SWEDISH SHIPPING
WILL BE CHARTERED
BY UNITED STATESOne Hundred Thousand Tons
Will Be Turned Over
Under Agreement

Washington, April 6.—One hundred thousand tons of Swedish shipping is to be chartered to the United States under a temporary trade agreement already completed, it was learned at the war trade board today.

Negotiations now are going on for a permanent agreement through which the country will get charters for much more tonnage, in return for ample supplies of food and badly needed war materials.

Some of these supplies will begin to move immediately under the temporary agreement, although only part of the promised 100,000 tons of ships have been turned over.

In this, the United States is anticipating terms of the agreement, officials explained. The war trade board today licensed the export to Sweden of 25,000 tons of phosphate rock for fertilizer. One cargo is loaded and will sail immediately. This government has also given permission for certain Swedish ships now in United States ports to clear for Chile, where they load twenty thousand tons of salt petre, another fertilizer material and proceed to Sweden.

Under the permanent agreement now being negotiated, Sweden will get from the United States 200,000 tons of wheat, 80,000 tons of wheat flour, fifty thousand tons of oats, forty seven thousand bales of cotton and plentiful supplies of cotton, wool, manufactured wool, spices, tea, mineral, oils for fuel, illuminating and lubricating, as well as certain much needed agricultural supplies such as hemp, jute and binder twine.

FEDERAL OFFICIALS
PROBE I. W. W. TREASONLiterature Taken In Raid at
Spokane Is Carefully
Scanned

Spokane, Wash., April 6.—Federal authorities scanned closely today "literature" found in the offices of the I. W. W., which were raided by the city police yesterday.

Circulars calling upon members of the organization to supply information concerning I. W. W. who are in any way aiding in the war against Germany may form basis for federal prosecution.

One circular asked all members to give names and addresses of I. W. W. serving in any branch of the military and naval service, all who are registered for service, all who have purchased liberty bonds or war saving stamps, and all who belong to the Red Cross.

The circular was signed: "Yours for industrial freedom, Seattle defense council."

John Monette, attorney for the I. W. W., who is said to be aiding in the defense of those on trial at Chicago, declared the police, contrary to law, had seized papers needed in the trial. Monette was assured that the papers would be examined and that all papers not pertaining to the organization would be returned to him.

The police arrested 93 men and women. Following examinations all were released except 26 men and the women, who will be tried either in federal or local courts.

officers, while in the adjoining rooms, American, British and Italian military missions labored in co-operative efforts toward establishing a unity of command of the allied forces on the west front.

The Germans apparently plan a vastly greater artillery concentration before risking the main drive toward Amiens. After the original thrust in the first half of the week, the enemy rushed up many 150 millimeter guns. On Thursday their first 210 millimeters appeared. Still heavier cannon are expected.

Heavy rains, beginning Thursday, are unquestionably increasing the German difficulties. On the contrary, the French railways, working with the same precision that characterized the 1914 mobilization, have completed the French concentration.

From a personal tour from where the artillery concentration is the heaviest, I have ever witnessed, I am convinced if the Germans persist against Amiens, the artillery fire preceding the shock of battle will be the greatest of the war.

Indications are plentiful that the Germans are preparing for a second offensive elsewhere for which the French have taken adequate measures.

Following the decision of the American government regarding the use of its troops, the French general staff declared the American forces will make their weight felt in the present gigantic contest.

Attack In Strength.

London, April 6.—German attacks "in considerable strength" on a twenty mile front north of the Somme thrust yesterday and this morning were repulsed, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

"North of the Somme, there was fighting everywhere south of Ailette (8 miles north of Arras and twenty miles north of Corbie on the Somme) until late yesterday evening," the statement said.

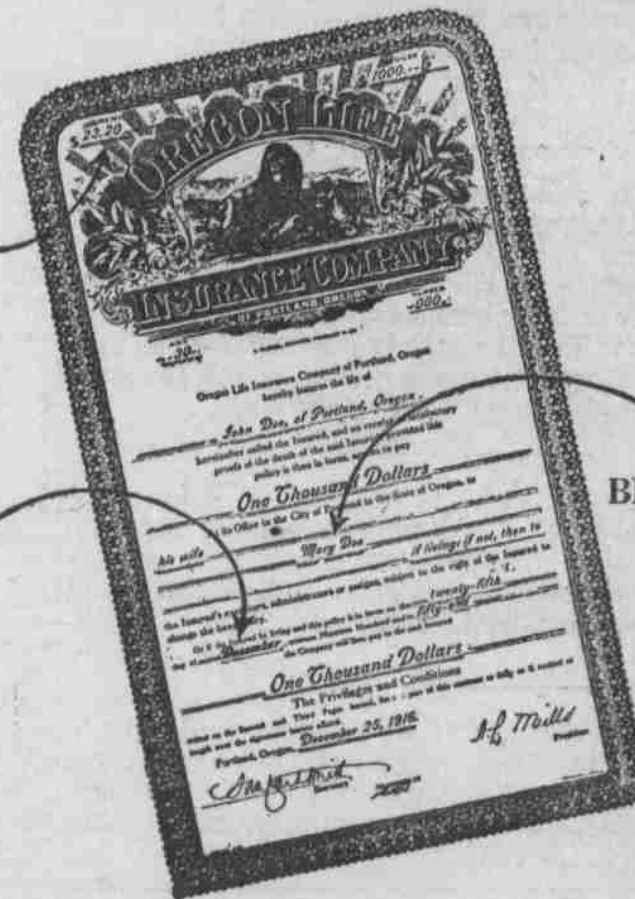
