning. A collection committee under the direction of Mrs. Louis Lachmund and Mrs. R. K. Page, will send out a regiment of volunteers in automobiles to collect the books, and they will be sent at once to where they can be reached by the soldiers.

The library, at this time, wants books, and no magazines or money is desired. It is considered necessary to keep the American soldiers supplied with comfort and home-like influences as much as possible, and there is no danger of giving too good books or too many. In almost every home there are books purchased recently or standard volumes still good. They should be at once put in the circulating libraries for soldiers, but as they are to serve virile impressionable young manhood, they should be selected with care.

There is as might be expected, a loud call for detective stories and tales of adventure. The men want books of that sort which they read before. They find relaxation in going back over the books of Conan Doyle, Stevenson and O. Henry. Time being at a premium, some don't care to risk new things that they are not sure of, but prefer to go back to the old authors with whom they are familiar.

Surprises are sometimes in store for the librarian who thinks that the new cars are only for fiction. A librarian starting in at a new post expected that the first call would be for some book by McCutcheon or Jack London. He was somewhat taken aback when the first patron asked for Shakespeare's "Pericles."

A private asked for a late book on electric motors and was shown what the camp librarian considered his best book on the subject. "Oh, I did the drawings for that book," said he, "I want something better than that!"

Books are also distributed in the base hospitals and are eagerly received by soldiers who are able to read. If you wish to help them in their weary hospital days and in their convalescence you can reach them best through the medium of some good book. Look over your books and pick out such volumes as you think would interest the boy you know the best, write your name and address on the inside leaf, and place it on the porch for the collectors in the morning. Give the book that causes a pang at parting, like saying good-bye to an old friend. Ten chances to one it will mean more to some soldier boy. Give your latest war book; you will probably not read it again. The boy in the olive drab, is waiting for it. Reading it will prepare him for conditions "over there."

military and fraternal organizations, will be at the corner of Marion and Church streets; P. E. Fullerton, in charge of the business offices and enterprises section, will be at the corner of Liberty and Marion; O. A. Hartman, in charge of the automobiles at the corner of Marion and Church, and Jack Patton and O. J. Myers, who have charge of the school children section, will have their sections report at the Marion high school. Those who have automobiles are requested to secure stickers from the Commercial club before the time of the parade.

Following is the formation of the parade as it now stands. This may be later changed:

"General" E. Lee Steiner and staff and Mayor Keyes. Police force. Salem band. Two companies of home guards. Cherrishers. High school cadets. Cherrishers band. Fraternal organizations. Cherry Bud band. Boy scouts. Public offices and enterprises. Citizens in automobiles.

The plans call for three bands, the home guards, some 250 strong, the high school cadets, and while the arrangements have not been made as yet, the G. A. R. and the Spanish War veterans will probably be included. The number of automobiles which will be in line will probably be well over 200 as the various Salem garages have promised 100 cars. These will probably be a number of floats decorated by business houses, but these have not as yet been announced.

It is probable that close to 2000 people will take part in the parade, and as the school children are expected to respond to the call in large numbers, this total may be increased. The length of the parade will rest with the number of those who wish to help the liberty loan drive along by showing up to take part.

Governor Withycombe issued the following request today:

"I most earnestly urge as a patriotic duty that every employee of the state capital as well as the business men and other residents of the city of Salem manifest their patriotic interest in the third liberty loan campaign by participating in the parade to be held in Salem at 1 p. m. Saturday, Liberty Day. Let this be a wholehearted response in the interest of our 'Liberty Boys' who are doing valiant service for us in France."

Turks-German Forces

Repulsed at Odessa

Petrograd, April 3.—Ukrainian and German forces seeking to recapture Odessa and Nicolaeff were repulsed, it was announced here today.

The Turks-German fleet, headed toward Odessa, was driven back by the Russian Black sea fleet.

Germans Forced Back

Petrograd, April 3.—Turks-German forces have been thrown back sixty versts (39.6 miles) from Batumi, it was announced here today.

Likewise, they have been driven

back from Erzerum-Kars line. The Ukrainian rada passed a resolution to continue the war against the soviets, following a speech by Colonel Von Haulberg, a member of the German general staff, promising increased German aid.
