Potter of the dairy division of the Department of Agriculture will meet with the women of the country who are especially interested in skim milk. She will co-operate with the state organization and work with Lorene Parker, home demonstration agent for Marion and Clackamas counties.

Reuben Thornley, who was brought from Portland yesterday by Constable P. M. Plants have been particularly for plan s and vegetable seeds for war gardens, indicating that unusual interest is being taken in gardens this season, which is the spirit the society has been encouraging.

Hall and Lieutenant M. L. Myers stated today that it is particularly urgent that all members be on hand for the meeting.

A full house greeted the recital given last evening at Waller hall by the students of the public speaking department under the direction of Prof. Della Crowder Miller. An excellent program consisting of stories, impersonations, burlesques, monologues, lyrics, etc., was rendered, calling forth the hearty applause of the audience. This was the last recital by the students of this department for this season and in many respects was the most pleasing that has been given. The students and their instructor are to be commended for the excellent showing made.

A slight mixup between a truck operated by the Capital City transfer company and a State street streetcar occurred between Liberty and High streets this morning. He found very little scale, but did manage to locate a lot of bad roses after he drove off the main highway. He says H. P. Earss, plant pathologist of the O. A. C., has sent for specimens of the new apple canker to send on to Washington as this is entirely a new disease in this part of the country.

Piper, of the firm of Scott & Piper, local cycle dealers, returned from Portland this morning and gave out the information that he was successful in negotiating a deal with state authorities for 12 Harley Davidson motorcycles equipped with side cars for use of the state military police, an organization now being mobilized for state protection. SALEM IS OVER BOND QUOTA AND STILL GOING STRONG

Subscriptions Are Still Coming In To Swell the Great Patriotic Response

With Third Liberty Loan subscriptions totaling more than \$517,800 Salem went over the top yesterday evening with a few hundred to spare. This is the first time Salem has topped the top.

Today, the central committee is receiving subscriptions running from \$100 to \$2,000 each, and as one committee man remarked, it looks as if Salem was doing its best to make up for its other two failures.

Today the greater number of the teams and captains are out, making a complete canvass of their districts, that none may be overlooked. The result of the week's work will be tabulated this evening. Captains declare that the mere fact that Salem is over its quota will have nothing to do with their work. They will continue until every person in Salem and vicinity has been approached and given the opportunity to subscribe.
