GREAT PARADE OPENS BOND DRIVE IN SALEM TODAY

Military Organization and Civilians March to Boost Liberty Loan

The third liberty loan campaign was initiated this afternoon with what is considered the best parade of the "spontaneous" variety staged in the city for some time. It is estimated that at least 2,000 people were in line, including all the military organizations of the city, and the school children, about 400 children being in line. The opening of the drive was announced at 1 o'clock by the ringing of bells and blowing of whistles, and shortly after the parade started.

The high school cadets and the G. A. R. attracted much of the applause. The cadets displayed considerable knowledge of military tactics, and handled themselves as soldiers. The Home Guards and Cherrians also received favorable attention from the onlookers.

As the parade was decided on Thursday, arranged Friday, and staged Saturday, it was impossible to secure a large number of floats but those which did appear were of the better variety. The Belgian relief, the Red Cross and other organizations were present, and the state house was represented by cars from various offices, and the service flag of the Highway commission. A float featuring a frozen Kaiser brought forth much of the usual applause.

The parade was closed with a number of automobiles, filled with citizens of the city who volunteered the cars and themselves for the purpose of making the parade a success. Over a hundred cars were in line, and the special features committee of the local liberty loan will, which is in charge of the parade, believes that if the recruiting department meets with the response the parade workers received from the city, the city's quota will be "over the top" in less than the three days time set at present.

The parade formed along Marion street about 12:30, and was ready to start at the appointed time. The two bands secured by the committee were on hand and assisted the bells and whistles of the city in noise-making, and in addition produced the usual amount of harmony. The parade was led by "General" Steiner and Mayor Keyes accompanied by the staff, and followed by the city police force. The home guards and Cherrians followed, the newly organized company of guards making up in enthusiasm what they lacked in drill experience. The fraternal organizations turned out in good shape, and a large section of the line was taken up by them. The boy scouts and school children formed the next section, and they were followed by the business people, citizens, and by the automobile section.

The stores were closed from 12 to 2 in the afternoon, and as a result the streets were crowded while the parade passed. The blowing of whistles and ringing of the city's bells was productive of as much noise as was considered possible, and it is probable that the town batted a thousand in this particular. It is believed that every whistle, from the factories to the peanut stand joined in the festivities.

The governor fell in line with the spirit of the drive yesterday afternoon and issued the following proclamation: "I must earnestly urge as a patriotic duty that every employee of the state capital as well as the business men and other residents of the city of Salem manifest their patriotic interest in the Third Liberty Loan campaign by participating in the parade to be held in Salem at 1 p. m. Saturday, Liberty Day. Let this be a wholehearted response in the interests of our liberty boys who are doing valiant service for us in France."

The local organization will have the assistance of two Canadian soldiers, who have some interesting stories to tell of the great war. Sergeant Major Christy, one of the men, has been wounded eight times, and has been in most of the important actions in which the Canadian army has distinguished itself. Private Burke, the other lecturer, was captured by the Germans, but made his escape and returned to the British lines. He is on a leave of absence now, and has been sent by the Canadian government to assist Oregon in the Liberty Loan drive. The men will arrive from Albany on Tuesday and will remain at the disposal of the local committee until Friday. An itinerary has not been arranged, but they will speak in Marion county cities as well as in Salem.

Public Meetings
Chairman Charles Galloway of the speakers' committee, is preparing for a vigorous campaign next week. The meeting tomorrow afternoon at the Methodist church, which all the workers are expected to attend, will be the largest single meeting in Salem, and is open to the public. Attorney Robison, of the United States attorney's office at Portland, will speak.

A series of meetings will be held over the county next week, and the local speakers committee will assist. The Salem committee has agreed to furnish talkers for the county towns when ever asked, and the men selected to speak here will be impressed into service for county work. There are about 20 speakers on the list made out by Mr. Galloway.

Two interesting meetings were held last night. O. R. Gingrich and Mark McCallister addressed an enthusiastic session at Donald about 250 being present, and J. O. Bailey, of the attorney general's office, and A. W. Lawrence, state printer, spoke at Astoria to a good sized crowd. Father Buck and Rev. R. S. Gill are addressing a meeting at Gervais this afternoon.

Mosier, Wasco county, and Sandy, Clackamas county, wired shortly after 9 o'clock that they had exceeded their quotas.

Liberty Loan Rally

at Donald Last Night

Before a large and appreciative audience at Donald last night Oscar B. Gingrich, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and M. D. McCallister, of the state corporation department, divided the time speaking on the subject of the third liberty loan.

The meeting was presided over by James P. Feller, who is a candidate for county commissioner of Marion county. The meeting had every aspect of a patriotic rally, opened by the singing of America followed by patriotic songs by one of Donald's singers. Mr. Feller then introduced Mr. McCallister who spoke briefly on the purpose of the liberty loan and the technical features necessary for a full understanding of the purchase of the bonds. Mr. Gingrich followed with a patriotic address on the war in general, setting forth the responsibility of the citizenship of the United States. He emphasized very strongly the fact that this country must never get to the place where the citizenship must be coerced into contributing to war necessities, saying the best way to put a star in the crown of Kaiser Bill is to let him know that we were free to give rather than we gave voluntarily and willingly. We will however get the necessary funds to maintain an efficient fighting force both at home and abroad. How? That remains with you.

On the other hand Kaiser Bill has received numerous and terrible shocks when he learned that the 1st and 2nd Liberty loans were way over subscribed. That the Red Cross instead of securing \$100,000,000 reached the \$115,000,000 mark and the Y. M. C. A. \$50,000,000 instead of \$35,000,000, and this by voluntary contributions, and purchase. My Country 'Tis for thee, Sweet Land of Liberty," by coming up to the full measure of our responsibility and thus obviate any more drastic measures which might be misconstrued by our enemies across seas. The meeting closed with the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

Roosevelt Accused of False Statements

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Explanations by Senator Lodge and Kellogg that Roosevelt undoubtedly obtained his information from an incorrect newspaper report of the provision of the bill convinced Overman that no offense to the committee was intended. The clause that aroused Overman's indignation, bitterly criticized as alleged provision of the act, inflicting imprisonment for a long term of years and a heavy fine upon anyone who uses "contemptuous or slurring language about the president."

"This is a false statement," he declared indignantly. "If Mr. Roosevelt has any of his own time truth and manhood he will apologize. There is no truth in that statement."

Prince May Be Tried For Telling True Facts

Zurich, April 6.—A German imperial tribunal has ruled that it is possible to try Prince Lieknowsky for treason according to a dispatch from Leipzig today. Prince Lieknowsky was German ambassador to Great Britain when the war broke out and has written a series of memoirs, in which he intimated that Germany and not Great Britain was responsible for the war.

NEW MILE RECORD.

Great Lakes, Ill., April 6.—Jole Ray Illinois Athletic club, Chicago, broke the Central A. A. U. records for the mile run here this afternoon, hanging up a new mark of four minutes and 20 seconds.

President Smith Urges

Mormons to Re-Marry

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 6.—"Dress up, doll up, look your prettiest and unless you are too old, you widowers and widows, get married!" While this is not the exact language used by President Joseph F. Smith of the Mormon church in his semi-annual address to the church conference, it is what he meant, for he urged that widows and widowers re-marry. This advice was given to his comment on the statistical features of his report to the eighty eighth conference. The statistics show that there are 33 widows and seven widowers per thousand members. Too many, in the opinion of the head of the church, hence his advice if not too old they should marry, although he prescribed no age limit.

The marriage rate per 1000 members is 17 and the birth rate 37. There is no race suicide among the saints, and President Smith practices what he preaches. His grand children now number about ninety. Belief in plural marriage was made before the women's relief society conference, one speaker declaring, "I believe that the principle of plural marriage is true. It has been prophesied that many women would seek to be married to the same man. It has come true."

Veniremen Tampered With by Pro-German

Chicago, April 6.—Following a statement by the United States district attorney, Charles F. Clyde, that every venireman called in the trial of the 111 I. W. W. leaders had been "tampered with," Federal Judge Landis adjourned court late today until Monday morning when Clyde's evidence in support of his charges will be heard.

Mormon Church Buys Liberty Loan Bonds

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 6.—The Mormon church conference this morning directed the authorities to purchase a quarter million dollars worth of third liberty loan bonds. Richard R. Lyman was chosen apostle to succeed Hyrum Smith, deceased.

Wheat Consumption Is Ordered Reduced

Washington, April 6.—Wheat consumption in the bakeries of the country was ordered reduced five per cent more after April 13, the food administration announced today. It also stated that sufficient corn foods were available today, to eliminate wheat consumption entirely until after the next harvest. Heretofore bakers have been using 20 per cent wheat substitutes, which the present order now raises to 25 per cent.

WAR SUPPLIES BURNED

Chicago, April 6.—Ten carloads of army supplies were destroyed and other cars damaged in a mysterious fire in the Chicago and Northwestern railroad yards here today. The supplies consisted principally of clothing and shoes valued at \$75,000, consigned to various cantonments. Firemen believed bottles of kerosene were broken and caused the fire. Government agents are investigating.
