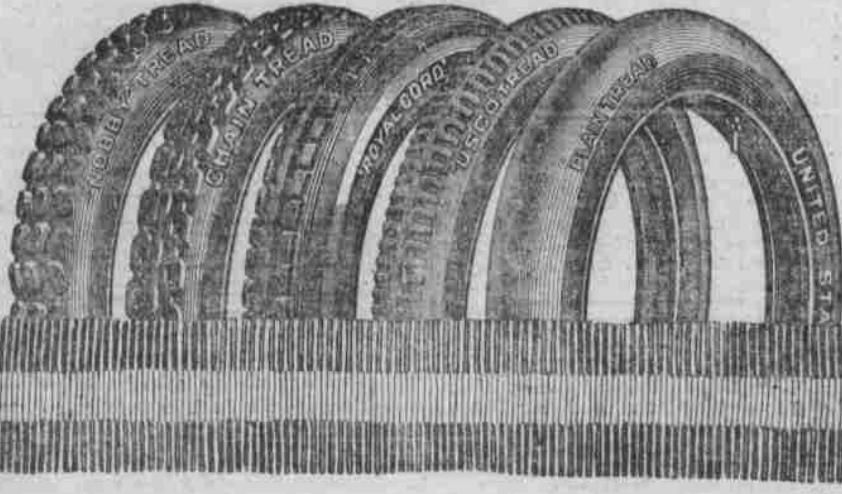

SALEM KINGS PRODUCTS COMPANY BUSY PLACE

Large Force of Men and Women Required to Fill Present Big Contracts

Manager "Jack" Walker, of the Salem Kings Products Co. is a very busy man just now, having been compelled to put on extra force of men and women to work on the pack in the specially prepared tin cans the United States army dehydrated potatoes, now almost ready for shipment.

Each of these Japanese tin cans hold 15 pounds of the finished product, and when a can is filled it is hermetically sealed, after which two of the cans are placed in a thin wooden crate, the sides and bottom and top of each being firmly bound with heavy wire, which also acts as a hinge, for the lifting of the lid of the case, facilitating the work of getting the contents of the cans in action. These cases are so made as to stand the wear and tear of ocean transportation, and when cars arrive in Salem, shipments will begin to move forward to the front.

Other Contract in View

When Quartermaster General Goethals first called for bids for army supplies, he also called for submission of bids on dehydrated onions, carrots and turnips, and no doubt another call for bids on these army supplies will be issued in the near future. The potatoes came first on the list, aside from the 20,000,000 pounds of beans commandeered in California.

It has been suggested by the Commercial club, through whose efforts, aided by Senator Charles McNary, the potato contract was obtained, that when the first train load, or car loads of "dehydrated spuds" leaves Salem, it be appropriately "banned," with the legend "Made in Salem, U. S. A.," so that as the cars pass through the country Salem will have a place on the national map as the source of army rations, just as it is "Now in the Sun," as the center of the Legationery industry.

Other Factories for Salem

Negotiations are now pending looking to the establishment in Salem, besides the new starch factory, a furniture factory, as well as a box factory, as the small box factory now in Salem cannot take care of the business of one large concern alone, and it is compelled to go elsewhere for its boxes, not only because the capacity here is limited, but, strange as it may seem, the prices elsewhere obtained are very much less than the prices made by the home factory.

Time alone will tell the story.

SUBMARINE TOLL SMALLER LAST WEEK

Washington Officials, However, Warn Public Not to Expect Too Much

London, April 11.—The number of British merchantmen sunk the week ending April 8 was the smallest since November 11, 1917, according to figures announced by the admiralty.

Four ships of more than 1000 tons, two of less, and two fishing boats were destroyed by submarines or mines. The week ending November 11 last year, when one craft of more than 1000 tons and five less were sunk, was the lowest mark in tonnage destroyed since the U-boat campaign was inaugurated February 28, 1917.

May Be Only Respite

Washington, April 11.—The low record of U-boat attacks the past week encouraged transportation officials today, but they warned that it probably indicated mainly only a low ebb in the up and down movement of losses. Some suggested, however, that Germany had pulled in her submarines to rest before making a drive to gain transport lines in the hope of breaking on America's troop reinforcements at this critical time.

War on Submarines

Chicago, April 11.—American submarines are retreating out the Kaiser's undersea pirates and fighting them in their own way, Secretary of the Navy Daniels told 20,000 jockies in training at the Great Lakes station, Daniels was resting at his hotel today after his arduous program yesterday.

"They're doing great work," the secretary said. "They had a tough trip over. They had to come back and re-fit and try it again. Eventually they all got over and went into it."

Five liberty bond sales totaling \$9,000,000 during the visit of Secretaries Lane and Daniels encouraged workers today in the hope of exceeding Chicago's quota of \$125,000,000.

"More ships, more ships," was the gist of Daniel's address before the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Before the same audience Secretary Lane announced the slogan:

"Put every dollar to use, every hand to use, every acre to use, put every idea to win the war."

The secretary of the interior said no favors pending land for every soldier who returns from France. Forty acres and a house, with forty years in which to pay, would be his reward to the returned fighters. There is ample land along the Colorado, Mississippi and other western rivers, to be reclaimed, he said.
